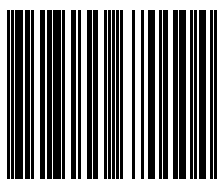

New name: Salem Super Cruise

SALEM — The annual cruise will now be known as the “Salem Super Cruise,” according to Service Safety Director Ken Kenst.

Kenst said he and Mayor John Berlin decided shortly after last week’s organizational cruise meeting to make the name change.

He said the Salem High School art department will be working on an event logo.

“From my standpoint, every time I wrote it I forgot it,” Kenst said, “and it’s not weekend ... this really pinpoints it with Salem in it.”

This will be the seventh cruise in Salem and third time the city organizes and manages the event that is scheduled for the June 21-24 weekend.

The event draws several thousand people to the city over the four day run and has turned a profit the last two years.

It officially begins with a Thursday (June 21) evening kick-off cruise at the Dunkin’ Donut restaurant on the east side of town.

Essex I of Salem has hosted a Wednesday cruise event for the past few years.

Last week, more than 30 people attended the 2012 organizational meeting at city hall.

Kenst said he was happy with the attendance while assuring people that the city is “committed” to the

SSC.

Kenst said, “People involved in this (from out of town) say, ‘We’re going to Salem for the cruise.’”

Jim Bonfert, a longtime Salem hot rodder and cruise volunteer, said, “I think that’s a great name, I always thought we should call it ‘Salem’ ... that’s the name of this town.

“It’s easier to remember and it’s snappier.”

Columbiana names Harold finance director

COLUMBIANA — It took some time, but the city of Columbiana has a new finance director.

New Waterford Fiscal Officer Mike Harold announced this week he is resigning to fill the Columbiana position vacated by Kevin Smith at the end of 2011. He has served the village of New Waterford on a full-time

basis since 2004.

Smith resigned in November but agreed to stay on with the city on a part-time, as needed basis until a replacement was found.

He worked for the city three years and submitted his resignation due to accepting a similar position for Mill Creek Park in Mahoning County, City Manager Keith Chamberlin said.

He will assist Harold on a part-time

basis until March 31.

Chamberlin said Harold will make the same salary as Smith was, at \$61,000 a year. The non-union position is appointed by the city manager.

“When we interviewed he came across pretty strong on what his abilities were. It was a very difficult decision. There were good candidates,” Chamberlin said.

Leetonia grit chamber project makes state list

LEETONIA — The village could get funding through the state for a project at the wastewater treatment plant.

Village Administrator Gary Phillips told Village Council Wednesday night that although the grit chamber replacement project missed out on funding through the Columbiana County Engineer’s Office, it is one of eight the office submitted to the state for small government funds, ranking fourth on the list.

Phillips expressed optimism about the chances the project will receive funding.

“I think it’s a good ranking,” he said. “I’d rather be ranked number four out of eight than number eight out of eight. Obviously the better the ranking, the better the chances of receiving funding.”

Phillips said the projects will be re-evaluated and judged against other projects across the state. The results should be known by early summer, he noted.

The village is seeking funding through the Ohio Public Works Commission to replace the grit chamber at the plant, a project estimated at \$258,800.

According to Phillips, the OPWC funding will cover 89

Trustees OK road use deals with driller

FAIRFIELD TOWNSHIP — Trustees approved separate road use maintenance agreements with Chesapeake Exploration LLC. for ingress and egress requirements at two private drilling sites on Thursday.

The agreements, one for Miller Road (Twp. Road 862) and Beeson Mills Road (Twp. Road 790), are conditional on Ohio Department of Transportation review and call for specific upgrading and strengthening, if necessary, before starting construction at the Mellinger Well on Beeson Mill Road and on Miller Road.

Trustee Barry Miner pointed out that the intersection at Beeson Mill Road was “skewed” while the one on Miller Road had “sight-distance” issues.

“Safety is a concern of ours,” Miner told four people representing Chesapeake and another company.

Approximately .7 miles on Beeson Mill Road will be used and the contract calls for the operator (Chesapeake) to use legal

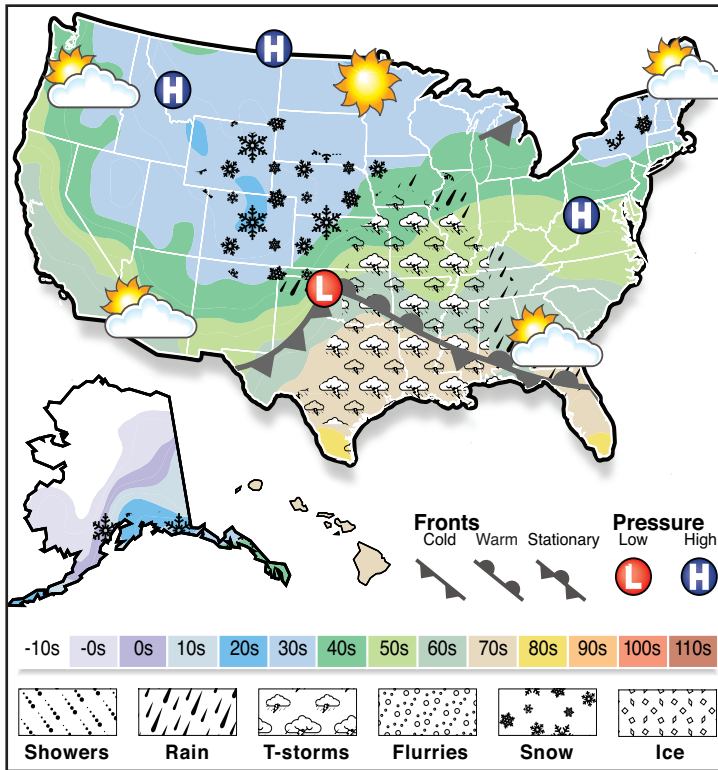

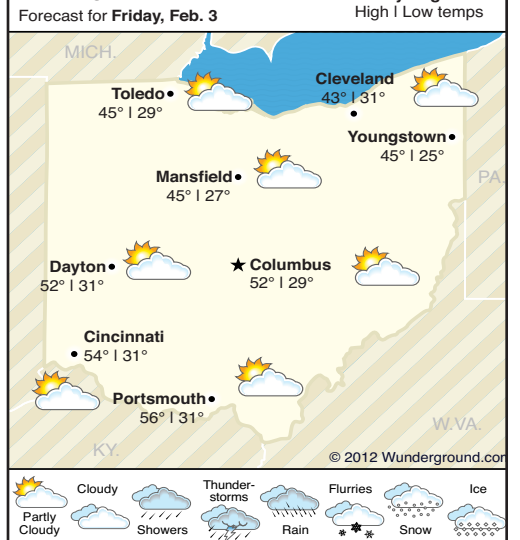

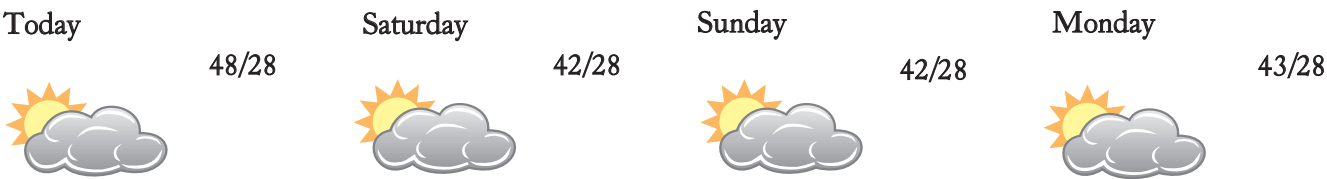

Official: 2 protesters killed in Suez, Egypt

CAIRO (AP) — A health official says two protesters have been killed by police gunfire in clashes with police in Suez, Egypt.

