

Kasich: Drilling, care of environment compatible

STEUBENVILLE (AP) - Ohio doesn't need to choose between a developing shale energy industry and a clean environment, Gov. John Kasich told state lawmakers in his State of the State address Tuesday at a top-performing school.

"You cannot degrade the environment the same time you're producing this industry. It is not acceptable," the Republican governor said.

Kasich's comments were meant to comfort residents in eastern Ohio, where his speech was delivered, who stand to gain from the region's growing oil and gas drilling industry - but who also have con-

A seismologist working for the state has linked a Christmas Eve earthquake in Youngstown, about 50 miles north of

Steubenville, to deep injection disposal of drilling wastewater. The region has experienced 11 quakes in the past year.


Tensions are high on the issue. Practically the first words Kasich spoke on the subject Tuesday on the developing shale industry were jeered by some members of the balcony audience who were escorted out.

"Hey, Steubenville, let 'em know what you think of disruptions," Kasich said — prompting a round of supportive applause.

Kasich said he was committed to environmentally safe oil and natural gas development and said he was confident in the responsible outlook of major drillers.

"The biggest companies know that you need to have tough environmental rules," Kasich said.

Ohio official tours **Fleming** House

LISBON - A member of Gov. John Kasich's cabinet visited town Tuesday after watching the governor deliver his State of the State address earlier in the day in nearby Steubenville.

Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services Director Orman Hall toured the Fleming House, an alcohol/drug tional residence for woman and their children. Hall said when Kasich was preparing to deliver the speech in Steubenville, he told his cabinet directors to find a local program of excellence to spotlight, "and I thought of the Fleming House."

Hall said Fleming House, which is run by the Family Recovery Center, and the Columbiana County Mental Health and Recovery Board is recognized as operating among the premier sub-

stance-abuse programs in the state.

The rise in opiate addiction – prescription painkillers – is the biggest substance-abuse problem facing Ohio. In 1997, seven opiates were prescribed for every Ohioan, but by 2010 the figure had skyrocketed

In Columbiana County, the number of deaths by accidental opiate overdose has tripled from 0.89 per 100,000 residents in 2000 to 2.78 by 2008. The number of clinic patients with opiate addictions has more than doubled, from 1.8 percent in 2001 to 4.2 in 2009.

While the problem is much worse in southern

Ohio, Hall said every county is affected, and then he highlighted some of the Kasich administration's twoprong approach to address the epidemic, such as cracking down on so-called "pill mills" while continuing to focus on treatment.

Preliminary data for 2011 showed the rate of opiate prescriptions per person dropped last year, "so we have seen a decrease," said Eric Wandersleben, communications manager for Hall's department.

Several past and present residents of the Fleming House addressed the gathering, and each told about how the program saved their lives and the lives of their children in almost every sense.

"Hi, my name is Amy and I'm an alcoholic. When I came to this home I was a broken person, but this program works," said Amy, who is now in college.

Another Amy spoke of how her child was taken from her because of her drug addiction and officials wanted to put her up for adoption. Amy said she had gotten her life together at the Fleming House, and now she is scheduled to be reunited with her daughter.

"I have a beautiful home now and my daughter has a bedroom," she said.

Former employee complains of improper comments by Brown

Columbiana County Recorder Craig Brown has again been accused of making improper comments, this time by a former employee who filed a complaint with county commissioners.

The employee, whose first name is Regina, was hired in the fall by Brown as a temporary worker to help process paperwork related to the avalanche of oil and gas leases being recorded. She provided commissioners with hand-written complaints about Brown, copies of which were obtained following a public records request.

The three complaints were dated between Oct. 28 and Nov. 11, although the latter was Veterans Day, when the county courthouse would have been closed.

Regina declined to be interviewed for this story, but according to her Oct. 28

complaint, she was working when Brown walked in and three times called her "Ragina," with the second syllable rhyming with a part of the female anatomy. Her name is pronounced Ruh-jean-uh.

"I was humiliated. There was a roomful of men and it was embarassing. I told him to quit calling me that and I didn't appreciate it," she said in her complaint, adding she was concerned about being fired before her time was up because she wanted the extra money for Christmas.

She said it happened again on Nov. 4 in front of a title searcher working for DPS Penn. She said Brown grabbed the lever on the office chair she was sitting in, causing the seat to drop, and then called her "Ragina" when she said something to him. "I told him he was unprofessional and immature, which resulted in him calling me 'Ragina' again," she said.

At this point, she said she spoke with commissioners Jim Hoppel and Mike Halleck about the incident, and the DPS Penn



Salem council takes up non-union wages ag

SALEM -City Council Tuesday night heard the first reading of a revised ordinance approving wage and salary increases for non-union employ-

Council offered no objections to Mayor John Berlin's veto of the previous ordinance, which addressed all positions including those not currently filled. The new ordinance addresses only the current employees not represented by a union and provides increases similar to what union workers received last fall, including wage increases of 4 percent in 2012, 3 percent in 2013 and 3 percent in 2014.

The second reading of an ordinance addressing fringe benefits for the non-union employees, increasing their health insurance premiums from 7 to 11 percent, was delayed until the next meeting so as to remain in line with the new wages ordinance.

In other business, council authorized Service/Safety Director Ken Kenst to advertise for bids for a 2006 Crown Victoria police cruiser, a 2008 Crown Victoria police cruiser and a 1998 Honda Accord which had been deemed excess property.

Council also authorized Berlin to apply for funding through the 2012 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program for an Ohio Community Housing

Improvement Program Grant, which is typically used to make improvements in low income areas of the city, according to Councilman K. Bret Apple.

Additionally, an ordinance amendment limiting the number of dogs or cats on a residential property to five each or combined, was given the first of three readings. Councilman Rick Drummond, who presented the amendment, noted that there will be no one grandfathered into the ordinance and residents will be given time to adhere to the new

Also at the meeting, a representative from Texas-based Cougar Land Services requested permission to conduct seismic testing at various sites in the city amounting to 530 acres. The testing is conducted for lease holders, including Chesapeake Energy, to determine where minerals are located underground, the representative said, and is part of a larger project encompassing 400 square miles from Alliance and Salem south to Summitville, Carrollton and Malvern. The company has been in contact with municipalities, including Perry Township and Columbiana County, for several months and is looking to begin the testing in the spring.

The city would receive \$3 per acre for a total of \$1,700 for the testing. The company will contact landowners and will offer reimbursement for any property

damage, the representative said.

As suggested by Utilities Superintendent Don Weingart, council elected to wait until its Feb. 22 meeting to make a decision so that the Utilities Commission, which has authority over several of the parcels, will have an opportunity to resolve some issues regarding the testing.

Council also recognized former Mayor Jerry Wolford, former Service/Safety Director Steve Andres and former council members Dennis Groves, Rita O'Leary and Mary Ann Dzuracky for their four years each service to the city from January 2008 through Dec. 31, 2011.

Columbiana's building code compliance questioned

COLUMBIANA - The state Department of Commerce has its eyes on the city.

Regina Hanshaw, executive secretary for the department's board of building standards, informed Bob Belding, assistant building and zoning inspector, in a letter in December the city is not in compliance with the state's residential building

According to the letter, the city needs to have a certified building department and certified personnel in order to enforce the 2006 Ohio residential building code City Council approved in 2009.

