

## Panel backs \$2.8M sewer project

SALEM - The Utilities Committee of city council agreed unanimously Tuesday to recommend a draft ordinance allowing bids and the awarding of contracts for Phase I improvements to the city sewage treatment plant.

The committee agreed to send the ordinance to council for its consideration after hearing a presentation by city Utilities Superintendent Don Weingart and comments by city Utilities Commission Chairman Geoff Goll, besides posing questions to

Goll stressed the fact that the estimated nearly \$2.8 million project will not require a sewer rate in-

crease, something he felt was important to note.

In answering a question by Councilman Jeff Cushman, chairman of the committee, he also noted the project won't cost taxpayers anything.

He explained the funds used in the utility department come from user fees for services rendered. The department has had a surplus built up in anticipation of the improvements needed to meet Ohio Environmental Protection Agency requirements and will use that wastewater surplus money to pay the engineering and construction costs.

He couldn't remember the last time they had a sewer rate increase.

"We're very proud of the fact that there's no rate increase involved in this," Goll said.

Besides Cushman, who was newly appointed to council last month, the committee includes returning Councilman Dave Nestic and newly-elected Councilwoman Cyndi Baronzzi Dickey.

Weingart updated the council members on the situation at the wastewater treatment plant or sewage treatment plant, how upgrades were deemed necessary in order to reduce the amount of phosphorous discharge as required by the OEPA which is requiring a level at no more than 1 milligram per liter.

Most plants average domestic levels of 12 mg/l or less of phosphorous and those levels can be reduced to the proper number chemically, but in the city's case, the phosphorous levels are higher due to the waste coming into the system from local industry.

The city is still waiting for written approval from the state for a local limit of 24 mg/l for the amount of phosphorous discharged into the wastewater treatment plant. The Phase 1 improvements, which will improve the removal of solids and improve suspended solids compliance issues, are part of a larger, three-phase plan to reduce the phosphorous levels.

## KLG asks Lisbon Council for first ambulance call

LISBON – An ambulance company that until recently was the only provider in town wants to be called first by the village police and fire departments, believing it has "earned" the right.

A letter from KLG Mobile Intensive Co. President Karl Griggs asked Village Council to issue such a directive to the police and fire departments.

"KLG feels that it has earned this right by being the only service that has been able to come to the area and remain here after many other companies have tried and failed. KLG is the only service in Lisbon and pays taxes too," he wrote in a Chief Buck Higgins, he told her he leaves it to his letter delivered to council at Tuesday's meeting dispatchers to decide which ambulance service to by KLG representative Belinda Puchajda.

She told council Northstar Critical Care, based in St. Clair Township, recently began operating in Lisbon and the police department has begun sending most assistance calls to Northstar instead

"There have been instances where we've been completely bypassed," said Puchajda, who was in an accident in town recently and requested KLG, but Northstar was contacted instead.

Puchajda said when she spoke with Police

call. Higgins was not at the council meeting.

"We've been here since 2000 and we pay taxes, and we feel we should be given priority," she

KLG's headquarters is located just down the street from village hall, where an ambulance is always kept, with a second unit sitting just north of town on state Route 45. Puchajda said Northstar has also taken up a position just outside village limits on Route 45.

## **Columbiana school chief:** District must trim spending

COLUMBIANA - City schools Superintendent Donald Mook reiterated on Tuesday the need for the district to trim expenditures in the com-He said the district's enrollment and academic success is on an upward

trend but revenues are expected to dip over the next year. District Treasurer Lori Posey cautioned in October of last year the district would need to trim expenditures due to deficits projected in the five-

The district was deficit spending until this school year when revenue from an oil and gas lease bolstered the general fund.

The district signed the lease with Chesapeake Energy for \$155,000. That revenue won't keep the district from falling back into deficit spending by next year, however.

"We're going to have to look at ways to decrease our expenses," Mook said.

He also said he met earlier that day with City Manager Keith Chamberlin about the possible sale of the Firestone Farms development. Judge C. Ashley Pike ordered the property foreclosed last year to cov-

er the \$1.29 million in delinquent real estate taxes, including taxes owed to the school district. The property includes many undeveloped and unsold tracts of property

around the current development, located in both Fairfield and Unity townships along state Route 14. The sale of the property would prove beneficial for the district that is

looking at some needed facility improvements, Mook noted.

The gymnasium floor at the high school is in need of repair and the roof See SPENDING, 5A



## New Waterford council names new meml

NEW WATERFORD - Before its regular meeting, village council appointed George Pirock to fill a seat left vacant when no one filed to run

for it in November. It is Mayor Shane Patrone's former seat and the term expires on Dec. 31, 2015.

Patrone chose to leave council and run for may-

Pirock, 31, is a political newcomer and said he was "just interested in

being involved ... becoming more involved in the community."

He is a Republican and was given the oath of office immediately.

Patrone said there were three people interested in the seat but two applied.

In the regular session, Fiscal Officer Mike Harold reported that December expenses outran the receipts by \$99,159, putting the village in the red by \$24,414 for 2011.

He explained there were seven bills, amounting to \$111,727, that were paid out during the month, from a big item like

a firetruck payment to a less expensive item like an extra pay in December totaling \$3,500.

He touched a number of line items and funds, noting there is a problem with the water operating funds while the sewer funds was up slightly.

Councilman Larry Leister questioned that, since council just made a rate adjustment last year.

Patrone said there was a big problem with the billing system that can't adjust for late payments. He said about 20 percent of the bills are late.

"We've talked to software vendors," he said, "we have an antiquated system from a California vendor ... we leave messages and right now we don't have the money for software. We need to address and possibly adjust the water and sewer funds.'

Leister said, "There's got to be a way to categorize this."

"The system was working fine until our computer got hit with a virus," Harold said.

He thought that occurred last April and it took some time before being discovered. "It's an old system," he said, adding they did replace the hard drive.

While village income taxes were up more than \$5,000 over 2010, Harold noted the village will lose \$9,000 in local government money over last year.

In 2011, the village collected \$119,359 in income taxes compared to \$114,294 in

"I was hoping for about \$130,000," Harold said about last year's collections.

Harold said, "We're going to really have to look at our budget come March" adding there were some "tough choices" to make regarding appropriations.