They were the first to die in demonstrations that followed a riot after a soccer game in Port Said, Egypt, that left 74 dead.

Health official Mohammed Lasheen said the two were killed by bullets early Friday and were taken to a hospital in Suez.

About 3,000 people demonstrated in front of police headquarters in Suez. Police fired tear gas and live ammunition, witnesses said.

Demonstrations erupted in Cairo and other places in Egypt after the Port Said incident. Protesters blame police for failing to contain the disturbance.

The Donald endorses Romney in Vegas

LAS VEGAS (AP) — With his trademark flair for spectacle, Donald Trump endorsed Mitt Romney for president Thursday on the famed Las Vegas strip — just hours after Newt Gingrich's advisers were spreading the word that The Donald would be anointing him instead.

Trump's endorsement seemed likely to affect this Saturday's Nevada caucuses — and the GOP nomination fight in general — about as much as a Sin City breeze disturbs the real estate mogul's legendary hair. But he managed to create a stir of a different sort, at least for a day.

Romney said he was glad to get the support, but he seemed almost bemused to be caught up in the Trumpian

drama.

"There are some things you just can't imagine happening. This is one of them," Romney said with a smile, looking out at the reporters and cameras jammed into the lobby of the hotel complex that bears Trump's name. The real estate mogul had entered to applause, with Romney and his wife, Ann, at his side.

"Mitt is tough, he's smart, he's sharp and he's not going to allow bad things to continue to happen to this country we all love," Trump said. He vigorously shook Romney's hand and said, "Go out and get 'em. You can do it."

Some affiliates upset at Komen cuts

NEW YORK (AP) — The renowned breast cancer charity Susan G. Komen for the Cure faced an escalating backlash Thursday over its decision to cut breast screening grants to Planned Parenthood. Some of Komen's local affiliates are openly upset, including all seven in California, and at least one top official has quit, reportedly in protest.

Meanwhile, Komen has been deluged with negative emails and Facebook postings, accusing it of knuckling under to pressure from anti-abortion groups, since The Associated Press reported on Tuesday that it was halting grants that Planned Parenthood affiliates used for breast exams and related services. The grants totaled \$680,000 last year.

Planned Parenthood has been heartened by an outpouring of support in response to the cutoff. Besides \$400,000 in smaller donations from 6,000 people, it is receiving \$250,000 from a family foundation in Dallas and a \$250,000 pledge announced Thursday by New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg to match future donations.

In Washington, 26 U.S. senators — all Democrats except for independent Bernie Sanders, of Vermont — signed a letter calling on Komen to reconsider its decision.

"It would be tragic if any woman — let alone thousands of women — lost access to these potentially lifesaving screenings because of a politically motivated attack," the senators wrote.

Sunken treasure now beckons

ROME (AP) — In the chaotic evacuation of the Costa Concordia, passengers and crew abandoned almost everything on board the cruise ship: jewels, cash, champagne, antiques, 19th-century Bohemian crystal glassware and thousands of art objects, including 300-year-old woodblock prints by a Japanese master.

Now, a veritable treasure lies beneath the pristine Italian waters where the luxury liner ran aground last month.

Though some objects are bound to disintegrate, there is still hoard enough to tempt treasure seekers — just as the Titanic and countless shipwrecks before have lured seekers of gold, armaments and other riches for as far back as mankind can remember.

It may be just a matter of time before treasure hunters set their sights on the sunken spoils of the Costa Concordia, which had more than 4,200 people on board.

"As long as there are bodies in there, it's considered off base to everybody because it's a grave," said Robert Marx, a veteran diver and the author of numerous books on maritime history, underwater archaeology and treasure hunting. "But when all the bodies are out, there will be a mad dash for the valuables."

Ohio group seeks tax hike on oil, gas billions

COLUMBUS (AP) — As Gov. John Kasich prepares to deliver his State of the State speech in the heart of Ohio's shale drilling region, a liberal policy group is proposing that he and other policymakers bring the state's taxes on oil and gas profits in line with those of Texas.

Columbus-based Innovation Ohio said Thursday that its analysis of industry data is also leading it to seek passage of a Landowner Bill of Rights and a Hire Ohio plan to ensure residents get their fair share of proceeds and jobs from the coming shale boom.

Spokesman Dale Butland emphasized that the report is about economics, not environmental factors such as drilling using hydraulic fracturing, or fracking, or a series of earthquakes in the Youngstown area near a deep injection well for disposing of drilling wastewater.

"If fracking goes forward in this state, all Ohioans should benefit," Butland said. "After all, these natural resources belong to us, not the oil companies. The companies are certainly entitled to a fair profit for extracting it, but regular Ohioans also deserve a fair share and a fair shake — and it's up to our elected officials to make sure we get it."

The group's analysis of state oil and gas reserve data found that shale drilling could mean \$86 billion to Ohio natural gas developers over the next 20 years. The report identified Ohio oil resources worth an additional \$130 billion to \$550 billion, along with natural gas liquids of unknown value.

That bears out predictions by the GOP governor's administration that the industry could be a game-changer for the ailing economy in this once-proud manufacturing state.

Kasich spokesman Rob Nichols declined to react to Innovation Ohio's proposals.

"I'll respond to them directly when they release their donors and their finances to the public," he said. "We don't know who's funding them: Is it environmental groups? Is it anti-drilling interests? What we know is that shale and natural gas stands to bring an economic revival to a part of the state that's been down for decades. We're managing it responsibly and with sensitivity to job creation and the environment."

Janetta King, who served as policy director to former Democratic Gov. Ted Strickland, is the group's president, and several Democrats are publicly involved in the think tank.

Innovation Ohio says the state hasn't gone far enough to protect the interests of residents.

To be more in line with Texas, the group proposes a windfall profits tax, raising Ohio's oil and gas severance tax rates to 7.5 percent on natural gas and 4.6 percent on oil and natural gas liquids. The increase would raise nearly \$2.5 billion from the extraction of natural gas over 10 years — and could raise an additional \$5.9 billion to \$25.3 billion in tax revenue.

Butland said the money could be used to offset budget cuts to schools and local governments.

A Landowner Bill of Rights would be enforced by the Ohio attorney general. It would include added consumer protections for those selling their mineral rights and disclosure of chemicals used during drilling and wastewater disposal.

Under Hire Ohio, energy companies hiring a certain percentage of Ohioans might get tax breaks or those establishing training programs for employing Ohio graduates could receive tax incentives.

Defendants get credit for time spent in jail

LISBON — The prison sentences of two defendants were reduced after they were given mandatory credit for time already spent in jail on the charges.

Brian Spinks, 26, Cusick Road, Lisbon, was previously sentenced to three years in prison by Columbiana County Common Pleas Court Judge Scott Washam on two charges of failing to comply with a police order to halt and one count of criminal damaging. On two separate occasions, he led police on high-speed chases after refusing to halt, and he kicked out the cruiser window after being arrested the second time.

Judge Washam granted Spinks credit for 240 days served in the county jail.