Council had approved an ordinance enforcing the code for inspections and approvals of one-, twoand three-family dwellings. The code does not apply to commercial or industrial buildings.

City Manager Keith Chamberlin presented the letter to Mayor David Spatholt and council on Tuesday and said it appears the commerce department got involved after someone voiced a complaint to state Rep. Craig Newbold.

He also said the person's identity is unknown at this point and presented a letter he drafted explaining his position on the matter.

"I do not want to go through the trouble of having a certified building department and certified personnel. It would not be cost effective to try to create such a system. Daniel Blasdell and Bob Belding feel if they make some minor changes to our ordinances, etc., that we can be in compliance," Chamberlin said.

Blasdell pointed out during the meeting that although the department cited the Ohio Revised Code in its letter claiming certification is needed, the ORC also states an exception to that rule.

According to the code, the building department and its employees are not required to be certified if they are not enforcing the state residential building code.

"In a couple of communities in which I am aware they have adopted a code that is exactly the same as state code but have adopted it as their own and have added things to it. Many small communities have local building issues that are written in their codes that are unique to their

community," Blasdell said.

Council must now decide whether to continue enforcing state code and require certification — with those costs involved — or remain autonomous, adopting and enforcing its own code.

Should council approve the latter, new legislation will need to be approved clarifying their intent, Blas-

Chamberlin said requiring certification is not "practical" since very few building permits have been issued over the last few years. Councilman Bryan Blakeman said

another alternative would be to have someone from Mahoning County perform building code inspections in

"Jeff Uroseva, (Mahoning County building inspector) said he would love to come down and talk to council ... it might be worth opening a door to have a conversation," he

The Mahoning department and its employees are state certified.

Blasdell, Spatholt and Chamberlin said they were in favor of hearing from Uroseva.

Last known WWI veteran Florence Green dies at 110

LONDON (AP) - Florence Green never saw the front line. Her war was spent serving food, not dodging bullets.

But Green, who has died at age 110, was the last known surviving veteran of World War I. She was serving with the Women's Royal Air Force as a waitress at an air base in eastern England when the guns fell silent on Nov. 11, 1918.

It was not until 2010 that she was officially recognized as a veteran after a researcher found her service record in Britain's National Archives.

Green died Saturday at the Briar House Care Home in King's Lynn, eastern England, two weeks before her 111th birthday, the home

Retired Air Vice-Marshal Peter Dye, director-general of the RAF Museum, said it was fitting that the last survivor of the first global war was someone who had served on the home front.

Pa. Senate OKs first fees on shale drilling

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) - Pennsylvania, the only major gas-producing state that does not tax the taking of natural gas from its soil, moved closer Tuesday to imposing a fee on the drilling in its vast Marcellus Shale reserves that has transformed the state in recent years.

The state Senate voted 31-19 in favor of fees that could raise \$180 million from the industry in the first year, while expanding regulations for the booming industry, including a requirement for online disclosure of chemicals used in hydraulic fracturing, or fracking. The measure, which could pass the House on Tuesday night, would fund road work and environmental cleanups and give local governments the power to impose the fees on their local

Opponents called it a giveaway to energy companies and said its environmental provisions were too weak.

"We could have built a little more certainty in this bill," said Sen. John Yudichak, D-Luzerne, who voted no. "I think Pennsylvanians deserve better than, 'maybe they'll have clean water, maybe they'll have clean air."

But Senate President Pro Tempore Joe Scarnati said the new regulations include a toughest-in-the-nation well bonding requirement, "more penalties for misbehaving producers," stream setback rules, a one-call system before drilling starts and the fracking chemical disclosure.

"These wells have impacted our environment, and people's lives in the region and beyond," Scarnati said.

Since 2008, Pennsylvania has been mobbed by energy companies anxious to reap the riches of the state's Marcellus Shale reserves, drilling at least 4,000 wells from southwest Pennsylvania in an arc that spans the state, from southwest to northeast. The gold rush has brought wealth to landowners and hundreds of jobs in economically depressed areas, but not without impact and controversy.

Some residents claim their drinking water supplies have been fouled, perhaps contaminated forever, by the fracking process that blasts millions of gallons of water, chemicals and sand deep into the earth to free natural gas from the dense shale rock, or by leaking methane

Tough choices on Ohio roads

Important highway construction projects in Ohio have been I pushed so far back on the state's schedule they might as well not be there at all. That is another in a series of caution lights for Buckeye State residents worried about maintenance of roads and bridges.

Ohio Department of Transportation officials previously had moved some big construction projects back on their schedule. Last week they all but parked some of them.

For example, plans to reconstruct sections of Interstates 70 and 71 originally were planned for implementation in 2014-16. Then ODOT moved the schedule back to 2025-33. On Tuesday plans were bumped even longer into the future, to 2026-34.

Obviously, the problem is money. Ohio doesn't have enough to handle highway and bridge needs. That already has affected day-to-day maintenance - and the problem will only grow

Like many other states, Ohio is suffering from newer cars that get better gasoline mileage. State and federal fuel taxes provide much of the money for road and bridge maintenance in most states, and they are calculated on a per-gallon basis.

In Ohio, the state tax is 28 cents per gallon. Last year Buckye State motorists bought 29 million fewer gallons of fuel than they did a decade ago. That translates to more than \$8 million less for road and bridge work.

Now is not the time to raise any tax in Ohio. Too many residents are struggling with their own household budgets. Recovery from the recession is just gathering steam.

As ODOT officials are suggesting, it may be some transportation network improvements will have to be postponed or shelved entirely.

Priorities will have to be set. A new study by the Brookings Institute suggests more ODOT spending ought to be directed to urban areas, with less going to rural regions of the state.

While legislators from big cities may welcome that approach, the state's highway system needs to be viewed as an integrated network in which roads through rural areas such as ours are just as important as those in the cities. Another concern is economic development. The burgeoning gas and oil industry here in East Ohio has infrastructure requirements that should not be dis-

That said, priorities will have to be set - as it seems ODOT is doing - to make scarce road and bridge funding go as far as

The cost of conscience

wo of the top news sto-Tries this past week have revolved around reproductive rights, though both raise far more troubling issues than a woman's right to contraception or abortion.

The more compelling questions concern a person's or an institution's freedom of conscience and the right to act upon one's moral beliefs without fear of intimidation and/or government

coercion.

Both cases — one involving the Catholic Church and the other, Susan G. Komen for the Cure deal with the ongoing conflict between the pro-life and pro-choice camps. And both are exposing the dangerous extent to which some pro-choice advocates, including the president of the United States, are willing to tread on fundamental freedoms in order to impose and secure ideological purity

To recap: Komen created a firestorm with its recent decision to stop donating about \$680,000 a year to Planned Parenthood. (On Friday, Komen released a statement noting that Planned Parenthood will be eligible for future grants, although they won't be guaranteed.) The money was supposed to be used for breast cancer screening. Most Planned Parenthood affiliates don't do mammograms but refer women elsewhere, sometimes reimbursing them using Komen funds.