In other business, Councilwoman Doris Ogle said the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Natureworks grant for about \$4,000 was being used to install 100-amp electric service in a park pavilion and to fix the picnic tables.

Also, administrator Fred Fink said the water/wastewater plant was doing better and the emergency generator was operational after being checked out by the factory and passing a state inspection.

"All the tests were run," he said, "in all it checked OK."

Fink said there were no water line breaks in December and in joking reference to the mild winter, added, "we have none scheduled for January."

He said the Christmas lights were also

Patrone said right-of-ways and test wells will be discussed at a Jan. 17 finance committee meeting. The village has proposed

two test wells by the water plant to "see how much water is available.'

Also, the village is looking for a laborer to fill the position left by Gordon Betz, who just resigned. The position is full-time and council discussed filling it immediate-

During its re-organization meeting,

Councilman Bill Mullarkey was elected president of council and seven committee assignments by Patrone were all approved unanimously by council. Mullarkey, Ogle and Leister were ap-

pointed to the finance and legislative committee. Mullarkey, Leister and Councilwoman

Chris Bodnar were appointed to the audit committee. Patrone also appointed four people to a

newly-formed water source committee that will study issues and form a plan related to water issues. Jason Gorby, Fink, Patrone and Jim Brown of Fleis and Vanden Brink Opera-

tions and Resource Management, the com-

pany that operates the water and sewer sys-

tem, were appointed. Also, the zoning board will meet at 7 p.m., Jan. 17 in the community center.

## Patrol still probing crash that killed child

EAST PALESTINE -Troopers with the Ohio Highway Patrol out of Lisbon are still investigating a traffic crash that killed a toddler Friday night on state Route 14.

Fourteen-month-old Ryan Brown was instantly killed

when he was struck by a vehicle driven by Michelle A. Jones, 38, East Palestine, shortly after 9 p.m.

Troopers at the scene said Brown had run out of a home just off the eastbound lane of state Route 14 in Unity Township.

Jones was traveling in the eastbound lane just west of the state Route 165 intersection when the accident occurred.

Trooper Brian Kavanagh said Monday it is unclear at this time whether charges

will be filed since the post is still looking into exactly what happened that night.

"As to what happened, we are still trying to piece together how he got out into the road," he said.

Once the report is completed it will be sent to the county prosecutor who will file charges, if necessary.

Trooper and Traffic Reconstruction Specialist Todd Jester is handling the investigation.





## Ohio legislators need to monitor double dipping

In many states, including Ohio, state employees who retire and Lcollect pensions are not permitted to "double dip." Should they decide to go back to work in the public sector, their pension benefits are reduced.

That is not the case in Ohio. There, retirees — including some very well compensated ones — are not penalized if they get back on the public payroll.

One example is William G. Batchelder, who is speaker of the state House of Representatives. Batchelder served more than three decades as a legislator, then left and became a judge. Now he's back in the Statehouse, collecting both a salary of \$94,000 and a pension topping \$100,000 a year.

Batchelder may be the most prominent double dipper, but he is far from the only one. For years, many public employees have been able to retire in the mid-50s, start collecting pensions, then go back to work while still in the prime of life and enjoy double income through salaries. You very well may know some. Or, in fact, be one.

Were the situation in the private sector, Ohio taxpayers would have no cause for complaint. But because public employee pensions and other retirement benefits are subsidized heavily by taxpayers, they have a right to demand double dipping come to an end. In effect, hard-working Buckeye State residents are paying some employees twice — and that simply isn't fair. With both state and many local governments in deep fiscal trouble, it isn't smart, either.

Ohio legislators should place at least some limits on double dipping. Just don't look for the initiative to start in the speaker of the House's office.

## GOP war of all against all?

here still exists a possibil-**I** ity that, come Jan. 20, 2013, we could have a Republican Senate and House, and a Republican president.

But there is also a possibility that a Goldwater-Rockefeller-type family bloodletting could sunder the party and kick it all away.

America is bored with Barack Obama. The young

and the minorities are still with him but exhibit none of the excitement or enthusiasm of 2008.

Moreover, we have been through three years of 23-25 million unemployed or underemployed. Our national debt is now larger than the national economy, approaching Italian proportions. The class warfare rhetoric is beginning to grate. A huge maiority believes the nation is on the wrong course.

Who wants four more years of this?

Democratic hopes for 2012 hence hinge on that party's ability to portray the Republican alternative as unacceptable if not intolerable. And the Republicans have begun to play into that script.

The GOP field of candidates suddenly seems headed to a finale that will call to mind the last scene of Hamlet, the dead and dying everywhere, but no Fortinbras to restore order in the house.

In the Sunday debate, Jon Huntsman accused Mitt Romney of virtually questioning his patriotism, when Mitt asked how he could serve as Obama's man in Beijing and be a credible opponent of Obama.

This nation is divided ... because of attitudes like that," said Huntsman.

Newt Gingrich, who promised in Iowa not to go negative, now calls Mitt a liar. A super-PAC supporting Newt is about to paint Mitt as a Bain Capital corporate predator, a Gordon Gecko whose modus operandi was to swoop down on troubled companies, loot them, fire workers, leave a skeleton crew and move on.

Newt's bitterness is understandable.

A month ago, he was surging. He had opened up a lead in national polls, moved ahead in Iowa, South Carolina and Florida, and, with the backing of the Manchester Union-Leader, was closing in on Mitt in New Hampshire.

From his crisp debate performances, Newt had steadily risen from his disastrous debut, while one after another of his rivals - Michele Bachmann, Rick Perry, Herman Cain - had taken the lead

Newt had engineered a spectacular comeback, seemingly peaking at exactly the right moment, only weeks before the Iowa caucuses.

Came then the Iowa blitz, round-the-clock air strikes from a Romney super-PAC. Millions were dumped into attack ads portraying Newt as a Beltway bandit who had exploited his speaker's ties to enrich himself, pocketing \$1.6 million from Freddie Mac and millions more from Big Pharma to promote the Bush prescription drug benefit for seniors, the largest unfunded entitlement program of the century.

After weeks of unreturned fire, Newt's poll numbers had been cut in half. He finished a distant fourth in Iowa. Having come back from the dead once in this primary season, it is hard to see how he resurrects himself a second time, given the depth of his fall, his seemingly uncontrollable anger and the little time he has left.