Tony L. McKenzie, 41, Spillway Drive, Guilford Lake, was sentenced to three years prison after pleading guilty to felonious assault for being infected with the HIV virus and then having unprotected sex with his wife, who he had failed to advise of his condition until after the fact. Washam granted McKenzie credit for 107 days spent in the county jail.

In other court action, Veretta M. Pearson, Riley Avenue, East Liverpool, was found to be drug dependent and sentenced to five years' probation/treatment on a drug trafficking charge. The 68-year-old Pearson admitted to selling marijuana from her home to an informant working with the county drug task force in May 2009.

Chase E. Crank Jr., 53, East Third Street, Salem, was fined \$1,000 and his license was suspended for three years by Judge C. Ashley Pike for failing to comply with a police order to halt. Crank was driving the wrong way on state Route 11 when arrested and cited for OVI by the highway patrol.

Aimee J. Johnson, 41, of Empire, was sentenced by Judge Pike to up to six months at a prison alternative facility after she was found to have violated her probation for forgery and misuse of a credit card. Johnson was originally placed on probation for illegally using the credit card of Deloris Keenan of Empire at the Calcutta Walmart and Huntington National Bank in Wellsville. Keenan was described in court documents as disabled. Johnson violated her probation by getting convicted in Jefferson County for petty theft and then being charged with assault.

3 men indicted in theft of equipment from EL schools

LISBON — Three men were served indictments Wednesday for charges relating to thefts of equipment owned by the East Liverpool City School District last August.

Michael K. Mackey II, 34, Winston Drive, East Liverpool; Arlan Bailey, 22, Park Boulevard, East Liverpool; and Clarence V. Wright, 33, West Second Street, East Liverpool, were each indicted in January by the Columbiana County Common Pleas Court grand jury.

Wright is charged with three counts of receiving stolen property, while Mackey and Bailey are each charged with two counts of receiving stolen property.

According to court documents, all three men are accused of having a zero turn Toro riding lawn mower and a New Holland tractor with a front loader with both a bucket and backhoe, all belonging to the East Liverpool schools. According to previous news reports the items were valued at more than \$24,000 and taken from Patterson Field, cutting a hole in the fence overnight in late August.

Additionally, Wright is accused of having a Suzuki motorcycle, which belonged to World of Cycles in Moon Township, Pa. The motorcycle was taken sometime between Aug. 26 and Sept. 2.

Arraignments for the three men are set for Feb. 16.

Inmate adds pig to Vt. cruiser decals

BURLINGTON, Vt. (AP)

— A Vermont prison inmate who makes stationery and license plates has gotten the best of the state police by adding the image of a pig to the state decal on their cruisers. One of the spots on the cow in the state crest has been changed to the shape of a pig, a derogatory term for police. The 16-inch car door decals are made by prisoners in St. Albans. Middlesex station commander Lt. Paul White tells The Burlington Free Press newspaper at least three of the altered decals are on cruisers at his barracks.

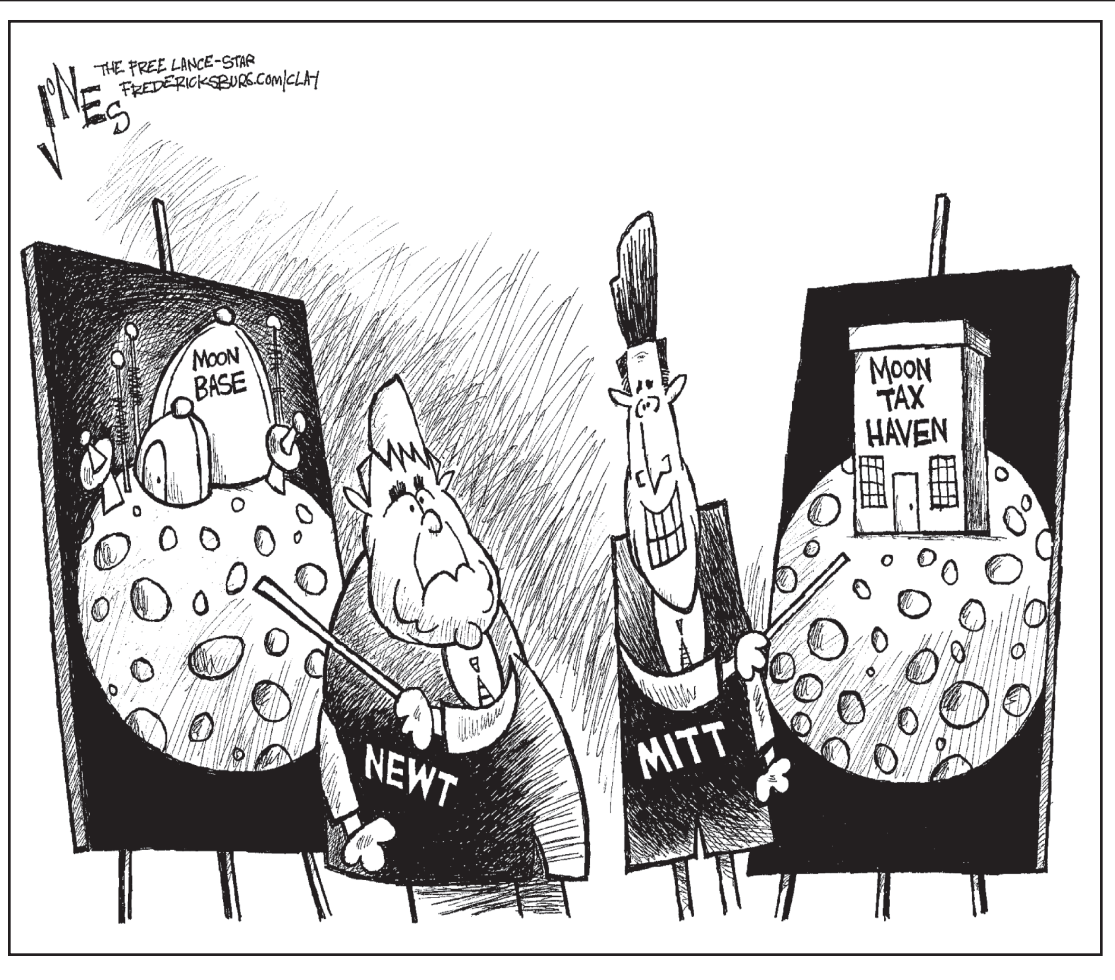
If you are hosting a Super Bowl party, keep in mind:

Too perfect: An essential limp

When a friend was writing a novel, he was concerned that his protagonist was too perfect.

People can't identify with perfection, he said. For the character to be sympathetic, he needs to have a flaw. He needs an injury or a wound of some sort so that people can identify with and care about him.

"Why don't you give him a limp?" I suggested, thinking of my own bum leg from a long-ago car accident. And thus, the character, an otherwise near-perfect man -- good-looking, smart and talented -- began to walk with a slight pause in his gait. To the reader, it was love at first limp.

Literature often reveals what life occludes and the man with a limp provides clues to why people are so reluctant to support Mitt Romney despite his picture-perfect resume of skills and accomplishments. We keep hearing that he's "too perfect" and that so-called "ordinary Americans" can't identify with him. Indeed, there is something vaguely unfamiliar about Romney.