Komen CEO and founder Nancy Brinker has offered a couple of reasons for the decision, including the preference to directly fund mammograms, but insists that it had nothing to do with politics or abortion. Not everyone is buying her varying explanations, especially critics who point to Komen's senior vice president for public policy, Karen Handel, a well-known GOP pro-lifer. A former Georgia secretary of state, Handel lost her run for governor in part, ironically, because pro-lifers didn't see her as quite pro-life enough.

Whatever one believes about the motivation behind its decision, the larger point is that Komen has no binding responsibility to allocate any part of its \$93 million in grants to any organization. Komen is a nonprofit, free agent, and the good it has performed for millions of underserved women around the world is staggering.

Nevertheless, given the rabid response from abortion-rights supporters, you'd think Brinker and her organization were running puppy mills for soup vendors. Even if their real reason for ending funding is because they no longer want to be associated with an organization as politically controversial as Planned Parenthood – or even if because some of their potential donors want the relationship severed it is inarguably their right to change course.

Don't like it? Don't run in Komen's fundraising races. Don't buy a pink blender. Give directly to Planned Parenthood. In fact, both organizations have enjoyed a surge in donations since news of the break erupted. Note to fundraisers: Create an enemy, enjoy a bonanza.

On a far more serious level, Catholic institutions are under siege by the federal government vis-a-vis the Affordable Care Act, which requires nearly all employers to provide health insurance that covers contraception, including in some cases abortifacient drugs. The Obama administration insists these offerings are part of women's health and should be made easily available; Catholics, both liberal and conservative, feel these requirements are the edge of the wedge.

Essentially, the new law forces them to either forfeit their most fundamental beliefs or face prohibitive penalties — or close hospitals, schools and other charities, with catastrophic consequences for millions who depend them. For perspective, one in six patients in the U.S. is cared for in a Catholic

The Obama administration has given Catholics a year to adapt to the new rule, which is a laughably obtuse approach. The Catholic Church is a 2,000year-old institution that has faced more severe persecutions than a government mandate to provide funding for morning-after pills. But this politically inept and morally fungible step does reveal utter disregard for religious liberty.

The war is on. Nearly 150 bishops (almost 80 percent of dioceses) have spoken out against the Obama mandate. Catholic voters, who helped put Barack Obama in office (54 percent to 45 percent) in 2008, may not be with him this time. Even those who supported his 2009 Notre Dame commencement speech against the protests of other powerful Catholics are protesting now.

These immediate battles may be about abortion or contraception, but ultimately they are about whether we stand firm on our nation's core beliefs in freedom of conscience and religious liberty. The stakes could not be higher and, though surely political, the endgame shouldn't be about Republican or Democratic war spoils.

The fundamental question is: Who are we? As we individually search for the answer, we know this much: Coercion and intimidation are the tools of mobs and tyrants and have no place in this calculus.

Removing Planned Parenthood's fig leaf



Planned Parent-hood would appear to have won this latest skirmish in the abortion wars. The Susan G. Komen for the Cure foundation having first decided to withdraw future grants to the world's largest

abortion provider, quickly retreated under a barrage of accusations, complaints and threats.

No fewer than 26 Democratic senators signed a letter to Komen saying, in part that, "It would be tragic if any woman - let alone thousands of women - lost access to these potentially life-saving screenings because of a politically motivated attack. We earnestly hope that you will put women's health before partisan politics and reconsider this decision . . . '

Intoning that, "Politics have no place in health care," New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg made a \$250,000 matching grant to Planned Parenthood. Ever alert to the politically correct posture on everything, Bloomberg added, "Breast cancer screening saves lives, and hundreds of thousands of women

rely on Planned Parenthood for access

But the real firepower came from the press and the Internet. NBCs Andrea Mitchell bore down on Nancy Brinker, the foundation's founder, pressing her to admit that women's health would suffer as a result of the Komen board's decision. The decision was "all about politics," reported the Washington Post, and the Los Angeles Times editorialized that for "a long time Komen's name will be connected more with ugly politics than with pink ribbons."

The foundation caved under the pressure with all of the groveling its opponents could have wished for. "We want to apologize to the American public," said the group's press release "for recent decisions that cast doubt upon our commitment to our mission of saving women's lives . . . '

So, all together now, Planned Parenthood is all about saving women's lives, and any criticism of PP is "ugly poli-

Except that observers of events over the past week may draw other conclusions. They may notice that any criticism - even implied criticism - of PP leads to a full-dress onslaught by the liberal echo chamber. And they may detect a certain over eagerness on the part of PP to downplay their abortion

work. The Susan G. Komen decision elicited such a heated response because it threatened to remove the "women's health" fig leaf from PP. By now, everyone has learned that PP, its own claims notwithstanding, does not provide mammograms. It provides referrals for mammograms. Considering that about 80 percent of PP clients are under the age of 35, and only 5 percent of breast cancers are found in women under the age of 40, it is unlikely that PPs manual breast exams and referrals for further screening are medically signifi-

Mayor Bloomberg could surely find better recipients for breast cancer screening contributions.

Throughout the Komen imbroglio, PP circulated another misleading statistic that only 3 percent of PPs services involve abortions. As Charlotte Allen revealed in a 2007 Weekly Standard essay, that figure is, well, inventive. They arrive at that number by counting every service individually. When a client comes in for an abortion, she gets a pregnancy test (one service), a pelvic exam (second service), an STD test (third service), a breast exam (fourth service), a package of contraceptives (fifth service) and so forth. But calculated as a percentage of revenue generated, abortion accounts for about a third of PPs business.

And 1 of out 3 clients who walks into a PP clinic is there for a pregnancy test. A third of those go on to have abor-

Charlotte Allen drew attention to something else PP wants to obscure its dedication to providing confidential abortions, even to very young girls, which may be enabling statutory rape. A 14-year-old Cincinnati girl who was impregnated by her 21-year-old soccer coach was brought to a PP clinic by the coach. He paid for the abortion with his credit card. PP asked no questions.

Pro-life activist Lila Rose posed as a pregnant 15-year-old (she was a college student at the time) having a relationship with a 23-year-old. Together they visited two PP clinics in California pretending to seek an abortion.

No employee expressed concern at the ages of the young people, though a PP employee in Santa Monica advised Rose to "pick a birthday that works" so that the clinic would not have to report them to the police.

That's why the initial Komen decision was so potentially damaging and elicited such a furious response. Those mammogram referrals are window dressing for a business with plenty to



Dow approaches 13,000, maybe record

NEW YORK (AP) – It was just last summer that the Dow Jones industrial average shed 2,000 points in three terrifying weeks. Investors had a host of things to worry about, including the possibility of another recession.

Now the Dow is within reach of the rarefied 13,000 mark - a level it hasn't seen since May 2008, four months before the financial system almost came apart.

A strong one-day rally — caused by a deal on bailout money for Greece, perhaps, or an unexpectedly positive economic report — could put it over the top.

What's more, the average is just a 10 percent rally from an all-time high. And 10 percent rallies can happen fast

The stomach-turning summer is a bad memory. Europe appears to be getting its act together, last summer's downgrade of the U.S.' credit rating was quickly forgotten, Washington is mostly behaving, and recession fears are

Greek debt talks drag, banks see progress

ATHENS, Greece (AP) - Greece's private creditors signaled progress late Tuesday in a bond-swap deal but crucial debt negotiations over another round of austerity measures dragged into another day.

