

Company gets 2 more weeks to pay Timberlanes taxes

SALEM - Unique Ventures Group, the company that purchased Timberlanes, was granted a 14 day continuance on a court order to pay all back taxes and confirm the sale of the property, Assistant Columbiana County Prosecutor Tad Herold said Thursday.

During a Jan. 13 phone hearing Columbiana County Common Pleas Court Judge Scott

Washam had ordered the company to file a confirmation of sale and payment of back taxes within 14 days.

The deadline was Thursday and Herold said the company's attorney called Wednesday saying they didn't have the money.

Herold said Unique Ventures was trying to line up "franchise money" and because of the circumstances Herold said he did not object to

Herold explained the company had originally asked for 30 days on Jan. 13, but Washam denied that.

Last March, Unique Ventures bought Timberlanes on a credit bid during a sheriff's sale.

It was the sole bidder.

County Treasurer Nick Baborak said the arrearage totaled over \$100,000 including \$94,193 in property taxes on two parcels.

Owners get 6 months to fix TanFastic building in Salem

LISBON - The owners of the East State Street building, which housed TanFastic, have agreed in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court to make substantial repairs to the building within six months.

In an agreement between their attorney Brian Macala and City Law Director Brooke Zellers, Timothy and Deborah Smith have agreed to make repairs to the building within the next six months. The building at 363 E. State St. will not be reopened until the repairs are made and an inspection has been passed.

The agreement allows the Smiths to re-enter the building to begin making repairs.

"My clients' desire is to get the place built back up, rehabilitated," Macala said after the

He added estimates by his clients and the city to demolish the building within Environmental Protection Agency regulations were somewhere between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Additionally, there remains a lienholder who would have to

"The city of Salem gets to keep buildings and businesses in downtown," Zellers said of the city's interest in seeing the Smiths make repairs as opposed to demolishing the building.

Two Salem firefighters, Inspectors Mike Burns and Aaron Loper, attended Thursday's hearing. The two men inspected the building in the past, bringing concerns to the city about the condition.

The Butler Art Institute, 343 E. State St., located next to Smith's building, had contacted the city about bricks from the neighboring building falling and causing damage. The Butler Art Institute's website now notes there are no current exhibits being held at the Salem branch.

The earliest report of damage to the building was a June 2008 fire department report. One citation on Nov. 16, 2010 noted the inspectors had requested repairs be made or the damaged portions demolished. However, subsequent reports noted the building's roof continued to leak and there were expanding holes in the upper floor.

Death at Calcutta Wendy's considered a suicide

CALCUTTA - The death of a young man at Wendy's on state Route 170 is being considered a suicide by the St. Clair Township Police Department.

Chief Don Hyatt confirmed Thursday afternoon that the 20-something man's death was self-inflicted.

The man's body was found in the restaurant's office by owner Patrick Clutter when he came to open up for the day, according to reports. The victim was an employee as well as a family member, Hyatt said.

Officers arrived on the scene just before 9 a.m. and stood by as the victim was checked by Lifeteam ambulance personnel, who found no signs of life, at which point the county coroner's office was notified.

An investigation by township police and the coroner's office is under way, but Hyatt said, "Every indication is that the young man took his own life. There were no signs of foul play, no forced entry, and nothing was ransacked."

The restaurant was closed for the day, which didn't stop customers from trying to order. Area police reported being called by irate customers saying they were at the drive-up window and demanding to know why no one was taking their orders.

Panel wants limit of 5 cats/dogs per household

SALEM - An ordinance revision being recommended to city council will limit the number of dogs and cats in any city household to five, with a kennel the only ex-

"I believe five is fair," Councilwoman Cyndi Baronzzi Dickey said Thursday night.

The Rules and Ordinances Committee of city council voted 3-0 to clarify the section dealing with the number of dogs and cats allowed in any one residence, making it clear that it's limited to a total combination of five.

Councilman Rick Drummond presided over the meeting as chairman of the committee, joined by fellow committee members Dickey and Councilman Clyde Brown. Besides a reporter, Housing Inspector Dan Rice was the only other attendee.

The ordinance regarding animals first came up for review last year after Police Chief Bob Floor asked for clarification of the section dealing with the number of dogs or cats allowed due to a question on whether that meant five dogs or five cats or five dogs and five cats for a total of

The current line says "no person shall keep or harbor more than five dogs or five cats at a residential

Open house set by Columbia Gas on Salem line project

SALEM - Columbia Gas will hold an open house from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Feb 9 in council chambers at city hall to explain the details of a \$4.25 million gas line replacement project affecting businesses and residences in the center of Salem this year.

According to a press release issued this week, the work area will include from Seventh Street to the north, Railroad Street to the south, Vine Street to the east and Stewart Avenue to the west, with a few small exceptions.

The project is expected to begin next month for the replacement of more than 43,000 feet of existing steel pipe with long-lasting plastic pipe, along with the relocation of indoor gas meters to the outside of homes and businesses.