Five weeks ago, Newt looked like the GOP nominee. Now, his political career seems about over. Hence the desire for revenge. And with his friend Las Vegas billionaire Sheldon Adelson dumping \$5 million into a super-PAC for Newt, his allies have the resources to exact retribution on Mitt for what Mitt's friends did to Newt.

Nor is this the only bad blood.

In Iowa, Ron Paul's ads charged Newt with "serial hypocrisy" for claiming to be a conservative but leaving Congress to make millions working the system. In New Hampshire, Paul escalated, calling Newt a "chicken hawk" who clamors for war on Iran but ducked service when he could have gone and fought during Vietnam.

Newt has said that, should Paul become the nominee, he, Newt, could neither endorse nor vote for him. Paul's supporters would reciprocate, were Newt to become the nominee.

Paul's ads also charge Rick Santorum with being a "corrupt" politician who exploited his 12 years of Senate service to make millions on K Street.

Santorum's reply: "Ron Paul is disgusting."

The Republican candidates have gone beyond challenging each other's records and positions to impugning their character.

Sunday, New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie, a Romney surrogate, directly questioned Huntsman's "integrity," implying he had plotted his presidential campaign against Obama while serving as Obama's man in Beijing. He had taken the king's shilling and then sought to dethrone the king.

Such wounds take time to heal. Some never do, and some will not be closed before the Republican convention opens in Tampa, Fla.

Then there are the policy divides. Paul may well run second to Romney in delegates and demand that his ideas - shutting U.S. military bases overseas, downsizing the American empire, getting a declaration of war from Congress before any attack on Iran — be written into the platform.

How will a hawkish Republican majority finesse that one? To bring this crowd together at Tampa, the GOP nominee may need the diplomatic skills of a Talleyrand or Metternich.

## Government, the redistributionist behemoth



largest achievement is today's redistributionist government. But such government is inherently regressive: It tends to distribute pow-WILL er and money to the strong, includ-

ing itself.

Government becomes big by having big ambitions for supplanting markets as society's primary allocator of wealth and opportunity. Therefore it becomes a magnet for factions muscular enough, in money or numbers or both, to bend government to their advantage.

The left's centuries-old mission is to increase social harmony by decreasing antagonisms arising from disparities of wealth – to decrease inequality by increasing government's redistributive activities. Such government constantly expands under the unending, indeed intensifying, pressures to correct what it disapproves of – the distribution of wealth produced by consensual market activities. But as government presumes to dictate the correct distribution of social rewards, the maelstrom of contemporary politics demonstrates that social strife, not solidarity, is generated by government transfer payments to preferred

This includes generational strife. Most transfer payments redistribute wealth from workers to nonworkers in the form of pensions and medical care for retirees. The welfare state's primary purpose is to subsidize the last years of Americans' lives, and the elderly are, after a lifetime of accumulation, better off than most Americans: In 2009, the net worth of households headed by adults ages 65 and older was a record 47 times that of households headed by adults under the age of 35 - a wealth gap that doubled just since 2005.

The equalizing effects of redistributive transfer payments is less today than in 1979, when households in the lowest income quintile received 54 percent of such payments. In 2007, they received 36 percent.

Because Social Security and Medicare are not means-tested, the share of transfer payments going to middle- and upper-income households tends to increase, for several reasons. The retirement age is essentially fixed, but people are living longer. And because the welfare state is so good to them, the elderly are unusually diligent voters, and are especially apt to vote on the basis of protecting their benefits.

Beyond transfer payments, redistributionist government is itself governed by the law of dispersed costs and concentrated benefits: For example, sugar import quotas confer substantial wealth on

a small cohort of producers already wealthy enough to work the political levers of redistributive government. The increased cost of sugar substantially penalizes consumers as a group, but not so noticeably that individuals protest.

The tax code, government's favorite instrument for distributing wealth to favored factions, has been tweaked about 4,500 times in 10 years. Generally, the beneficiaries of these changes are interests sufficiently strong and sophisticated to practice rent-seeking.

Not only does redistributionist government direct wealth upward; in asserting a right to do so it siphons power into itself. A puzzling aspect of our politically contentious era is how little contention there is about the ethics of coercive redistribution by progressive taxation and other government "corrections" of social outcomes it considers unethical or unaesthetic.

This reticence, in an age in which political reticence is rare, reflects the difficulty of articulating principled defenses of these practices. They go undefended because they are generally popular with a public that misunderstands their net effects, and because the practices are the political class's vocation today. The big winners from these practices are that class and the interests adept at collaborating with it.

Government uses redistribution to correct social outcomes that offend it. But government rarely explains, or perhaps

even recognizes, the reasoning by which it decides why particular outcomes of consensual market activities are incorrect. When taxes are levied not to efficiently fund government but to impose this or that notion of distributive justice, remember: Taxes are always coerced contributions to government, which is always the first, and often the principal, beneficiary of them.

Try a thought experiment suggested decades ago by University of Chicago law professors Walter Blum and Harry Kalven in their 1952 essay "The Uneasy Case for Progressive Taxation," published in their university's law review. Suppose society's wealth trebled overnight without any change in the relative distribution among individuals. Would the unchanged inequality at higher levels of affluence decrease concern about inequality?

Surely not: The issue of inequality has become more salient as affluence has increased. Which suggests two conclusions:

People are less dissatisfied by what they lack than by what others have. And when government engages in redistribution in order to maximize the happiness of citizens who become more envious as they become more comfortable, government becomes increasingly frenzied and futile.

Weingart said Phase 1 will include the installation of mechanical equipment in the clarifiers at the plant to improve discharge of solids and construction of a new building for solid thickening to improve the removal of solids.

He said to keep in mind the numbers for the costs are only estimates, saying the real costs won't be known until the engineering is complete, but adding that he's not expecting them to be much more than the estimates. A 20 percent contingency was built into the amount for the engineering just to be on the safe side.

The construction cost was estimated at \$2,319,000, with engineering estimated at \$472,600.

He also said the final cost may be dependent on the steel industry, with more demand for product.