The talks came after more than 20,000 protesters marched through central Athens as unions called a general strike against the new job cuts and tax hikes. The strike halted trains and ferries, closed down schools and banks and put state hospitals on short staffing. Several hundred protesters clashed with riot police outside Parliament and set fire to a German flag.

Greek Premier Lucas Papademos delayed a meeting with his coalition parties till Wednesday, staying in talks until late in the night with top bank negotiators as well as with debt inspectors from the European Union and the International Monetary Fund.

No cigar: Embargo on Cuba turns 50

HAVANA (AP) - When it started, American teenagers were doing "The Twist." The United States had yet to put a man into orbit around the Earth. And a firstclass U.S. postage stamp cost 4 cents.

The world is much changed since the early days of 1962, but one thing has remained constant: The U.S. economic embargo on communist-run Cuba, a near-total trade ban that turned 50 on Tuesday.

Supporters say it is a justified measure against a repressive government that has never stopped being a thorn in Washington's side. Critics call it a failed policy that has hurt ordinary Cubans instead of the government.

All acknowledge that it has not accomplished its core mission of toppling Fidel and Raul Castro.

Glencore, Xstrata agree to merger

LONDON (AP) — Anglo-Swiss mining group Xstrata PLC announced plans Tuesday to merge with commodities trading giant Glencore International PLC in a deal that will create the world's fourth largest natural resources group.

The combined company, to be called Glencore Xstrata with a combined market value of \$90 billion, will control a chain of businesses from mining to refining, storage and shipping of basic commodities like coal, copper and corn.

The new group would be the world's largest producer of thermal coal - which is used to fire power stations as well as becoming major a force in the mining and production of copper, used in electronic cables, and other metals including ferrochrome, a key ingredient in the production of stainless steel.

Bernanke sticks with low-rate policy

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ben Bernanke on Tuesday reiterated the Federal Reserve's plan to hold interest rates near record lows until at least late 2014.

The Fed chairman stuck with the three-year time line at a Senate Budget Committee hearing, even after the government last week reported a surge in January hiring that drove the unemployment rate down to a three-year low.

None of the senators asked Bernanke whether the encouraging job figures were reason enough for the Fed to rethink holding interest rates low for that long. And Bernanke didn't tout the hiring data during the two-hour

If anything, Bernanke maintained the Fed's position: the economy is improving at a frustratingly slow pace and that low rates are necessary to boost growth.

More states join foreclosure-abuse deal

WASHINGTON (AP) - Arizona and Florida, two of the states hit hardest by the housing crisis, will join a nationwide settlement over foreclosure abuses, officials with direct knowledge say. They will join more than 40 other states in approving a deal that would benefit many Americans who lost their homes or can't afford their mortgages.

Formal announcements could come within a week, according to the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to discuss the settlement publicly.

Arizona and Florida's involvement buoys hopes that a full 50-state deal is imminent.

Arizona Attorney General Tom Horne said he first wants to resolve a separate foreclosure-related lawsuit his state filed against Bank of America.

December borrowing rose by \$19.3B

WASHINGTON (AP) - Americans accelerated their borrowing in December for the second straight month, running up more credit card debt and taking out loans to buy cars and attend school.

Consumer borrowing rose by \$19.3 billion in December after a \$20.4 billion gain in November, the Federal Reserve said Tuesday. The two increases were the biggest monthly gains in a decade.

Total consumer borrowing is now at a seasonally adjusted \$2.5 trillion. That nearly matches the pre-recession borrowing level. And it is up 4.4 percent from the September 2010 post-recession low.

Chairman, 3 others out in Yahoo board shake-up

SAN FRANCISCO. (AP) - Yahoo Chairman Roy Bostock and three longtime board members are stepping down, submitting to the demands of many frustrated shareholders who blame them for not fixing the problems dragging down the Internet company's revenue and stock price.

The shake-up announced Tuesday continues a drastic makeover of Yahoo's leadership during the past month as the company negotiates to sell its Asian assets in a complex deal that could help ignite a long-promised turnaround.

After Yahoo hired former PayPal executive Scott Thompson as its CEO a few days into the new year, cofounder Jerry Yang resigned from the board and severed all other ties with the company, which he helped start in 1995.

Now Bostock is departing after four years as chairman. Many shareholders still blame him and Yang for squandering an opportunity to sell Yahoo to Microsoft Corp. in May 2008 for \$47.5 billion, or \$33 per share. Yahoo's stock hasn't traded above \$20 in nearly 3 1/2 years. The shares closed Tuesday at \$15.82, up by a penny. In extended trading after the announcement, the stock fell 4 cents to \$15.79.

In a move that will give Thompson an even cleaner slate as he tries to come up with a new strategy, Yahoo board members Vyomesh Joshi, Arthur Kern and Gary Wilson also agreed not to seek re-election at Yahoo's shareholders meeting this June.

Kern, a former radio station owner, has been on Yahoo's board for more than 15 years. Wilson, a former airline executive, has been a director since 2001, and Joshi, a Hewlett-Packard Co. executive, has been a director since 2005.

With the housecleaning, Yahoo will be left with seven directors, all of whom have joined the board since the end of 2009. That list includes the two latest directors appointed Tuesday: Alfred Amoroso, former CEO of TV listings provider Rovi Corp., and Maynard Webb Jr., a former eBay Inc. executive who most recently was CEO of LiveOps Inc., which helps to staff customer call centers.

Yahoo, which is based in Sunnyvale, Calif., said it is conducting a search for additional directors.

Bringing in new directors to work with Thompson will 'provide Yahoo with the expertise and perspectives necessary to drive innovation and growth," Bostock wrote in a letter Tuesday announcing his plans.

It could also avoid a potential shareholder mutiny. Hedge fund manager Daniel Loeb, who controls a 5.2 percent stake in Yahoo, had been threatening to nominate an alternate slate of directors if Yahoo didn't overhaul its board. In a blistering letter sent late last year, Loeb told Bostock and Yang that they should step aside. The window for nominating alternate candidates to Yahoo's board was scheduled to

Bostock became so unpopular among shareholders that nearly 40 percent of the votes were cast against his re-election in Yahoo's first annual meeting after Microsoft withdrew its takeover offer.

employee also spoke with Halleck. The DPS Penn employee believed to have witnessed the incident declined to comment for this story.

Three days later, Regina said Brown told her in private he could not have her treating him with disrespect and also denied ever calling her "Ragina" until she reminded him of the prior instances.

"Apparently, after your boss sexually harasses you, it's disrespectful to tell him that," she said.

In the complaint dated Nov. 11, Regina said she was making copies for Brown when he again called her "Ragina," and she reminded him she found the play on her name "rude and inappropriate."

Brown told a reporter he called her "Ragina" only once, saying he has a habit of coming up with nicknames for people, including employees, but he never associated the play on her name with anything offensive.

"That was certainly never my intent, in no way, shape or form," he said, noting sometimes Regina is pronounced that way, with one such example being the city of the same name in Canada.

When she expressed her displeasure with the nickname the first time he used it, Brown said he apologized and never called her by that name again.

"Obviously, if I upset someone I would never say it again ... I mispronounced her name jokingly. I did not mean it in a sexual connotation," he said.