Handsome, rich and successful, he is happily married to a beautiful wife, father to five strapping sons and grandfather to many. At the end of a long day campaigning, his hair hasn't moved. His shirt is still unwrinkled and neatly tucked into pressed jeans. He goes to bed the same way he woke up -- sober, uncaffeinated, seamless and smiling in spite of the invectives hurled in his direction.

What's wrong with this guy? Nada. Which is precisely the problem. Romney could use a limp.

In order to humanize him, helpful critics have suggested that he smile less during debates and try to show a little anger. Thanks to a new coach, he has become more aggressive and has begun punching back. Even so, audiences know instinctively that this is not the real Mitt. He's just not that mad, and why should he be?

He has earned enough money never to have to work again. His investments produce multiples of millions in barely taxable income. When he looks in the mirror, he gets to rest his eyes on a relentlessly handsome face.

For most everyday Americans, life is less tidy.

Half have been or will be divorced. Someone in the family is an alcoholic or a drug user. Most can barely pay their bills and there's not much to look forward to. When most Americans of Romney's vintage look in the mirror, they see an overweight person they don't recognize.

The idea that they might put some of their investments in the Cayman Islands is so far beyond the realms of imagination and experience that Romney seems mostly a creature of fiction.

It isn't that Romney can't connect with people, as has been pronounced repeatedly. It is that people can't connect with him. This also helps explain why the far less-perfect Newt Gingrich can attract support against all reason, or at least against all reasonable expectations.

Gingrich the serial husband, whose marriages merged one into the other; his questionable ethics and cosmic grandiosity are by now familiar. Though smart, he is often unwise -- morally lapsed and physically undisciplined. By those measures, he seems pretty much like most everyone else -- fallen, but who isn't?

Mitt Romney, that's who.

Metaphorically speaking, Gingrich has a limp that makes it easier for voters to identify with him. For reasons more emotional than rational, we imperfect humans tend to be attracted to others more like us than not. But it is entirely possible that we are wrong and should examine this template of behavior before selecting a president.

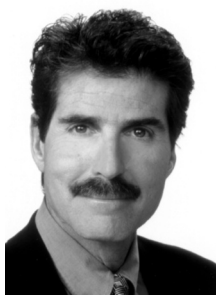
Is it really necessary that a president be like the common man or woman? It is possible to want to do something about poverty, unemployment and debt without having experienced them. The desire to eradicate cancer does not rely upon one's having suffered it.

Having a common touch is certainly helpful in politics. We greatly admire those who are equally at ease with kings and paupers. But these skills may be less important than they seem when it comes to problem solving. Ultimately, the nerdy, disciplined numbers-cruncher who has turned failing businesses around for a living might have a greater palliative effect on the nation's ills than someone who, by virtue of his own transgressions, feels others' pain.

It seems the question for voters is not whether they can forgive Romney his imperfections, which is most often the case in politics, but whether they can forgive him his perfections.

Americans should stop policing the world

With an election approaching and at least some Americans upset about irresponsible spending, the president has finally expressed a political interest in cutting something. He says the Pentagon will spend "only"

\$525 billion next year. That's slightly less than the current \$531 billion.

A cut is good, but this will barely dent the deficit. We could save much more if America assumed a military policy designed for defense rather than policing the world.

Presidential candidate Ron Paul gets criticized for advocating that. Paul's opponents, including many of my colleagues, complain about his "isolationist foreign policy."

But shrinking the military's role isn't the same as isolation. America can have a huge impact in the world without deploying our military. We already do. By all means, let our movies and music alarm mullahs. Let our websites and books disseminate ideas that autocrats consider dangerous. Above all, let's

trade with everyone.

It's said that when goods don't cross borders, armies will. There's plenty of evidence to support that. A report funded by European governments says armed conflict in Muslim countries is far lower today than it was two decades ago. A reason? Trade.

Richard Cobden, a 19th-century British liberal statesman, said, "The progress of freedom depends more upon the maintenance of peace, the spread of commerce and the diffusion of education than upon the labors of Cabinets or foreign offices."

I agree. American music and consumer goods did more to bring down the Berlin Wall than our military did.

Ron Paul doesn't say that we shouldn't defend ourselves. He supported our retaliation in Afghanistan after 9/11. He says if we are attacked, or clearly threatened with attack, America should fight. That's defense. That's different from policing the world.

Today, America spends more on the military than we did when Russia threatened us with missiles. That's irrational. And we can't afford it.

Still, I am uncomfortable writing about defense. I'm surrounded by smart people who say America needs to spend more on the military. Some studied war for years. I haven't. My instinct is

to believe the hawks.

Except, I covered markets. I watched government try to improve on them. Doing that, I learned that government doesn't do anything well. Why would that be different for military policy?

It isn't. In 2004, the U.S. military sent \$12 billion in shrink-wrapped \$100 bills to Iraq. That money disappeared. We don't know what happened to it. The U.S. official in charge said there was so much cash flying around his office that the staff called the packages "footballs" and threw passes to one another.

There is no cure for military inefficiency any more than there's a cure for waste at the post office. The point is that we should rely on government central planning as little as possible.

Today, some people want the military to contain China, chase terrorists, train foreign militaries to chase terrorists, protect sea lanes, keep oil cheap, stop genocide, protect foreign states from aggression, spread goodwill through humanitarian missions, respond to natural disasters, secure the Internet, police the Mexican border and transform failed states into democracies.

Politicians have a hard time saying no to such noble-sounding goals. But the list is endless, which is part of the problem.

Transforming states -- nation-building -- is the worst form of central planning.

Running for president 11 years ago, George W. Bush called for a "humble" foreign policy and said, "I don't think that our troops ought to be used for nation-building." Yet four years later, he was nation-building in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Candidate Bush, rather than President Bush, had the right idea. We have tried to build a working democracy in Afghanistan for more than 10 years now. Have we won hearts and minds? No. A recent poll of Afghans found just 43 percent had a favorable impression of the United States, way down from 83 percent in 2005.

Nations are too complex for outsiders to "build." Nations are organic bottom-up things. Saying no to nation-building is not isolationism.

Ron Paul is in good company when he says an interventionist foreign policy makes enemies and provokes danger to ourselves. It's time we stopped confusing defense with policing the world.

Bond raised for men caught with scrap

LISBON — The four men accused Wednesday of stealing scrap and trespassing at a Summitville junkyard had bond increased on Thursday after each were found to have extensive criminal histories.

Bond in Columbiana County Municipal Court had originally been set for \$1,250, but Judge Mark Frost after reviewing their records increased the bond.

Michael E. McGee, 53, Canton, was increased the most to \$25,000 cash surety. During video arraignments, when asked if he understood the charges said he did not.

"I don't agree with it," McGee said when asked to clarify his statement. "I'm an innocent bystander."

Frost questioned if McGee was an innocent bystander during some of the eight pages of other charges in his past, including an attempted aggravated murder charge in 1977 of which McGee was convicted of a lesser charge of aggravated assault. McGee said that happened in Toledo. He is currently on four years probation after being convicted of having weapons while under a disability in December 2010 in Stark County.

"I am 53 years old, your honor,"

McGee said in an attempt to explain his long criminal record.

Another of the men Nicholas Martino, 26, Canton, attempted to explain the criminal trespassing and theft charges he is currently facing by stating he had spoken to a man he believed to be the property owner and felt they had permission to be there.

"We were not intentionally committing a crime," Martino said.