The Utilities Commission is currently reviewing proposals for engineering firms for the project. Goll asked that council pass the ordinance for accepting bids and awarding contracts as an emergency so they can seek bids right away.

The tentative schedule for the project put the awarding of contracts in August, with construction to begin in September and completion expected in August 2013.

## Salem parks director briefs council panel

SALEM - The Parks Committee of city council held a get-to-know-you session Tuesday night, hearing all about the tentative schedule for the parks this year, issues coming up and wishes for capital improvements.

Parks Director Steve Faber did most of the talking to familiarize the committee members with the Salem Parks Commission and park operations in general besides asking that they keep the parks in mind when city council starts discussing capital improvements.

"Dollars are short, money is tight, but that doesn't always mean something can't be done," he said.

The Parks Committee is comprised of three members who are new to council this year, although Councilman Clyde Brown did serve a previous term which ended two years ago. The other members include former school board member Councilman Jeff Cushman, who was appointed last month to fill the unexpired term of John Berlin, the current mayor, and Councilwoman Cyndi Baronzzi Dickey, who was elected in November.

Dickey is chairman of the committee and said she wants to see more community involvement in the parks. She tentatively is setting committee meetings to follow the Salem Parks Commission meetings, which are held at 5 p.m. the fourth Wednesday of every month at the Memorial Building. She said she would like the committee to do the same, only at 6 p.m. at the Memorial Building, following the commission

Brown suggested meeting another night so they'll have more time to digest anything that may come up at the commission meetings, but she said she likes to deal with things when they're fresh and that way everyone will already be at the same place.

She said they'll try it for now, acknowledging they could have some short meetings or the plan could

Besides Faber, the other parks representative present for the meeting was Parks Commissioner Terry Hoopes. The Parks Commission includes two other members, John Panezott and Ken Schrom. The parks department has five full-time employees, including Faber, who explained how some of the schedules for baseball and softball and summer basketball are dependent on the weather. He talked about the pool at Centennial Park, how it follows the school schedule for opening and closing, and how they had two of the four car shows scheduled last year cancelled due to weather.

Some of the events he highlighted included Little Quaker Football's use of Waterworth Memorial Park, the use of seasonal help in the summer and Relay for Life and an obstacle race, both set for June at Waterworth Memorial Park, and an event for autism.

Concerning capital improvements, Faber said they're compiling their wish list of projects now, classifying them by the amount of funding they may require, whether major, a little or just in need of some elbow grease, noting they

sometimes have to become creative to get some things done. They've worked with boy scouts on Eagle Scout projects and used community service workers, trying to take advantage of any specific skills they may have for some projects.

For specific projects, he mentioned recoating the tennis courts at Centennial Park, which are used for varsity tennis matches for Salem city schools, and moving the fence back at Lions baseball field and possibly getting lights installed at some point. He said they're in need of more parking on the west side of Waterworth Memorial Park, near the duck pond, and additional parking at Centennial Park in a few spots. They also want to develop an organized outdoor storage area for materials used at the parks, such as gravel and mulch.

Faber said they would like to see the water lines to some of the pavilions replaced, adding "our dream is to have water and electric at every pavilion."

The parks department has 10 pavilions, with six having electricity (one or two having just one plug).

"We do things as we can afford them," he said.

Brown said he had some concerns that were brought to his attention, but said he would wait to mention those at a regular Parks Commission meeting. At the beginning of the meeting, Dickey requested that if any complaints are received from people about the parks, that the name and contact information be recorded so there can be followup.

## Molten metal spill causes \$50K fire at castings plant



## Many possible causes for red rash

DONOHUE: Our 26-year-old, normally healthy son has recently recovered from erythema multiforme minor. The dermatologist said it was a violent reaction to strep bacterium. He had large blisters over most of

his body, even the palms of his hands and soles of his feet. He suffered extreme itching and pain. The affected skin peeled off and left raw areas. Please comment on this disorder and the likelihood that it may return. - **D.S.** 

ANSWER: Erythema (Greek for "red skin") multiforme ("many different shapes and sizes") consists of circles that look somewhat like bull's-eyes on targets. It's an outbreak engineered by a reaction that's generated by antibodies, like an allergy. The circles vary in shape and size and have a red perimeter with a dusky, violet center. Blisters may appear on them. Few rashes appear on the palms and soles. This is one of them. Erythema multiforme minor (which is anything but a minor illness) often is traced to a virus infection. Erythema multiforme major is caused by medicines, viruses and bacteria.

Yes, either of these two illnesses can recur. If a virus has been determined to be the cause and if recurrences are many, then a daily dose of antiviral medicines can prevent such recurrences. If a medicine was the cause, then avoiding that particular medicine prevents repeated attacks.

As bad as your son's illness was, the major variety is worse, and two other related diseases, Stevens-Johnson syndrome and

toxic epidermal necrosis, are even more

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** This is my third letter. I am writing regarding a stress test. I am 87 years old and was told by my doctor to take a stress test again. Since I had one about a year ago, which I passed, I am seeking your advice on whether this test is necessary at my age. Please answer this letter. - **J.M.** 

**ANSWER:** I apologize for the delay in answering your letters. Let me explain why. I hesitated to interfere with your doctor's wish to have you take another stress test so soon after one that you passed. Your doctor knows you and your heart much better than I do.

I would ask the doctor what are the reasons for insisting upon another stress test so soon after the one you had less than a year ago. If his answer is reasonable, I would take the test.

If the answer sounds unreasonable, I would get another doctor.

There has to be a good reason for requesting another such test in such a short period of time.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** When is the best time to take calcium and with any particular foods? Does it matter where calcium is purchased? - **G.R.** 

ANSWER: Calcium carbonate, probably the most-used kind of calcium, needs stomach acid for absorption. It's best, therefore, to take it during or after meals, when stomach acid production is at its highest. Calcium citrate can be taken at any time.

No more than 500 mg of calcium should be taken at one time. Only that amount is absorbed well in one dose.

It doesn't matter where you buy your calcium.