Letters with detailed information about the project were expected to go out this week to affected customers. The detailed information will cover the steps to be taken and will include a map showing the affected streets. The map is also



OEPA reports on spill

SALEM — The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency considers the case closed concerning a small oil spill last week which was traced back to a Pershing Street recycling business.

OEPA spokesman Mike Settles said a field representative visited the Downtown Metals business at 432 W. Pershing St. on Thursday as a followup to a visit last Friday when the business was considered the likely source of a spill into the storm sewer which ended up in Buttermilk Run, the creek along Pennsylvania Avenue.

A plumbing snake was placed in the floor drain in the garage and oil was found on the end of it when it was brought back out last week. Settles said the floor drain apparently emptied directly into the sewer.

The floor drain in the garage and the floor drain in the main building have both been sealed and covered with concrete in an effort to prevent a similar incident. The business owner also planned to do some additional work on the property in the spring.

"The gentleman was fully cooperative," Settles said.

City firefighters were contacted the morning of Jan. 19 after someone called the police regarding a sheen on the water along Pennsylvania Avenue, then the source was tracked back to the area of Pershing Street in the storm sewer. Booms used to absorb materials during spills were placed in four different spots and firefighters built a pair of dams to reduce the water flow along Pennsylvania Avenue.

All that's left now is to figure the cost for the response. Fire Chief Jeff Hughes said a bill would be sent to the business owner to cover the costs for the firefighters, including overtime since off-duty firefighters were called out.

Settles said the OEPA also bills its time and costs to the responsible party.

Death of Gerald Klusch officially ruled homicide

LISBON – The death last fall of Gerald Klusch has been officially ruled a homicide, with two gunshot wounds to the head from an undetermined range listed as the cause.

Sheriff Ray Stone said his department has been investigating the case as if it was a homicide since Klusch's disappearance in September. The official ruling will not change the investigation which continues to be ongoing.

Besides continuing to work with family members, Stone said investigators are waiting for results from the Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Identification. The sheriff's department had BCII investigators collect evidence from Klusch's pickup, which was found damaged and with blood inside the bed on Beacon Light Road the day after his disappearance. BCII was also given Klusch's clothing which was found with his body, and his wallet, which was found near the body with Klusch's identification and credit cards still inside.

Klusch's body, which was recovered on Nov. 18 in a wooded area off Hazel Run Road near Salineville, had been sent to the coroner's office in Summit County for examination. Following the results from that investigation,

Columbiana County Coroner Dr. William Graham signed the death certificate listing homicidal penetrating gunshot wounds (2) of the head as the cause of death.

Klusch, 71, of U.S. Route 30, Lisbon, was last seen alive by his employee Matt Bailey when Klusch dropped Bailey off at his home on Dungannon Road on Sept. 29.





There are those, go figure, who seem to live for such moments — to publicly ridicule at the expense of others. Even those who protect and serve. Who hasn't heard all of those worn-out cops and doughnuts iokes?

Granted, this must be causing embarrassment. Was Bell's escape neglect? Hard to believe. Carelessness, maybe? Certainly at least to a degree. This does fall squarely on the cops. And, yes, it could've been worse — nobody got hurt or even killed by this.

Other local departments and police members must be feeling for the red-faced Leetonia Police Department and Chief John Soldano. Perhaps all of us should do likewise. At least to a degree. The escape happened. It shouldn't have but it did.

For every slip — such as the regrettable one that happened Tuesday — local police have hundreds of moments when arrests, serving warrants, helping out community members and defending the law are executed without a stumble. This usually all goes unnoticed. And while this area isn't a big crime-ridden metro there are everyday risks. Cops' lives are on the line on a daily basis. Understand that reality and appreciate all of those who serve including Chief Soldano and members of the Leetonia police force. There's no escaping that they deserve our full respect and support.





Newt in Wonderland



KATHLEEN PARKER When it comes to Newt Gingrich's post-speaker activities on the Hill, it all depends on what your definition of "lobbying" is.

In Monday's debate, Mitt Romney charged Gingrich with "influence peddling." But Gingrich insists that he was merely working as a historian when he collected \$1.6 million from Freddie Mac over a six-year period. Which in some version of re-

ality could be true. Broadly speaking, a historian who is hired to dig ditches is still a historian.

But, strictly speaking, Gingrich did sign a contract with the mortgage giant at a time when Republicans wanted to end its special status as a government-backed private entity. And, he *was* a cheerleader for Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae, according to political action committee donors who heard him speak in 2007 before he became a critic insisting that others who backed the mortgage companies should be jailed.

Under pressure from the Romney campaign, Gingrich's consulting firm released a copy of one year of its contract with Freddie Mac, which leaves another five years unaccounted for and only shows earnings of \$300,000. That leaves a significant time gap and a chunk of change, but the operative question is whether Gingrich acted as a lobbyist for the company. The question is crucial to the issue of character because the American people and congressmen deserve to know whether someone is being paid to advocate for a position.