Other than providing copies of the requested documents, commissioners declined to comment about the complaints. But former Commissioner Penny Traina who left office Dec. 31 to take a job in the private sector, said after they received the complaints they consulted the county personnel policy on how to proceed.

As a result, commissioners voted on Nov. 9 to designate their assistant clerk as the equal employment officer for the county. The EEO's job is to accept complaints of this sort and initiate the investigatory process in accordance with the personnel policy.

After this was done, Regina obtained an official complaint form from the EEO but failed to complete the form. She left the recorder's office on Jan. 10 after her stint as a temporary employee was up.

Traina said they believed this was the proper course given the uniqueness of the situation, since Brown is a fellow elected county official and not an employee. "No elected official works for the board of county commissioners. They are elected, and their boss is the taxpayers," she said.

Brown, who described Regina as a family friend, believed the matter was over after their initial discussion. "Gina and I talked about this in October and we discussed it, and we are fine, and she stayed on two to three months more without any incident," Brown said, adding he even asked her to stay on after her time was up but she declined because of another job commitment.

Brown said it would have made no sense for him to continue calling her by the nickname after she made her feelings known, especially since similar allegations were leveled against him in 2010 when he was in charge of the queen pageant for the Johnny Appleseed Festival in

Brown was accused by the mother of a contestant of making inappropriate comments in front of her daughter and the other queen candidates during a dinner held prior to the September 2010 event. Among other things, he allegedly asked a waitress several times how was her "anus." One of the dinner specials that night was Angus

He denied the accusations, and one of the people who came to his defense was Regina's daughter, a former festival queen. She had accompanied Brown to the dinner, and she said he did nothing wrong.

Brown said he knows Regina was encouraged to file the complaint and attributes it to politics since he is up for re-election this year and faces party opposition in the March 6 Democratic primary.

"A simple misunderstanding has been pushed way out of hand, and I believe the situation was pushed by somebody," he said.

Brown also questioned the commissioners' involvement. "I also understand we're 30 days from a primary. And I also know Mr. Halleck has been very aggressive against me in anything I've done, and I see Mr. Halleck's mentioned in these (complaints)," he said. Halleck and Hoppel are Republicans.

"I am very good at what I do and there is nobody out there who can legitimately criticize me on my record on what I've accomplished in that office. Nobody. And that's why things like this are being pushed forward," Brown said.

"They can't be complicated, they can't be over the top. but we need to have them because we can't have some yahoo come into this state and damage this whole industry because they are irresponsible," he said.

State Rep. Teresa Fedor, D-Toledo, said if the governor was serious about safe drilling, the Republican-controlled Legislature would be holding hearings on regulations. Democrats have introduced several bills that are stalled, including proposals to place a statewide moratorium on drilling as environmental effects are assessed and to require disclosure of chemicals used in the controversial drilling technique hydraulic fracturing, or fracking.

"We have the cart before the horse," Fedor said. "We have earthquakes that are happening."

Kasich said the initial results from the growing shale development in eastern Ohio are positive. "We've only had 36 wells drilled, but the good news is, looks pretty good," he said.

The governor called on lawmakers to help make sure colleges and universities are preparing the skilled workers that the shale industry needs. He said the industry promises great economic rewards for the state.

Jed Thorp, the Sierra Club's chapter conservation director in Ohio, criticized the governor for encouraging the in-

"The natural gas industry's path of destruction is clear and Ohio can't afford the polluted water and air that comes with it," he said in a statement. "Gov. Kasich today pledged strong regulations to protect Ohio's environment from fracking impacts. If the Governor were serious about protecting Ohio's air and water, these regulations would already be in place."

Struthers man convicted of theft of Rolex watch from Lisbon home

LISBON – A Struthers man was convicted of theft by a jury Tuesday for stealing a woman's ring and a Rolex watch while working for a company installing security cameras in a Lisbon area home.

Ryan M. Trimacco, 25, was sentenced by Columbiana County Common Pleas Judge Scott Washam to 18 months in prison, the maximum sentence, following the verdict. The jury came back in about 40 minutes with a decision of

According to Assistant Prosecutor John Gamble, the investigation of the county sheriff's department and the jewelry's owner, William "Tag" Lewis, Hunters Camp Road, pointed to Trimacco, who was left alone in the home while he was there working.

Gamble said in closing arguments Lewis was concerned about leaving Trimacco, whom he did not know, in his home on Jan. 7, 2011 when he had to leave to either pick up or drop off a family member elsewhere. Trimacco had only worked for the company, Buckeye Tech Alarm Systems, on

Trimacco was gone when Lewis returned. Lewis' longtime maid had arrived shortly before Lewis. When he came home he found the Rolex with diamond bezel missing when he came home.

Investigators found Trimacco was dropped off by another man at apartments near 4611 South Ave. in Boardman, which happens to be the apartment home of Douglas Stout. Lewis himself found that Stout, whom he did not know, sold the watch at Leslie's Precious Metals on Midlothian Boulevard in Youngstown by 6:30 the same evening. The watch, which Lewis had appraised at \$10,500, was sold for \$400.

Although Gamble admitted the evidence was mostly circumstantial, he also pointed out circumstantial evidence does not lie.

"If I show you a picture of Johnny sitting in the kitchen with an empty pizza box with cheese on his face and pizza sauce under his nails, what would common sense tell you," Gamble asked the jury. "The defendant sits here with pizza sauce all over his face with the imprint of a Rolex watch in the sauce."

Defense attorney Richard Hura gave the jury a list of other possibilities of who could have stolen the ring and watch during his closing arguments. He pointed out Lewis' son had had a drug problem and Lewis admitted his son had stole from him in the past. There was also the maid and another man there from the security company. Hura said it could even be Stout, who he implied could have climbed in through a window in one of the areas of the home where there were blind spots in the security camera.

Hura likened the evidence in the case to a connect the dots activity played with a child.

"When you connect the dots, it makes no sense at first, then you have clear picture," Hura said. "The circumstantial evidence does not give you a clear picture. The prosecution is asking you to make huge leaps."

Like Hura, Gamble pointed out he also could speculate someone else could have committed the crime.

"Maybe somebody came down the chimney," Gamble said, adding it could have been a Star Trek transporter that beamed someone into and out of the home with the watch also. "Reasonable doubt is not some possible doubt, some imaginary doubt. Your job is not to go in search of reasonable doubt. Your job is to decide if reasonable doubt exists."

Following the verdict and prior to sentencing, Gamble told Washam that Trimacco has a long criminal past, mostly in Struthers and Mahoning County. He presented a list of cases, including two felony convictions in 2010. Gamble said Trimacco's heroin use led to many of his property theftrelated convictions

"I need to go away for a while," admitted Trimacco before sentencing. "I need programs. I'm not scared to go back to prison. I'm afraid of this addiction and repeating same craziness."

His new 18-month sentence will run consecutive to his other sentences in Mahoning County.

Man pleads guilty to drug charge

Obama's inner geek: Robots to flying marshmallows

For a president who promotes technology at every opportunity, Barack Obama often strikes an awed, selfeffacing pose in the presence of technicians, scientists and high tech machinery.

"If I'm nodding, you should just assume that everything you said is going completely over my head," he once told winners of a New York science fair.