## Obese dad treats food like a drug

Dear Annie: I am increasingly disgusted by my dad. He is obese and getting bigger, and he won't (can't?) stop eating. He and my mother recently stayed in our home for a long weekend. When we went out for breakfast, Dad ordered enough food to feed three peo-

ple - steak, eggs, hash browns, toast, and biscuits and gravy. He ate all of that and half of my son's pancakes. His main topic of conversation during breakfast was what we would eat the following day. It is like he is addicted to a drug. Even when he orders a salad, he drenches it in so much creamy dressing that it negates the health benefits. At night, he raids the kitchen. He ate so many of my kids' lunch snacks that I started storing them in the bottom cabinets, since he can't bend over to reach them. He also cannot cut his own toenails and gets winded playing with his grandchildren.

I already have suggested that he start taking

little walks, but he insists he has genetically bad knees — as opposed to having bad knees from the extra 200 pounds he carries around. He recently had open-heart surgery to replace a bad valve and claimed the same genetic excuse. He has damaged my couch, and I had to replace two patio chairs. He was offended when I asked him not to sit on the more delicate furniture since it has a 250-pound weight limit. I know my mom is disgusted, too, but Dad is incredibly stubborn. I think he also has been depressed since my brother died in Afghanistan. But Dad is eating himself to death. Just being in his presence now irritates the daylights out of me. What are we to do? - Disgusted by the Glutton

Dear Disgusted: Dad already feels worthless, so instead of anger and disgust, try compassion. You are right about this being a form of addiction, which means it is extremely hard for Dad to control his food cravings. We think you will have better luck working on his depression, which can interfere with his willingness to become healthier. Enlist your mother's help to encourage Dad to see his doctor about the possibility of medication.

#### Ford unveils new Lincoln sedan

DETROIT (AP) - Lincoln was once the pinnacle of luxury. Continental limousines carried presidents from Franklin D. Roosevelt to Ronald Reagan. Town Cars ferried executives through Manhattan. Athletes and rappers cruised around in Navigator SUVs.

But over the last two decades, the Lincoln lineup grew stale as Ford transformed its other cars and trucks with new designs and features. Now it's finally Lincoln's turn for an update, one that aims to show customers the brand can make more than hearses and airport limos. On Tuesday, Ford pulled the wraps off an MKZ sedan that is close to the model that will go on sale this fall. Among its features is an all-glass roof that opens automatically and slides over the back window, giving both front and rear passengers a convertible-like ride.

#### GM, Ford say January US sales strong

DETROIT (AP) – American consumers are buying cars at a brisk pace in January, continuing sales growth that began late last year, according to two industry executives. Mark Reuss, General Motors Co.'s North American president, said Tuesday that rising sales seen by GM and the U.S. industry are continuing through the first 10 days of the month.

Erich Merkle, Ford Motor Co.'s top U.S. sales analyst, also said sales are going well so far this month. Neither executive would give specific numbers.

November and December were among the strongest months last year for U.S. car and truck sales. Buyers were drawn by cheap loans and an improving economy. Pent-up demand also was robust last year because many people had to replace aging vehicles. The average age of a car on U.S. roads is approaching 11 years.

#### Nintendo gives glimpse of Wii U

LAS VEGAS (AP) – Nintendo Co.'s upcoming Wii U game console will come with a controller that has a big, touch-enabled screen. At first glance, that seems like an obstacle to the kind of casual multiplayer gaming that made the first Wii console such a breakout hit. But in demonstrations Tuesday, the company emphasized that the Wii U will work with the cheaper, stick-like Wii controllers as well, making family multiplayer games feasible.

The Japanese company is giving some journalists hands-on time with the console on the sidelines of the International Consumer Electronics Show, which started Tuesday in Las Vegas.

It's the second time the U.S. media are getting a glimpse of the device, which was first shown in June. Nintendo said the device will go on sale after the next Electronic Entertainment Expo gaming trade show in Los Angeles in June.

#### Google gets personal with search

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Google is sifting

through the photos and commentary on its blossoming social network so its Internet search results can include more personal information.

The additional personal touches that began to roll out Tuesday mark another step toward one of Google's most ambitious goals. The Internet search leader eventually hopes to know enough about each of its users so it can tailor its results to fit the unique interests of each person looking for something.

Different people should start seeing different search results more frequently now that Google Inc. is importing content from its 6-month-old Plus service, a product that the company introduced in an attempt to counter the popularity of Facebook's online hangout and Twitter's short-messaging hub. Google's main search results page also will start highlighting more content from an older online photo service called Pi-

#### Internet address expansion set

NEW YORK (AP) – Bidding will begin this week for words and brand names such as ".sport," ".NYC" and ".bank" to join ".com" as online

Up to 1,000 domain name suffixes — the ".com" in an Internet address - could be added each year in the most sweeping change to the domain name system since its creation in the 1980s.

To some, the system will lead to ".cash." To others, it will mean ".confusion."

The idea is to let Las Vegas hotels, casinos and other attractions congregate around ".Vegas," or a company such as Canon Inc. draw customers to "cameras.Canon" or "printers.Canon." The new system will also allow Chinese, Japanese and Swahili versions of ".com."

#### Hiring rose, but job openings dipped

WASHINGTON (AP) – U.S. employers stepped up their hiring in November but pulled back slightly on the number of jobs they advertised.

The mostly favorable report shows companies are gaining more confidence in the economy and filling more of their open positions. It follows other encouraging data on hiring that suggest 2012 may be a better year for job growth.

Employers filled almost 4.15 million jobs in November, a 3 percent increase from the previous month, the Labor Department said Tuesday. It also nearly matched September's hiring level, which was the highest since May 2010.

## Kodak realigns business structure; sues Apple, HTC

it is realigning and simplifying its business to cut costs, accelerate its digital transformation and boost its share price. The shares shot up 50 percent but remained at just 60 cents.

The ailing photography icon, which has relied on patent licensing fees and lawsuits for extra cash for years, also sued Apple Inc. and HTC Corp. on Tuesday. It claims their products infringe several of its digital-imaging patents.

As consumers switched to digital from film, Kodak has been pummeled, and it said in November that it could run out of cash in a year if it didn't sell a trove of 1,100 digital-imaging patents. Its payroll has plunged below 19,000 from 70,000 a decade ago, and it hasn't had a profitable year since 2007.

As of Jan. 1, Kodak said, it has two business units - commercial and consumer — instead of three. Both will report to a new chief operating office that is led jointly by Philip Faraci and Laura Quatela, who also both serve as president.