It was also pointed out by Assistant Prosecutor Don Humphrey, Martino had given deputies his brother Joseph Martino's name. Martino denied that also, stating he just didn't have his identification card with him and did not know his social security number, so investigators just did not know who he was.

"I don't feel I have an extensive criminal record," Martino said, right before his bond was set at \$10,000 cash/surety.

It was also pointed out by Humphrey that Martino currently has a warrant from Stark County.

A third suspect in the case, Matthew A. Miskimens, 33, Louisville, also claimed Martino had spoken to the owner and he thought they had permission to be there. Already on probation from a 2010 felony conviction of tampering with evidence and failure to comply,

Miskimens also had bond set at \$10,000 cash/surety.

Finally, Justin A. Broad, 30, Oakhill Avenue, Alliance, who had posted the \$1,250 bond after his arrest Wednesday afternoon, had his bond raised to \$10,000 cash/surety following his arraignment in the court room earlier in the morning.

Broad initially contended he had no criminal record, but after his record was pulled it was found he had at least 10 charges from 2003 forward, including possession of drugs, inducting panic, a felony domestic violence, receiving stolen property and three other theft-related charges.

When questioned by Frost about not being completely honest, defense attorney Eric Kibler spoke for Broad that he has lived in Stark County all his life and had meant to say is he has not been in any trouble here.

"I wasn't trying to wormhole you or anything like that," Broad said. "I wasn't trying to mislead you."

"I'm not going to punish you for misrepresenting," Frost said. "There may have been a misunderstanding, but based on the record, I think that (bond increase) is appropriate."

Pretrials for the four men were set for Feb. 9.

size and load weighted legal vehicles, cooperate with school district transportation supervisors, provide a 24-hour emergency contact number, provide additional traffic signage and signals at operator's expense, protect, save an indemnify and hold the township harmless from any liabilities as a result of law violations, provide dust suppression, and meet other contract provisions.

He said the sight-distance issue at state Route 517 was to the east.

In other business, trustees held off on a request by Zoning Officer Kymberly Seabolt to have Wendy Moeller, an attorney specializing in zoning issues, "on call" on a supplemental basis for zoning reviews.

Seabolt said it was nothing against the township's current counsel, but there are times there's no response.

Seabolt said it was a way "to meet a need" adding Moeller would be an asset and it would be a "win-win for us."

Trustee Chairman Bob Hum said he would be concerned if there was a question dealing with "something more serious" that had to come before the board.

Miner said he wasn't ready to make a decision "tonight" noting the township has legal counsel.

"Maybe we could make a decision later," he said.

percent of the project. Of the OPWC share, 70 percent (\$161,200) will be in a grant that will not need repaid and 30 percent (\$69,100) in a zero percent loan. The village will be responsible for the remaining \$28,500.

If the village fails to secure funding through small government, Phillips said he will have to find other means to pay for the project.

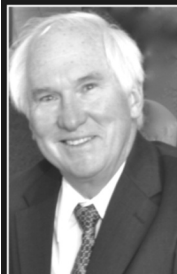
The grit chamber is a piece of equipment that removes harmful debris, such as gravel or cement fragments, from the wastewater before it enters the pumps at the plant, Phillips explained. Over 25 years old, the current unit is in poor working condition and is failing to stop the grit from entering the system, which is damaging motors at the plant and increasing maintenance costs, he noted.

the International Monetary Fund. But on Thursday a European Union official said this plan was not enough to help fix Greece's problems, which are getting worse as the effects of the recession take hold.

In order to bring Greece's debt burden to a sustainable level — 120 per cent of its economic output in eight years' time — the country's international debt inspectors calculate that Greece needs an additional \$20 billion — a shortfall it believes should be made up by the rest of the 17-country eurozone, the European official.

The Fed chairman told the House Budget Committee Thursday that the central bank's plan is an appropriate step to combat high unemployment while inflation is stable.

Bernanke was challenged immediately on the issue by the panel's chairman, Paul Ryan, a Wisconsin Republican, who said the Fed's move would risk higher inflation and hurt growth.

Jonathan Arnold, an analyst at Deutsche Bank, said there's a chance prices could approach \$500, which would be an enormous windfall for First Energy.

First Energy shares rose 3.3 percent Thursday on a day in which the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell slightly.

First Energy to profit from closing coal plants

NEW YORK (AP) — Instead of complaining about clean air rules, maybe utilities should cheer them.

Sometimes, the rules lead to big gains. First Energy, a utility based in Ohio, got such a boost Thursday, a week after the company announced it would close six coal-fired plants, blaming new federal rules aimed at slowing emissions of mercury and other toxins.

The reason: There will now be a smaller fleet of power plants available to meet potential power needs. This smaller supply means the price to coax companies like First Energy to make their plants available will rise.

Julien Dumoulin-Smith, an analyst at UBS, predicted rates would rise from \$126 for every megawatt available per day to \$200. For the 8,000 megawatts of power plant capacity owned by First Energy in the region, that would be an extra \$216 million for the year covered by the auction.

Jonathan Arnold, an analyst at Deutsche Bank, said there's a chance prices could approach \$500, which would be an enormous windfall for First Energy.

fit differs too. Here's how: — In states where power prices are set by market forces, fewer plants means lower electricity supply, and higher prices.

Companies that have plants that comply with the new rules stand to benefit from higher prices. First Energy has nuclear and modernized coal plants that meet the new standards.

— In states that are regulated, utilities have to ask public utilities commissions for permission to install new equipment or build new plants. But the utilities are allowed to earn a higher return on these big-ticket investments than they are for selling power to customers.

To the extent that the new environmental regulations allow regulated utilities to build new equipment, they will likely lead to higher earnings.

But some companies will suffer. For example, utilities in unregulated states that are unable to pay for upgrades themselves and cannot benefit from higher prices won't be able to offset the cost of the equipment.

Similarly, if state regulators refuse to allow utilities in their state to pass the cost of the upgrades or new plants to customers, those companies could suffer too.

The industry also argues that higher prices could also lead to lower power demand and profit.

First Energy chose to close plants that likely would have been unable to operate under the new rules on toxins.

These plants are generally older and inefficient, so installing emissions control equipment would have cost the company too much money.

These plants were already seldom used, so by closing them the company does not stand to lose much power from the small amount of power they generated.

But in the markets First Energy operates, plants earn money two ways: by selling power, and by making power plants available for use during peak periods, even if they are never actually needed.

With the closure of four plants in Ohio, there will be less power available to meet demand. That is expected to drive prices for capacity higher.

"First Energy's nuclear plants and base-load coal plants with environmental controls are the primary beneficiaries of the EPA rules," says Hugh Wynne, an analyst at Sanford Bernstein.