Still, he loves the stuff.

At no point has his inner geek been more evident than

on Tuesday as he mischievously - "The Secret Service is going to be mad at me about this" - helped fire an eighth-grader's award winning high-speed marshmallow air cannon at the drapes of the White House's elegant State Dining Room.

From factory floors to classrooms, from high-tech centers to the White House residence itself, Obama steeps himself in the innovative, sometimes feigning interest while at others showing genuine delight.

He dons safety goggles to tour manufacturing plants with state of the art equipment. He steps gingerly around scooting robots built by teenage engineers. And, like many a dad, he helps his daughters with their science projects, even dropping eggs from the White House's Truman Balcony to test the optimal soft landing.

To be sure, touring factories and schools is a staple of presidencies. But Obama, a Harvard University-trained lawyer, has placed greater emphasis on technology by making the point that in an era of scarce resources, government still must play a role investing in three key areas: research and development, innovation and education.

On Tuesday, Obama hosted the second White House Science Fair, an exhibit of more than 30 student projects that ranged from a system to detect nuclear threats to a prosthetic hand to portable disaster shelters. For nearly an hour, Obama toured the displays and visited with students, pressing them for details and admiring their work.

At factory or fair, Obama's reaction can range from bemusement to enchantment. The incongruity of some such moments is not lost on the president. Aides say he got a kick out of a New York magazine picture essay in 2010 depicting him in various factories, laboratories or workshops. The piece was titled "A History of Obama Feigning Interest in Mundane Things."

But he can also be im-

In October, as he saluted winners of the National Medals of Science and the National Medals of Technology and Innovation, Obama said: "It's safe to say that this is a group that makes all of us really embarrassed about our old science projects. You know, the volcano with the stuff coming out with the baking soda inside."

Robots figure prominently in Obama's catalog of impressive technological innovations. Over the past year he has been introduced to robots that perform tasks from simple retrieval to telecommunications. They often have names - Skrappy, Derp, Ned.

Ned, a sewer pipe inspection robot, was featured at the National Robotics Engineering Center at Carnegie Mellon University that Obama toured in June. "This is our guy we're gonna send into the sewer?" he asked. "He's sending back data as he's going through?"

"This is pretty cool," he concluded.

Robots were prominent during Tuesday's White House Science Fair too.


But nothing captured Obama's imagination more than Joey Hudy and his "Extreme Marshmallow Cannon."

"Let's try it out!" Obama declared, surprising aides and the handful of reporters who had gathered inside the State Dining Room for the tour. "OK, back up guys," Obama ordered. "This is a little impromptu."

Hudy, a precocious 14year-old from Phoenix who confidently explained the apparatus to the president, began compressing air into his cannon with a tire pump. "Need some help?" Obama asked. Hudy stepped aside and let the president prime the gun. With two hands, he gave a final push. "That good? All right, OK, here we go."

Hudy explained the trigger mechanism before firing. With a loud air gun whoosh, the marshmallow projectile struck the far upper corner of the room.

"It came out pretty fast!" the president exclaimed. Then, as if to assure everyone, he added: "It was safe."





Tiger offers solution to long putters

Says flat stick should be no longer than shortest club in bag

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. -Tiger Woods has a solution to long putters — make them no longer than



Pebble Beach National Pro-Am he has "never been a fan" of long putters that players either anchor into their belly or the broomstyle putters that are pressed

against the chest. "I believe it's the art of controlling the body and club and swinging the pendulum motion," Woods said. "I believe that's how it should be played. I'm a traditionalist when it comes to

Woods said he has spoken to Royal & Ancient chief executive Peter Dawson the last several years about how the language could be written in the Rules of Golf that effectively would ban such putters.

'My idea was to have it so that the putter would be equal to or less than the shortest club in your bag, Woods said. "And I think with that, we'd be able to get away from any type of belly anchoring." He said the putter still

could be anchored to the forearm, as two-time Masters champion Bernhard Langer once did.

Keegan Bradley became the first major champion to use a belly putter when he won the PGA Championship. Bill Haas used the same style when he won the Tour Championship to capture the FedEx Cup.

The belly putters gained momentum late last year with Bradley and Webb Simpson, who won twice late in the year and who nearly captured the PGA Tour money title. Both considered themselves good putters who felt as though anchoring the club to their stomach made them even

For years, most players believed only players who were desperate to improve used such putters.

Ernie Els once criticized the use of belly putters, but switched to one late last year and said: "As long as it's legal, I'll keep cheating like the rest of them."

Phil Mickelson also experimented with a belly putter during the FedEx Cup playoffs last year. He since has gone back to a more conventional putter.

The R&A and USGA, while making no formal announcement, have said they would review such putters. While it would seem simple

The Warriors are now 9-6 overall and 6-6 in the NBC. The Lions dropped to 5-10 and 5-7 in league play.





Springfield clinches share Ak

Tigers defeat Columbiana, clinch at least share of Inter-Tri County League Tier 1 crown

COLUMBIANA - Springfield's boys basketball team had been itching to win a



six years. In Tiger terms that's an eon.

Ron Rogers hit seventhree pointers on his way to a game-high 26 points as the Tigers clinched at least a share of Tier 1 of the Inter-Tri County League with a 63-35 victory over Columbiana on Tuesday.

Ohlin is part of a senior class of five which also includes Rogers, Nick Russell, Tom Mastran and Ryan Stacy.

"For the past four years we worked on bringing Springfield back up," Mastran said. "We wanted to be where they were in the past."

Springfield coach Eric Fender has been with the Tigers for four seasons and has seen the senior group

grow into a championship squad.

From wherever you come from in the area if you know anything about basketball, you know Springfield bas-ketball has been good bas-ketball," Fender said.

'I told the guys it has been six long years and that now we have at least a share of the ITCL title. I think that means something to them and it means something to us as coaches and it means something to the community.'

Rogers said the team was close last season, but just didn't do enough to get the job done.

"Last year we thought we had a good shot at it, but we had to scoreboard watch and it didn't go our way," Rogers said. "This year we just came out and won just about every

Rogers had no trouble in putting on a show against the Clippers. He scored 20 points in the first half (Columbiana only had 17 as a team at the break) and left the game at the end of the third quarter with 26 to Columbiana's team total of

"They're a really good team," Columbiana coach Jason Baker said. "In my opinion they have the player of the year in the league in Rogers. He showed it tonight. I thought we did a decent job of contesting shots, but good players

make good plays." Jake DeJong sparked the Clippers with 13 points. Eight of those came in the first quarter.



Todd Haley named Steelers offensive coordinator

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Steelers have named Todd Haley their new offensive

Haley, 45, will replace Bruce Arians, now with the Indianapolis Colts, and will inherit an offense that scored 325 points last season en route to finishing 12-4.

Haley was fired by Kansas City on Dec. 13, after going 19-26 in two-plus seasons with the Chiefs, leading them to the 2010 AFC West title.

He spent 10 seasons as an assistant before being hired by Kansas City. He was offensive coordinator for Arizona in 2007-08, helping lead the Cardinals to their only Super Bowl appearance. And he is the son of Dick Haley, who spent 44 seasons in the NFL including serving as the Steelers' director of player personnel from

The Steelers lost the AFC North title to Baltimore on a tiebreaker, and were eliminated from the postseason by Denver.