The company's three former divisions were: traditional film and photo paper products; consumer digital imaging and graphic communications, which included printing equipment.

The lawsuits, filed in federal court in Rochester, claim that some of Apple's iPhones, iPads and iPods and HTC's smartphones and tablet devices infringe Kodak patents related to transmitting images.

Kodak also lodged complaints against the companies before the U.S. International Trade Commission, in Washington, D.C., which can order federal officials to block imports of products made with contested

Calls to Apple, based in Cupertino, Calif., and HTC, based in Taiwan, were not immediately returned.

Separately, Kodak is pursuing a two-year-old dispute before the commission with Apple and BlackBerry maker Research in Motion Ltd. over the same image-preview technology

It said Tuesday that a licensing deal with Apple and RIM could be worth up to \$1 billion. The commission, seen as a faster mediator of patent disputes than courts, typically resolves disputes in 18 months. Since 2005, Kodak has poured hundreds of millions of dollars into

new lines of inkjet printers that it says are on the verge of turning a profit. Home photo printers, commercial inkjet presses, workflow software and packaging are viewed as Kodak's new core.

Kodak is hoping that printers, software and packaging will produce more than twice as much revenue by 2013 and account by then for 25 percent of the company's total revenue, or nearly \$2 billion. "As we complete Kodak's transformation to a digital company, our

future markets will be very different from our past, and we need to organize ourselves in keeping with that evolution," said Chief Executive The bulk of Kodak's products are now digital so the new structure

divides the company by market more than by function. The consumer segment includes cameras, paper, home printers, film rolls, photofinishing, online photo-sharing and the intellectual-property unit. The commercial division contains motion-picture, industrial and professional film as well as high-speed presses, printing plates and software, document scanners and other printing products.

Kodak has not yet said whether or where it will make cuts.

"We will continue to look for opportunities to streamline operations and properly position the company's portfolio," said spokesman Christopher Veronda. He declined to comment on a recent news report that Kodak is

preparing a Chapter 11 bankruptcy filing in the event it can't sell the digital-imaging patents, which analysts estimate could fetch at least \$2 billion. No buyers have emerged since the company started shopping them around in July.

Kodak's stock rose 20 cents to close Tuesday at 60 cents; the shares gained another 3 cents after hours.







## Judge OKs Chinese drywall deal

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A Chinese drywall manufacturer would pay hundreds of millions of dollars to resolve court claims by thousands of Gulf Coast property owners who say the product wrecked their homes, under a deal that won preliminary approval

In his order, U.S. District Judge Eldon Fallon said he believes the proposed class-action settlement is "fair, reasonable and adequate," was negotiated in good faith and is "within the range of possible judicial approval." It's the largest settlement of its kind so far.

Tuesday from a federal judge.

Knauf Plasterboard Tianjin Co. agreed last month to create an uncapped fund to pay for repairing roughly 4,500 properties, mostly in Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. The deal also would create a separate fund capped at \$30 million to pay for other types of losses, including those blaming drywall for health problems.

Fallon, who presides over more than 10,000 claims involving Chinese drywall, will hold a "fairness hearing" on the agreement in June before deciding whether to give his final approval.

Several companies had objected to the proposed settlement. Fallon, however, said none of the objections present obstacles to his preliminary approval.

"This conclusion is particularly true given that no (plaintiffs) have raised objections," he wrote.

The deal calls for Knauf to initially deposit \$200 million in the repairs fund, which would be replenished as needed.

## Alaska town seeks shovels; braces for latest storm

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - An Alaska community blitzed by nearly 15 feet of snow braced Tuesday for another blizzard and a new problem - a shortage of shovels.

"We can't locate hardly any in the state," said Allen Marquette, a spokesman for the city of Cordova on the east side of Prince William Sound. "We're trying to find some down in Seattle to get shipped up."

The snow-weary city of 2,200 was bracing for another storm after the National Weather Service issued a blizzard warning.

The storm has already caused avalanches along the Seward Highway, halting traffic within Alaska's largest city and cutting off downtown Anchorage from neighborhoods to the south in Girdwood. It knocked out power to parts of Homer on the Kenai Peninsula.

KMXT-radio in Kodiak said flights to the island city had been canceled and three boats sank in local harbors from the weight of snow. In Valdez, the terminus of the trans-Alaska pipeline, forecasters issued a blizzard warning through Wednesday afternoon, with winds to 45 mph and accumulations of 9 of 17 inches of snow on the Richardson Highway at Thompson Pass, the road access out of the community.

In Cordova, a fishing community famed for wild Copper River salmon, snow piled up to 6 feet high on roofs. Accumulations on roofs and walls collapsed at least two roofs.

Dealing with the white stuff has turned into a near military operation. City, state and federal authorities set up a command center to organize its response to the snow emergency. One task: deciding who gets their roof or entryway shoveled first. The community set up a call-in number to report ac-



cess problems or roof hazards.

"We're sending teams to assess," Marquette said. "Everybody thinks it's serious, but you have to go out and assess to prioritize ones that need it the most."

The Alaska National Guard has sent over 57 soldiers, mostly to wield shovels. The U.S. Coast Guard contributed at least 20 personnel to clean docks and help maintain heavy equip-

A "tremendous outreach" of volunteers helped their neighbors clear roofs or clear paths to buildings, Marquette said. But as they perform the backbreaking work of moving snow by hand, they're running through shovels.

"Part of it is, the light fluffy snow is no more," Marquette said. "It's the heavier, wetter stuff. A lot of these shovels are plastic. These are big strong people, and so you're bound to have some equipment that gets damaged and broken. So we need to keep replenishing and repairing and getting those back out on the line so they can get the work done.'

The city was looking for ice chisels, snow shovels and snow scoops that push

"Those are real handy for flat roofs, and we were short on those," Marquette said. "So what they've been doing is using tarps

those blue plastic tarps and then shoveling snow on them and dragging the tarps to the edge and flipping them off. That's been working pretty well but it would still be more efficient and faster if they could use regular snow scoops.'

Coast Guardsman cleared docks at one Cordova harbor and worked on another Tuesday. National Guard soldiers had concentrated on city buildings such as the museum, library and high school and "put a good dent into the situation," Marquette said.