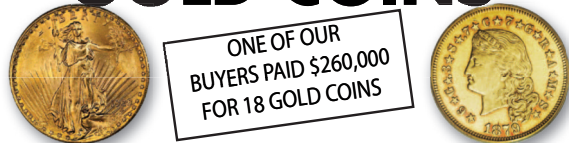

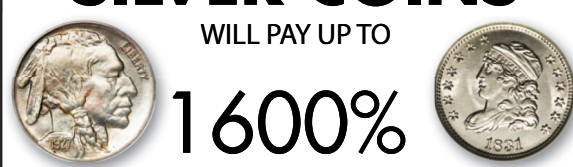

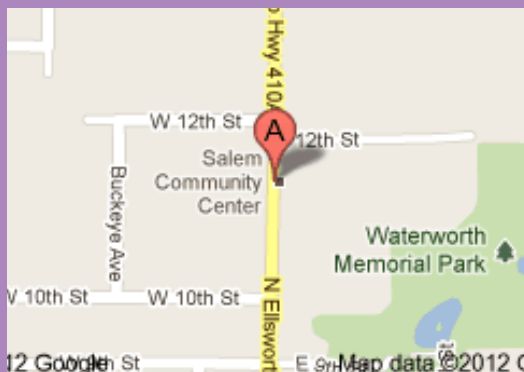

Returning to his roots

Ex-Ohio State coach hired by Akron as vice president of strategic engagement

AKRON — Through it all, Jim Tressel never lost his charm. As he

worked the room the way he did for a decade as Ohio State's coach, delighting students and faculty members, school trustees and Akron's president with stories of past successes and plans for the future, Tressel felt like he had come back home. "This," he said, "is a second chance."

Tressel is back on campus. He's starting over where he began. Tressel,

forced to resign in disgrace last May amid a cash-for-tattoos scandal at Ohio State that toppled the football powerhouse, was introduced Thursday as Akron's new vice president of strategic engagement, — a position created just for him.

Tressel, who started his coaching career as an undergraduate assistant for the Zips in 1975, will earn a base salary of \$200,000 per year, more than \$3 million less than he made during the last 10 years guiding the Buckeyes. Tressel will begin his new job on May 1. "I feel fortunate that I got this opportunity," Tressel said following a packed news conference on campus unlike any in the

Brady: Avoiding trouble is no secret

Giants set to bring big time pass rush

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — It's no secret how to stay out of trouble against the New York Giants.

Doing it, however, is another matter.

The Giants have perhaps the best pass rushers in the NFL, a group Brady knows all too well. He absorbed five sacks and was hit nine times when the New England Patriots lost to the Giants 17-14 in the Super Bowl four years ago. Brady was only sacked twice when the teams met Nov. 6, but one of those miscues resulted in a Giants touchdown one play later.

"This team has a very good pass rush. I've seen it game after game," Brady said Wednesday. "They can get to the quarterback. They can hit the quarterback. They can force the quarterback into some bad decisions and some bad throws."

Tribe, Kotchman agree to 1-year deal

Indians hope to have found new first baseman

CLEVELAND (AP) — After exploring other options and coming up empty this winter, the Cleveland Indians may have finally found their new first baseman: Casey Kotchman.

The team agreed to terms Thursday night on a one-year, \$3 million contract with Kotchman, a free agent, two people familiar with the negotiations told the Associated Press. The sources spoke on condition of anonymity because the deal is not expected to be announced until Friday. Kotch-

man can make an additional \$1.75 million in performance bonuses, one of the persons said.

Kotchman batted a career-best .306 with 10 homers and 48 RBIs in a career-high 146 games for Tampa Bay last season. It was a breakout year for the 28-year-old, who signed a minor league contract with the Rays last January. Kotchman was one of only three AL first basemen — Detroit's Miguel Cabrera and Boston's Adrian Gonza-

Daly one off pace at Qatar

Last time J.D. played he stormed off course in Australia

DOHA, Qatar — Gonzalo Fernandez-Castano birdied his last three holes for a 6-under 66 at the Qatar Masters, overcoming wind and blowing sand to lead John Daly by a shot after the first round on Thursday.

Daly (67) was followed by K.J. Choi (68) and Jason Day (68). Six players, including 1999 British Open champion Paul Lawrie and Nicolas Colpaert, were three shots off the pace.

Martin Kaymer (71) and Sergio Garcia (72) were in contention, but about two-thirds of the field shot over par, including defending champion Thomas Bjorn (79).

"It just happened," Fernandez-Castano said with a smile. "It was such a difficult day that you didn't have any expectation going out there. Every shot was difficult. Every shot, you had to be 100 percent focused. That is probably what kept me in the game."

The Spaniard, winner of five European Tour titles, holed several putts of more than 20 feet on his way to nine birdies to go along with three bogeys.

He played his best golf on the back nine, bouncing back from a bogey on 13 to make four birdies on the final five holes.

"I think the key was holding the putt on 16th," Fernandez-Castano said. "I hit the green with my 3 wood. The first putt was very poor, left it 3 meters (10 feet) short of the hole and managed to hole that one. You never know, maybe I missed that one and your momentum disappears."

"But I holed that one and hit a lovely shot on the next, holed the putt and then had a lovely drive on the last ... I had a tricky bunker shot and holed the last putt."

Daly benefited from milder conditions in the morning when gusts of up to 22 mph died down for sev-

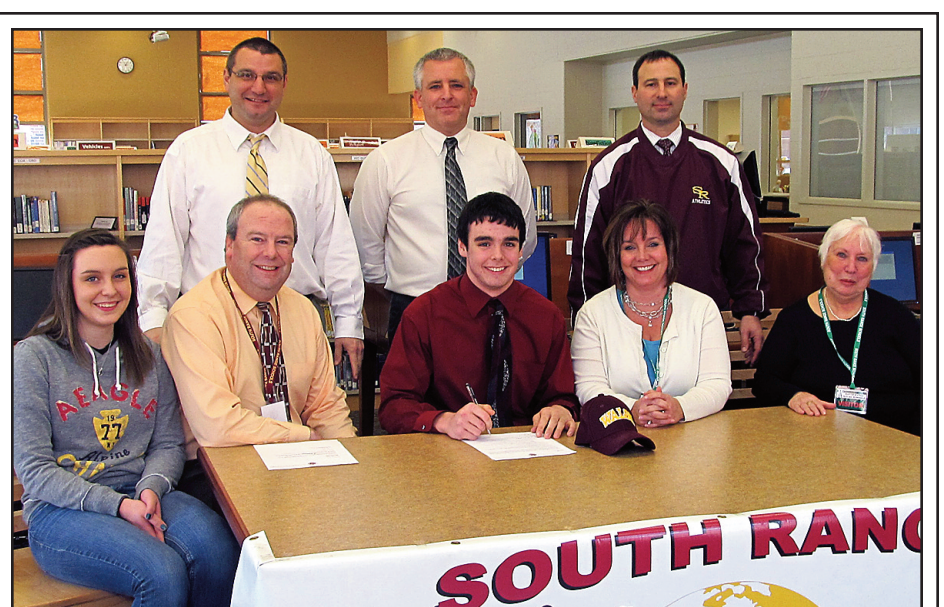

school's history. "It's going to be a fun one."

In his new position, Tressel, who said he has no interest in coaching in the NFL, will work with Akron's students, alumni and community organizations on a variety of issues. Although he's not officially on the clock, Tressel met with student leaders before the news conference, telling them he was committed to using his Northeast Ohio connections to build relationships between the school and community.

"The first thing I've got to do is listen and learn," said

Tressel, who helped Akron in its search for a new football coach. "I'm just on the team."

Tressel, 59, is not permitted to have any direct involvement with the school's athletic department, one of the conditions of the five-year, show-cause sanction he was given by the NCAA following its investigation into the Ohio State mess.

NCAA spokesperson Stacey Osburn confirmed Tressel will not be allowed to have contact with recruits if he is not a "countable coach."