"I am excited about the opportunity to come back home and work for a tremendous organization," Haley said. "It is an honor to work with the Rooney family and coach (Mike) Tomlin and continue the success that has become synonymous with the Steelers. My father has so many fond memories both from his playing days and his time in the personnel department with the team, and I look forward to helping bring more championships to Pittsburgh and to being a part of one of the storied

The Chiefs were 5-8 when Haley was dismissed. His last game was a tough one. Kansas City lost, 37-10, to the New York Jets at the Meadowlands, and it was their fifth loss in six games. Kansas City committed 11 penalties for 128 yards in the performance, including a 15-yarder on Haley for unsportsmanlike conduct that may have sealed his fate.

The next day, he was fired.

"Timing in these situations is always difficult. There never seems to be a right time," Chiefs chairman and CEO Clark Hunt said at the time. "We just felt the inconsistent play the team has experienced throughout the season, including yesterday's game, made today the right day to do it."

Big Ten exploring 4-team playoff

(AP) — The Big Ten, which helped squash the notion of a four-team playoff to crown a national champion in college football several years ago, is taking another

"All of the Big Ten athletic directors are comfortable exploring the possibility of a four-team playoff," Michigan State athletic director Mark Hollis said Tuesday. "Four is better than two." Ohio State athletic director Gene Smith agreed and said the discussions stem from feedback "that we need to do something different," especially after the recent BCS title game between LSU and Alabama drew lower ratings that other championship games.

"The fans have been loud and clear," Smith said. "We also recognize that structurally there's things that we want to try and change with the bowl system — how teams get in the bowls. It's time to be curious about everything."

The BCS title game pits the nation's top two teams based on poll and computer rankings. The Chicago Tribune reported Monday that one of the ideas before the Big Ten would put the two semifinal games on the campuses of the higher seeded teams, and the national championship would be held in cities that bid for the hosting rights.

The so-called plus-one format — two semifinals plus the title game — was proposed in 2008 by the commissioners of the Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference. It was shot down by the leaders of the Big Ten, Pac-10, Big East, Big 12 and Notre Dame. The 11 Bowl Championship Series conferences have already met to discuss possible changes to the system starting in 2014.

NCAA President Mark Emmert has said he supports a four-team championship playoff and is strongly against a 16-team format.

Ohio high school coach Falknor hits 400 wins

(AP) — After his 400th career, win Ohio high school basketball coach Lyle Falknor said he's been blessed.

He clinched the milestone win last week with Sandusky St. Mary's 44-35 win over Port Clinton.

"It's a great honor and I'm happy to get there, although it may have taken a lot more time than I hoped," he said. "Winning 400 games means two things to me: I've been coaching a long time and I've been fortunate to have a lot of good athletes and players through the years."

Nearing the end of his 30th boys season, Falknor's record stands at 400-275 overall. SMCC is his fourth coaching stop. He began at Tri-County North (16-28) for two seasons, followed by a stop at Springfield Greenon for three seasons. He went 56-18 at the school with a state-runner up in Class AA during the 1985-86 season.

Falknor then moved on to Bellevue where he finished with a 296-180 record in 21 seasons with seven Northern Ohio League titles (including five straight) and five regional appearances in Division II. Falknor is 32-49 in his fourth season at

Caddies recall first Tiger shot that amazed

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) - It only took Mike "Fluff" Cowan one tournament as the caddie for Tiger Woods to see a shot he had never seen.

Joe LaCava had that moment in his third week working for Woods.

Cowan was the first caddie Woods hired when he made his professional debut in the 1996 Greater Milwaukee Open. He doesn't remember which round, or even what hole they were on, just the club selection off the

"It was his stinger, his 2-iron," Cowan said, looking around until he locked his eyes on the waist-high mesh around the practice green at Sherwood Country Club. "It didn't hardly get over that green net. But it stayed in the air forever. It went out there 270 yards or something. That was the one that got me.

"It was just a different kind of shot that I had ever seen anybody hit."

LaCava, hired by Woods in October, had spent plenty of time around the 14-time major champion during his 20 years on the bag with Fred Couples, with whom Woods often played.

Even so, a 3-wood on the par-5 15th at Royal Melbourne during the Presidents Cup got his attention, and a few weeks later, he still had trouble describing what he saw.

"He hit it such a way that it was trajecting like this," LaCava, using his hand to show a flat line with the slightest downward arc. "But it wasn't coming down. It wasn't rising, either. It's hard to describe. It was gaining speed, but it wasn't going up. That's when I thought, 'This guy is making the ball do somethina I've never seen anyone else do.' I had never seen a trajectory like this on a 3-wood, or any other shot.'

LaCava said the pin was cut in the front right portion of the green, and the ball finally stopped in the back left corner. The shot was into the wind, and in firm conditions, and he estimates it went just under 270 yards. Just then, Woods walked up on the discussion. And when he sensed the conversation

ending, he said, "Keep going," "Look at that little grin on his face," LaCava said. "He knows what I'm talking about. But he won't say anything about it."

Heloise's fudge recipe

Dear Heloise: I cannot locate my HELOISE FUDGE RECIPE. Could you please reprint it? I would appreciate it very much! — Renee B., via email

It's been a long time since this Heloise favorite recipe has been printed, so I am happy to oblige, Renee! To begin, gather the following

ingredients:

- 4 1/2 cups granulated white sugar
- 1 (12 ounce) can evaporated milk
- 3 (6 ounce) packages chocolate chips
- 1 (10 ounce) package mini- marshmallows 1/2 cup butter or margarine (regular, not any low-fat or diet type)
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 - 2 cups chopped nuts (optional)

Mix the sugar and milk in a large, heavy saucepan. Slowly bring the mixture to a rolling boil, and let boil for 7-8 minutes while stirring CONSTANTLY. Remove the pan from the heat, then add the chocolate chips, marshmallows and butter. Mix only until the chips and the marshmallows are melted (DON'T overmix). Next, add the vanilla extract and nuts (if using). Spread the mixture in a large, 13-by-9-inch ungreased pan. Let cool, and then you can enjoy this delicious fudge! — **Heloise**

Dear Heloise: I freeze/store my cookies in metal tins, which only allow for one layer. So much space in the tin is wasted, along with space in the freezer. Then I thought of this idea: I use the three-legged disc that you get in your delivered pizza. (Its purpose is to keep the box lid from smashing into the pizza.) I place two to four of these discs between the cookies on the bottom layer. I place a piece of tinfoil- covered cardboard, cut to the size of the tin, on the discs and put a second layer of cookies on. The best part is that the discs are free!

For round cookies (such as buckeyes), I freeze them on a cookie sheet, then transfer to freezer bags for storage. — I.M., Newton Falls, Ohio

COPD: No cure, many treatments



Dr. Donohue **DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My
wife was diagnosed
with COPD. She is
on medicines and has
been given lung tests
that confirm COPD.
Is there a cure? — **C.F.**

ANSWER: About 24 million Americans suffer from COPD, chronic ob-

structive pulmonary disease. Half of them have been diagnosed; the other half have its signs and symptoms but do not have a medical diagnosis. Two illnesses constitute COPD: emphysema and chronic bronchitis. The two are almost always seen together.