Ice on the city hospital made shoveling hazardous and workers dug from their knees, he said.

Danger from the storm Tuesday kept workers off roofs. Shoveling can create a small avalanche on the building, he said.

"You've got so much load on the roof, that once you break enough of it loose, the whole thing cuts loose, and if you're in the path of it, it takes you with

it," he said. "It's not unheard of it get buried in that and it's just like a regular avalanche, only a small one. But you have a few tons or more of snow and ice coming down - that's pretty hazardous."

The city has set up an emergency shelter for people in homes near an area about 5.5 miles from the city that is prone to avalanches. A woman was killed in January 2001 when an avalanche flattened her home.

A weekend avalanche lowered the threat level, Marquette said, but families were asked to evacuate. The current storm could reload the field, he said.

Meanwhile, the city continues to seek snow scoops and shovels, Marquette said. "It's ironic, isn't it? The state of Alaska you'd think they'd be ahead of the game. It's those logistical things you just don't plan on, or you don't think is going to be an is-



## Romney sweeps NH to cement top status

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) - Mitt Romney cruised to a solid victory in the New Hampshire primary Tuesday night, picking up steam from his first-place finish in the lead-off Iowa caucuses and firmly establishing himself as the man to beat for the Republican presidential nomination.

"Tonight we made history," Romney told cheering supporters before pivoting to a stinging denunciation of President Barack Obama. "The middle class has been crushed," in the past three years, he said, "our debt is too high and our opportunities too few" - remarks that made clear he intends to be viewed as the party's nominee in waiting after only two

His rivals said otherwise, looking ahead to South Carolina on Jan. 21 as the best place to stop the former Massachusetts governor. Already, several contenders and committees supporting them had put down heavy money to reserve time for television advertising there.

Even so, the order of finish — Ron Paul second, followed by Jon Huntsman, Newt Gingrich and Rick Santorum scrambled the field and prolonged the increasingly desperate competition to emerge as the true conservative rival to Rom-

Romney fashioned his victory despite a sustained assault by rivals eager to undermine his claim as the contender best situated to beat Obama and help reduce the nation's painfully high unemployment. Gingrich led the way, suggesting at one point that Romney was a corporate raider, rhetoric that the front-runner's defenders said was more suitable to a Democratic opponent than a conservative Republican.

Returns from 52 percent of New Hampshire precincts showed Romney with 37 percent of the vote, followed by Texas Rep Paul with 23 percent, former Utah Gov. Huntsman with 17 percent and former House Speaker Gingrich and former Pennsylvania Sen. Santorum with 10 percent each. With his victory, Romney became the first Republican to sweep the first two contests in competitive races since Iowa gained the lead-off spot in presidential campaigns in 1976.

Romney won in Iowa by a scant eight votes over Santorum, and gained barely a quarter of the vote there.

On Tuesday, he battled not only his rivals but also high expectations as the ballots were counted, particularly since his pursuers had virtually conceded New Hampshire, next-door to the state Romney governed for four years.

Seeking to undercut Romney's victory, Gingrich and others suggested in advance that anything below 40 percent or so would indicate weakness by the nomination front-runner.

They didn't mention that Sen. John McCain's winning percentage in the 2008 primary was 37 percent.

Romney's win was worth at least four delegates to the Republican National Convention next summer. Paul earned at least two delegates and Huntsman at least one. Another four remained to be awarded, based on final vote totals.

"Tonight we celebrate," Romney told his supporters. "Tomorrow we go back to work."

Rightly so. Already, candidates and political action committees aligned with them were reserving enormous amounts of television time for the first-in-the-South primary in little more than a week.

Unlike Iowa and New Hampshire, where unemployment is well below the national average, joblessness is far higher in South Carolina. That creates a different political environment for the race.

South Range had been shooting 75 percent at the line in its previous four games.



Larkin gets in 2012; 2013 vote sure to be controversial

NEW YORK (AP) — Still glowing over his election to the Hall of Fame, Barry Larkin was asked about next year's sure-to-be-controversial vote: the first appearances of Barry

Bonds, Roger Clemens and Sammy Sosa on the Cooperstown ballot.

"All I know is playing and competing against some of these guys, they're the best —

period," he said. The Steroids Era will be the focal point of next year's Hall ballot, when 550-plus members of the Baseball Writers' Association of America try to

assess three of the most accomplished players in the sport's history. For all the home runs and wins, it's a trio tainted with accusations that their statistics were boosted by performanceenhancing drugs during a period when there were no

agreed-upon penalties in base-

ball for the use of steroids and

human growth hormone.

"It's going to be agonizing," BBWAA general secretary Jack O'Connell said after Tuesday's news conference, repeating the phrase for emphasis.

The BBWAA hasn't elected three candidates in one year since 1999 and hasn't voted in four since 1955. Next year's ballot also includes first-time eligibles Mike Piazza, Curt Schilling and Craig Biggio, along with holdovers Jack Morris, Jeff Bagwell, Lee Smith and Tim Raines.

As Hall President Jeff Idelson pointed out, only 207 of the approximately 18,000 players who have appeared in the major leagues have earned induction to Cooperstown. Some voters will keep the doors locked on Steroids Era sluggers and Clemens - and even players only rumored to have used PEDs.



we're down by nine." Salem was behind 39-30 at


Jalen Mays, Alliance's 6foot-5 standout, finished with 17 points, two dunks, nine rebounds and two blocked shots.

#### Senators make quick work of slumping Penguins

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Milan Michalek scored twice, Craig Anderson stopped 29 shots and the Ottawa Senators made quick work of the slumping Pittsburgh Penguins in a 5-1 victory Tuesday night.

Chris Neil, Bobby Butler and Jason Spezza also scored for the Senators, while Colin Greening had three assists. Ottawa scored on four consecutive shots spanning the first and second period to break it open and send the reeling Penguins to their fifth straight loss.

Evgeni Malkin scored his 17th goal of the season for Pittsburgh but couldn't stop the Penguins from matching their longest losing streak in two years. Brent Johnson made just five saves on eight shots before being pulled early in the second period in favor of Marc-Andre Fleury.

Pittsburgh, a Stanley Cup favorite after Sidney Crosby's brief return in November, is eighth in the Eastern Conference at the season's midway point.