However, Tressel's name alone is sure to give Akron, with an enrollment of 29,000 and plans to grow to 40,000 students, a major boost in name recognition

and his presence will certainly help in recruiting athletes and other students.

"It's exciting," Dan Cooper, a 20-year-old senior from Wadsworth, Ohio said as he browsed his Twitter and Facebook accounts while taking a break in the student union. "He's a big famous name and I think he's going to bring a lot of positive attention to Akron despite all the negative things that happened the last few months at Ohio State."

"Everyone is excited around campus right now."

Tressel earned his master's degree at the school in 1977.

"Life is about who you are and who you are with," he said. "It's always important

where you can come back to the place that gave you your first chance."

Akron president Luis M. Proenza said he had no misgiving about his decision to hire Tressel, who remains popular in his home state.

"Look at the man. Look at what he has done," Proenza said. "Look at the thousands of lives he has impacted. We knew that was the asset. The opportunity. And we wanted that to be available. There was no question in my mind that for the university, for the community, for Northeast Ohio, for the 30,000 students at Akron, this will make a difference."

Proenza said Tressel was very helpful in the school's coaching search, which re-

sulted in the Zips hiring former Auburn coach Terry Bowden.

Since then, Tressel and Proenza remained in contact, discussing the possibility of joining forces.

"Our vision for student success was exceptionally aligned," Proenza said.

Accompanied to the news conference by his wife, Ellen, Tressel wore a navy blue blazer and gold tie — Akron's colors — with a logo of Zippy, the school's Kangaroo mascot. Tressel was typically smooth as he answered direct questions regarding his role in Ohio State's fall.

Tressel said he has no regrets, but he did acknowledge wishing he had handled some things differently.

Ryan Palmer leads Phoenix Open

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Ryan Palmer was back in his comfort zone with his trusted old putter model in the first round of the Phoenix Open.

"I pulled it out of the garage and was putting in my living room, then went outside in the backyard on my putting green, and I knew it was time to bring it back out," the three-time tour winner said.

Holing seven birdie putts from 10-15 feet, Palmer finished off a 7-under 64 at dusk to take the lead Thursday in the suspended first round.

Palmer switched back to the Odyssey putter after missing the cuts in his previous starts this year in the Sony Open and Humana Challenge.

"I used the exact same putter the last two years, and of course had two of the best years of my career," he said. "But toward the end of the year last year, around the BMW, I just got frustrated with not making anything, so I thought I'd try something different, put a similar style head in play and actually had some success."

"But my first two weeks out here I could tell I wasn't comfortable when I'd get over the short putts."

Webb Simpson was a stroke back on the Stadium Course at TPC Scottsdale.

"It's one of those courses that just fits your eye well," said Simpson, the highest-ranked player in the field at No. 6.

The start of the round was delayed an hour because of frost, and play was suspended because of darkness at 6:05 p.m. with 42 players unable to finish. Last year, frost and frozen greens delayed play nine hours during the week, forcing a Monday finish.

"I knew I was going to be here in the morning for the second round, so I wasn't worried about it if we had to come back and restart," Palmer said. "So, I didn't think about it and I just kept hitting shots and sticking to my game plan."

Palmer had 27 putts and hit 16 of 18 greens in regulation. He birdied the par-5 15th after his drive landed in the middle of the fairway and rolled left into the water, and saved par on the short par-4 17th after also driving

into the water. "To make birdie there (15) after hitting it in the water, and then I get up on 17 and do the same thing, hit it in the water," Palmer said. "I guess you could say I left a couple out there, but it was a great day for sure."

He was 8 under after a birdie on No. 6, but had his lone bogey on No. 7, then finished the round with pars in Nos. 8 and 9.

Jarrold Lyle, Harrison Frazar, Derek Lamely, Kevin Na and Chez Reavie were two strokes behind at 66, and Bubba Watson, Jason Dufner and Spencer Levin also were 5 under. Watson and Levin had three holes left.

Dufner, a playoff loser last year, had five holes remaining.

Kyle Stanley opened with a 69, four days after a devastating loss in the Farmers Insurance Open. On Sunday at Torrey Pines, he made a triple-bogey 8 on the final hole of regulation and lost to Brandt Snedeker in a playoff.

"It was just good to be out there," Stanley said. "It was almost therapeutic."

He received warm cheers and words of encouragement from the fans.

"I'm kind of overwhelmed

by it," Stanley said. Phil Mickelson had 24 putts in a 68, and defending champion Mark Wilson, coming off a victory two weeks ago in the Humana Challenge, was 1 under with two holes left.

"I feel so good with the putter," said Mickelson, the former Arizona State star who won the tournament in 1996 and 2005.

"It's been a little while. It's been a few years since the guys out here have seen me putt like this."

Mickelson played alongside Dustin Johnson and the green-clad Rickie Fowler in a morning group that attracted the largest gallery in the estimated crowd of 77,053.

Fowler holed out from 68 yards for birdie on the par-5 15th after hitting his second shot into the water in front of the green.

"As soon as I hit it, I knew it was how I wanted to hit it," Fowler said. "It skipped behind the hole, and I could see it spinning right down the stick."

Fowler shot a 69, and Johnson had a 68.

Simpson had five birdies in a six-hole stretch, capped by a 9-iron bunker shot to inches on the second hole after his drive drifted right

eral holes. The two-time major winner shot bogey-free golf, including five birdies.

Some players said they have faced windier conditions, especially in England

and Scotland. But what made the Doha course so challenging was the strong winds were kicking up sand from the surrounding desert.

Balls were difficult to track off the tee because of lower visibility and sand was getting into their hair, eyes and everything else.

"I know what wiener schnitzel feels like, because I'm pan-fried," Fernandez-Castano joked.

Lee Westwood, who missed the cut last year, said he was just happy to break par.

"71 felt like a good score," Westwood tweeted. "Left a few out there but have a very smooth completion on the plus side! Sandblasted!"

Several big names fared worse and were in danger of missing the cut, including Ryder Cup player Ross Fisher, who finished with a 9-over 81, Bjorn at 7 over and Robert Karlsson, who shot 78.

Choi (68) said the key to his bogey-free round was the way he and caddie Steve Underwood were able to predict the gusts.

Ailing Gronkowski returns to Patriots practice

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Rob Gronkowski is practicing again with the New England Patriots.

The All-Pro tight end recovering from a high sprain in his left ankle participated on a limited basis Thursday, his first practice for the Super Bowl since being injured Jan. 22 in the third quarter of the AFC championship victory over the Baltimore Ravens.

He wore a removable boot for a week before discarding it Monday. Teammates had expressed confidence that he would be ready for the game against the New York Giants on Sunday.

Gronkowski, who set an NFL single-season record for tight ends with 17 touchdown catches, missed two practices last week and two more Monday and Wednesday. The Patriots did not practice Tuesday.

Mickelson sues to find source of 'defamation'

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Phil Mickelson filed a lawsuit against an Internet service provider in Canada to learn the identity of a person who has been posting "vexatious statements" that the four-time major champion says is a deliberate attack on his reputation.

"I'm all for freedom of speech, but I won't tolerate defamation," Mickelson said Thursday after his opening round in the Phoenix Open.

In his lawsuit against Videotron S.E.N.C in Quebec Superior Court, Mickelson cited comments posted on Yahoo! Sports from Nov. 11 to Nov. 12, in which one or more persons under the pseudonyms "Fogroller" and "Longitude" make statements that allege, among other things, that Mickelson's wife had an affair and that he fathered an illegitimate child.