Emphysema is the destruction of the lungs' tiny air sacs, through which oxygen passes into the blood and carbon dioxide leaves it. The main sign of emphysema is shortness of breath when doing any kind of physical activity.

Chronic bronchitis is an inflammation and plugging of the airways (bronchi) with thick mucus. Air has difficulty reaching the lungs because of this obstruction. Cough with the expectoration of thick sputum is the primary sign of chronic bronchitis.

Cigarette smoking is the No. 1 cause of COPD. However, some people have never put a cigarette to their lips but have come down with COPD. People who have worked in places where the air is full of irritating dusts or fumes, people who must breathe air filled with pollutants, and those with inherited genes that make their lungs susceptible to airborne materials not destructive to most people are ones who develop COPD without having smoked. Repeated bouts of lung infections are another cause.

A cure is not on hand. Control of symp-

toms and slowing the progression of this illness are possible. Medicines that dilate the breathing tubes help air reach the lung with greater ease. Inhaled cortisone drugs soothe inflamed airways. And, when necessary, supplemental oxygen provides people with the oxygen boost they need.

Your wife needs a yearly flu shot to protect her lungs. She must report respiratory infections to her doctor so she gets prompt treatment to preserve lung function.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: After years of suffering from hip, back and knee pain, I happened to read on the Web that unequal leg length can be the cause. I put a quarterinch liner in my shoe on the short side, and relief was instantaneous. I'm really disappointed that medical providers had never checked me for this. One doctor I mentioned it to dismissed it out of hand. My simple solution saved me thousands of dollars. — **R.R.**

ANSWER: An inequality of more than two-fifths of an inch (1 cm) can lead to the kind of pain you had. The pain can occur on the side of the shorter or longer leg. A reliable measurement has to take place between the same landmarks on both legs. The two most used landmarks are the anterior superior iliac spine (just above the hip and on the side) and the medial malleolus, the bony projection on the inner side of the ankle. If you can't locate these two points, mark off two points at the same place on both legs. Your doctor can take a more exact measurement

Whatever Clifford decides, you must protect yourself financially in the interim. Make the necessary arrangements to manage on your own should that turn out to be the case. We also recommend you get some counseling to help you deal with the uncertainty of your situation and prepare for the possibility that your marriage is over. How long you are willing to stay in limbo is up to you, but don't feel pressured to rush into anything. Clifford may ask for a divorce, he might return to you, or you could get tired of waiting and want out.



Britain marks Charles Dickens' 200th birthday

LONDON (AP) - He wrote about life in the modern city, with its lawyers and criminals, bankers and urchins, dreamers and clerks. He created characters still known to millions — Ebenezer Scrooge and Tiny Tim, Pip and Miss Havisham, Fagin and Oliver Twist. And it made him a star, mobbed by fans on both sides of the Atlantic.

Charles Dickens, the first global celebrity author and chronicler of a world of urban inequality that looks a lot like the one we live in today. "You only have to look around our society and everything he wrote about in the 1840s is still relevant," said

Britain on Tuesday marked the 200th birthday of

Dickens' biographer, Claire Tomalin. "The great gulf between the rich and poor, corrupt financiers, corrupt Members of Parliament ... You name it, he said it." Dickens' mistrust of the wealthy and compassion for the poor haven't stopped him being embraced by Britain's

high and mighty. Prince Charles and his wife Camilla, Duchess of Cornwall, joined Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, actor Ralph Fiennes, a host of dignitaries and scores of

Dickens' descendants at a memorial service Tuesday in London's Westminster Abbey. A simultaneous event was held in Portsmouth, southern England, where Dickens was born, the son of a navy pay clerk, on Feb. 7, 1812. In a message read out there, Charles called Dickens "one of the greatest writers of the

English language, who used his creative genius to campaign passionately for social justice." In London, the heir to the throne laid a wreath of white roses and snowdrops on the writer's grave in Poet's Corner - resting place of national literary icons - and two of Dickens' youngest descendants added a pair of small

Fiennes read from Dickens' "Bleak House," and there were prayers for the poor and marginalized, and for the writers, artists and journalists chronicling modern society.

Historian Judith Flanders, who attended the service, said it was "enormously moving" - and Dickens would have

"Dickens said in his will that he wanted no public ceremonies, no statues, no public acknowledgment," said Flanders, author of the forthcoming book "Dickens' London."

"He wanted to be buried and die as a private man. He wanted his books to stand as his monument." He got his wish. Dickens' novels and characters are

more popular than ever. The Royal Mail has just issued two new stamps featuring Dickens characters. Right now in Britain you can catch up with new television adaptations of "Great Expectations" and "The Mystery of Edwin Drood," go to an exhibition about Dickens at the Museum of London or visit a theme park called Dickens World. A new film version of "Great Expectations," starring Fiennes and Helena Bonham

Carter, is due later this year. "The quality of the writing is part of why we still relate to him today," said Jo Robinson, a graduate student at King's College London who is researching Dickens. "He's an incredibly vivid writer. He has such an array of characters and there's so much to get out of him ... Each genera-

tion sees it in their own way." Part of Dickens' staying power stems from his incredible productivity. An insomniac who often roamed London's streets by night, he wrote more than 20 books, had 10 children, toured the world on lecture tours and campaigned for social change until his death from a stroke in

1870 at the age of 58. "He believed he knew London better than any person alive, because he spent so much time walking the streets," said Alex Werner, curator of the exhibition "Dickens and

London," running at the Museum of London until June. Dickens' drive and productivity were fueled by early poverty. When he was 12, his father was sent to debtors' prison and Dickens went to work in a factory, fixing labels on jars of boot polish.

Those early experiences were reflected in his novels.

Dickens exposed the cruelty of workhouses in "Oliver Twist," the harshness of child labor in "David Copperfield," the chasm between the rich and the poor in "A Christmas Carol" and the brutality of the legal system in "Bleak House."

He also was one of the first writers to depict the modern industrial city – a place where millions of us still live. Many features of his world are still familiar. The 19th century was an era of fast-paced technological change, and

Dickens embraced it. He traveled Britain on newly invent-

ed steam trains — though he hated the juddering journeys - and crossed the Atlantic in 1842 on one of the first steamships. He was also a commercially astute writer. His books were published in monthly installments, in an inexpensive magazine-style format interspersed with ads for everything

from "Alpaca Umbrellas" to "the gentleman's real head of hair." "It feels very modern," Werner said. "A bit like TV

soaps — you have to get through the adverts." Werner thinks that if Dickens were alive today he'd write for television - he always wanted to reach the

widest possible audience. He might not have approved of another major celebration, the 2012 London Olympics. Dickens was not a fan of the 1851 Great Exhibition, a huge popular display of imperial self-confidence. The next year he began publishing "Bleak House," with its depiction of the city's extremes of poverty and wealth.

Werner says it's a vision that chimes with our own times though he hopes it won't eclipse Dickens' humor.

"Maybe 20 or 30 years ago his work didn't have that same cutting edge," he said. "It was a more optimistic time. Now everything feels a bit more gloomy. The gap between rich and poor — it feels very close to the Victorian world.

"There is an attraction right now to the darker side of Dickens. But he was very funny."