The Senators, meanwhile, are surging. Ottawa won for the sixth time in seven games without its usual flair for the dramatic. The team leads the NHL in third-period comebacks, the last coming in a 6-4 win against Philadelphia on Sunday.

The fireworks came earlier against punchless Pittsburgh.

The Penguins started Johnson in net to give Fleury the night off before a trip to Washington on Wednesday. Johnson, stellar a year ago, has struggled this season. He came in with a 3.24 goals-against average and a mediocre .885 save percentage.

Both took a hit during a nightmarish night even though the Senators were playing without defenseman Erik Karlsson, scratched moments before the opening faceoff with an upper body injury.

Ottawa hardly needed the league's top-scoring defenseman, pouncing on the Penguins after surviving an early flurry.

Pittsburgh has made a habit of playing well in games, then falling off in the final 20 minutes. The collapse came much earlier this time.

Neil got Ottawa started, taking a feed from Kyle Turris and beating Johnson easily to put the Senators up 1-0 just over midway through the first period. Butler made it 2-0 less than 3 minutes later, taking a pretty feed from Nick Foligno and tapping it into a wide-open net.

#### Ohio St associate athletics director Jones dies

COLUMBUS (AP) — Ohio State says associate athletics director Bill Jones has died of an apparent heart attack. He was 48.

The university says the alum who was in his 14th year working for the athletics department died Tuesday at the University Medical Center.

Athletics director Gene Smith calls the loss profound, saying Jones' "genuine enthusiasm, calm demeanor and lifelong love for the Buckeyes made him a valuable part of every project he touched."

Jones was named associate athletics director for external affairs in 2009. He had previously held other department positions, including assistant athletics director for ticketing.

The Columbus native held a 1986 bachelor's degree from Ohio State a

1991 master's degree from Ohio University.

His father Jim Jones was Ohio State athletics director from 1987 to 1994.

going pro and in the final stages of picking an agent.

A person familiar with the decision told The Associated Press that Griffin opted to declare for the draft. The person spoke Tuesday night on condition of anonymity because the quarterback had not yet made an official an-

Baylor officials had indicated this week the possibility of a news conference on campus as early as Wednesday. There was still nothing officially scheduled Tuesday night.

Griffin played 41 games during his record-setting career at Baylor. He com-

pleted 800 of 1,192 passes (67 percent) for 10,366 yards with 78 touchdowns and 17 interceptions, along with 2,254 yards and 33 TDs rushing.

## Irish football coach Kelly gets 2-year extension SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Notre Dame athletic director Jack Swarbrick is

pleased with Brian Kelly's progress leading the football program — and the reward adds up to five more years.

Following a pair of 8-5 seasons that both ended with a bowl appearance, Kelly has received a two-year contract extension which will keep him with the Fighting Irish through the 2016 season.

Swarbrick announced the decision Tuesday and says he is pleased with Kelly's efforts in his first two seasons after being hired to replace Charlie Weis. The Irish, who beat Miami in the 2010 Sun Bowl, lost to Florida State 18-14 in the Champs Sports Bowl last month after blowing a 14-0 lead.

Kelly has pledged the Irish will cut down on the turnovers that hurt them this past season. One of his top priorities will be deciding on a starting quarterback among three candidates: junior Tommy Rees, who took over after the first half of a stunning season-opening loss to South Florida and started the next 12 games; junior Andrew Hendrix, who showed promise as a changeof-pace runner and passer in Kelly's spread offense; or untested and talented Everett Golson, who did not play last year as a freshman.

Dayne Crist, who was benched after the first half of the loss to South Florida, has transferred to Kansas. Two other players who might have bolted for the NFL decided to return to South Bend for another season: linebacker and leading tackler Manti Te'o and talented tight end Tyler Eifert.

Kelly's coaching staff will also have a different look next season.

Running backs coach Tim Hinton and offensive line coach Ed Warinner are gone; Chuck Martin, who had been coaching the safeties, takes over at offensive coordinator for Charley Molnar after he left for the head job at Massachusetts; and defensive coordinator Bob Diaco was given the title of assistant head coach.

It certainly felt like it in a quiet locker room on Sunday night, with nose tackle Casey Hampton and defensive end Brett Keisel joining the injured list. Both will likely require offseason surgery and while Keisel will almost certainly return it's unclear whether Hampton, who will turn 35 before the start of next season and is scheduled to make about \$8 million, will be afforded the same luxury.

The defense's oldest player,

James Farrior, turned 37 a week ago and will take his time before deciding what to do about 2012.

Though new faces have emerged, particularly defensive end Ziggy Hood and linebacker Jason Worilds, the younger players understand filling the leadership void will be difficult.

"That'll be tough, but all the older guys, they installed the mindset of playing Steeler football," cornerback William Gay said. "New captains are going to have to step up, guys that have been around, and it's just the same old thing: playing Steeler football. And that's what we're going to do."

They'll do it with an offense that piled up yards but not points.

Ben Roethlisberger battled through a sprained left foot, a fractured right thumb and a badly sprained left ankle to top 4,000 yards passing for the second time in his career but the Steelers averaged 20.3 points per game, hardly enough in a league where the best teams put up video game



"I'm not going to vote for any of the people that are linked to steroids. I could change down the road, but that's the real strong feeling I have now," said Hal Bodley of MLB.com, the former lead baseball writer for USA Today. "I have such a great passion for the game that anything that taints it in the least way, I have a problem with it."

Bonds is a 14-time All-Star, seven-time MVP, eight-time Gold Glove outfielder and twotime batting champion. He holds the home run records with 73 in a season and 762 in his career. He also was convicted in April of obstruction of justice for giving an evasive answer in 2003 to a grand jury investigating drug distribution.

Clemens is an 11-time All-Star, seven-time Cy Young Award winner and the 1986 AL MVP. He also is ninth on the career list with 354 wins and third with 4.672 strikeouts. He also is scheduled for a trial in April on charges he lied when he told a congressional committee he never used PEDs, facing one count of obstruction of Congress, three counts of making false statements to Congress and

two counts of perjury. Sosa, the 1998 NL MVP who is seventh with 609 homers, was accused in a media report of testing positive in baseball's 2003 survey and avoided giving direct answers when he testified before Congress.