Mickelson says he is a victim of defamation. He is asking the court to force Videotron to identify the person so Mickelson can "stop the dissemination of false and wrongful statements ... and obtain reparation for the prejudice already suffered."

The motion was filed in Montreal on Jan. 25. Mickelson attorney Glenn Cohen said Videotron did not oppose the request for subpoena, and he expects the information shortly.

Whether the case has wider implications for anonymous postings on the Internet is not Mickelson's concern.

"If we can stop one person, then it's one less person who can get away with this," Cohen said. "Maybe it will have a chilling effect. I don't know. If other people are victims of this and want to take up the mantra, that's fine. It was a very narrow decision Phil and I made to discover this person's identity and stop it."

Mickelson first filed a complaint Nov. 21 in San Diego County superior court, which authorized him to subpoena information from Yahoo! Inc. That led to identifying "Fogroller" as a Montreal resident, with Videotron as the Internet provider.

Mickelson wants the Quebec court to demand that Videotron supply him with all information of the person using the Internet protocol address who first registered under the "Fogroller" pseudonym on Dec. 16, 2008, and of the person using the IP address that posted the statements about him.

The person was using an email address of fogroller(at)yahoo.com at the time of registration. An email sent to this address by The Associated Press was returned as undeliverable.

Feds in NY shut down 16 sports streaming websites

NEW YORK (AP) — With the Super Bowl days away, federal authorities announced a crackdown Thursday on websites that stream unauthorized broadcasts of sports events just hours after New England quarterback Tom Brady told reporters in Indianapolis that he watched last year's game on an illegal site.

Investigators seized 16 sites and brought criminal charges against a Michigan man who controlled nine of them.

U.S. Attorney Preet Bharara warned sports fans in a release that piracy costs sports leagues and broadcasters millions of dollars, forcing increases in ticket prices and other costs to consumers.

His message came soon after Brady casually mentioned his own use of illegal websites during a news conference staged in preparation for the Super Bowl on Sunday between the New England Patriots and the New York Giants.

"Last year I was rehabbing my foot in Costa Rica, watching the game on an illegal Super Bowl website. And now I'm actually playing in the game. So, it's pretty cool," Brady said.

Web operator Yonjo Quiroa, of Comstock Park, Mich., was charged Wednesday with copyright infringement. Prosecutors said he distributed football, basketball and hockey games and wrestling matches.

Lee leads Australian Masters after 1st round

GOLD COAST, Australia (AP) — Lee Bo-mee of South Korea shot a 7-under 65 on Thursday to take a one-stroke lead in the Australian Ladies Masters.

U.S. Open champion So Yeon Ryu, the early leader, was a stroke back on 66 at Royal Pines with fellow-South Korean Hee Kyung Seo and Christel Boeljon of the Netherlands.

American teenager Lexi Thompson had five birdies in an error-free round to sit two strokes off the pace with England's Felicity Johnson, and Australians Nikki Campbell and Stephanie Na.

The 16-year-old Thompson became the youngest LPGA Tour winner last year, taking the Navistar LPGA Classic in Alabama in September. She also won the Ladies European Tour's Dubai Ladies Masters in December.

Lee was a six-shot runner-up to Karrie Webb in the 2010 Masters. "Driving good, irons good, putting good. Easy, easy day," she said through an interpreter.

Ryu, who teed off from No. 10, said she felt the weight of expectation after her major win.

"The first few holes I was very nervous as it is my first tournament of the year," she said. "But on the 12th hole I made a nice birdie putt so I could finally relax."

Thompson played with 14-year-old New Zealand amateur Lydia Ko, who became the youngest winner of a professional golf tour event Sunday when she won the women's New South Wales Open by four strokes.

3 players disqualified for breaching lift rules

GOLD COAST, Australia (AP) — Three players were disqualified from the Australian Ladies Masters on Friday for unknowingly breaching rules on preferred lies.

A rules official from the co-sanctioning Ladies European Tour said Australians Corie Houle and Inhong Lim and Australian-based South Korean amateur Annie Choi were disqualified after playing one hole of their second round.

The players, who were in the same group, said they had misinterpreted a local ruling during their first round which allowed preferred lies on fairways but not in the rough.

Choi had an opening-round 2-under 70, five strokes behind first-round leader Lee Bo-mee. Lim shot 80 and Hou 81.

Gift of organ donation priceless

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I would like to take organ donation a step further and donate my body to science. If any part of me can help find a cure for a disease or help someone live longer, I will have been of some use to my fellow human beings. Furthermore, it would save my family the expense of a funeral. How do I go about setting this up? — **D.C.**

ANSWER: I believe you mean you would like all usable organs to be donated for use in others. For this, you deserve kudos. You can learn all the facts you need by visiting the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services at <http://organdonor.org>.

The site has you select your home state. You will then be put on that state's donor registry. The United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) contracts with the Department of Health to maintain a central network, open all hours and all days. It facilitates the identification of a suitable donor for a suitable recipient. A hospital with a donor alerts the local Organ Procurement Organization, and a representative immediately visits the hospital to see if the donor organs are acceptable. You or your family doesn't have to do a thing. Enrolling with the Department of Health is all you need to do.

You deserve a pat on the back. If more people were like you, the desperate deficit of organs would not exist. Age is not an impediment to donation. Neither are most illnesses. You do need to emphasize to your relatives your desire, and having it put on your driver's license also helps.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am an 80-year-old woman who has been diagnosed with collagenous colitis.

I have been treated with sulfasalazine, but had to discontinue it because of side effects. I am now taking cholestyramine. It helps some. What do you think of Imodium? I really need a stable treatment. — **J.P.**

ANSWER: Just about everyone has heard of colitis. It's inflammation of the colon. It's a word that applies to many different illnesses.

Just about no one has heard of collagenous colitis. "Collagenous" indicates that beneath the lining surface of the colon, an excessive amount of collagen has been deposited. Collagen is a protein found throughout the body. It provides firmness and strength to many tissues. Think of it as support tissue, like the girders of a building but with much more flexibility than girders have.

Why the excess of collagen has formed in the colon is an unanswered question.

Chronic, watery diarrhea is the main sign of this illness. Middle-aged and older women are the ones most likely to come down with it. For every man with it, nine women have it.

When a doctor inspects the colon with a scope, the doctor sees no changes. Everything looks normal. However, a biopsy of the colon demonstrates its invasion with too much collagen.

Sulfasalazine, bismuth subsalicylate (Pep-to-Bismol) and mesalamine are some of the medicines used for treatment. Imodium (loperamide) is another. Sure, you can try any of these, including Imodium. You must first consult your doctor.

If none of the above brings about a response, then the cortisone medicine prednisone is prescribed.

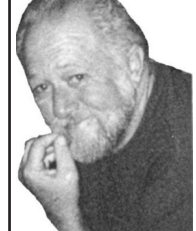

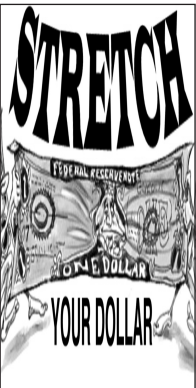

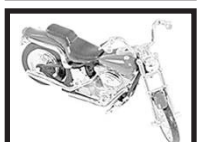