A lobbyist for Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae whose tenure overlapped with Gingrich's told me on background that both signed the same contract. This person immediately registered as a lobbyist and said that Gingrich was clearly exerting his influence, though he may have been able to maintain a legal, if not entirely ethical, distance from the definition of "lobbying."

The law is very specific about what constitutes "lobbying," having to do with, among other things, the number of times one meets with legislators and/or how many times one speaks to a particular group. If you come just under that number, then you're technically within legal bounds.

Gingrich was familiar with relevant law, as one might imagine, and in 2000 even hired the co-author of a legal text on lobbying to advise him. He

didn't want to step over the line, clearly, and may not have. But it is fair to ask whether such linewalking is appropriately transparent and forthright for a presidential candidate. If you only meet once with a high-level government official to advance a position for which you are being paid, does anyone really believe that's not lobbying?

Gingrich's claim to have been hired as a historian, meanwhile, is a hard sell when no such role exists. It is also a stretch for him to present himself as an antiestablishment, Reagan-conservative rebel when he is raking in money for his association with companies, some of whose interests are anything but conservative

Yet another mother lode for Gingrich has been the health care industry. Various companies paid Gingrich \$55 million between 2001 and 2010, according to Bloomberg News. When asked what the companies received in return, Gingrich told The Washington Post that they got to visit with "a really important guy who really knows a lot and who really has lots of information." That person would be Gingrich's Holy Trinity — Me, Myself and I.

Gingrich also earned more than a million from drugmaker Novo Nordisk, reportedly to help expand the U.S. market for its diabetes treatment. Again, there's nothing wrong with this as long as Gingrich was honest about his role with the company. The company's own annual report to shareholders listed Gingrich under "public-policy activities," which, the company added, "are often referred to as lobbying."

He also personally urged GOP congressmen to support the \$395 billion Medicare prescription drug benefit, according to, among others, Rep. Jeff Flake and former Reps. Jeb Bradley and Butch Otter. Gingrich is unapologetic for supporting the Medicare benefit, especially while campaigning in Florida where an appreciative elderly population is otherwise known as a significant voting bloc. And it was, after all, a Republican initiative under President George W. Bush, even though many conservatives opposed it then as now.

Gingrich has insisted that throughout these dealings he was merely acting as a private concerned citizen, chatting up his colleagues about issues of mutual interest. This may well be the case, even within the legal definition of "lobbying," but most people don't get paid millions to shoot the bull over massively lucrative legislative initiatives. For Gingrich in Wonderland, as Humpty Dumpty explained to Alice, "When I use a word, it means just what I choose it to mean — neither more nor less."

Is anybody in the Republican race serious?



using machine guns. Whoever the eventual "last man standing" turns out to be, he may not be standing very tall or very steadily on his feet — and he may be a pushover for

The Republican candidates' cir-

cular firing squad

now seems to be

Barack Obama in the general election, thanks to fellow Republicans.

Whether you are a Democrat, a Republican or an independent, this is a very serious and historically crucial time for the United States of America. What Mitt Romney did or did not do when he was with Bain Capital, or what Newt Gingrich did or did not say to his ex-wife, are things that should be left for the tabloids. With the economy still faltering and Iran on its way to getting nuclear bombs, surely we can get serious about the issues facing this nation. Or can we?

Mitt Romney's boasts about what he did at Bain Capital are as irrelevant as Newt Gingrich's demagogic attacks on Romney's role there. Romney is not running to become head of Bain Capital.

While Gingrich backed away from his demagoguery about Bain Capital, Romney is continuing to press ahead with his charges that Gingrich was a lobbyist for Freddie Mac. As someone who has been a consultant, but never a lobbyist, I know the difference.

As a consultant, I have offered advice to people in government and in private organizations, both businesses and non-profit organizations. But I have never gone to a government official to urge that official to make a decision favorable to those who were paying me, or to those for whom I did free consulting.

It takes two to tango, and lobbying requires not only a lobbyist but also someone who is being lobbied. With more than 500 people in Congress alone who could have been lobbied, and additional officials in the bureaucracies, if Romney cannot find even a single person to say that Gingrich lobbied him or her, then it is long past time for him to either put up or shut up.

On the other hand, if Romney just wants to sling a lot of mud in Newt's direction and hope that some of it sticks, then that should tell the voters a lot about Romney's character.

So much of what has been said by various Republican candidates, as well as by the media, has been in the nature of unsubstantiated, peripheral or irrelevant talking points for or against particular candidates, rather than serious statements about serious issues confronting the nation

So common has this approach become that even some conservative writers have come to the defense of John King, the CNN reporter who opened the South Carolina debate with a question about Newt Gingrich's former wife. These writers have declared that question "legitimate," in some undefined sense.

If all that "legitimate" means is that John King was not doing anything that many other reporters would have done in the same circumstances, that is making common practice a substitute for our own judgments about what is and is not relevant in a given context. Neither the audience in that room nor the millions watching on television were there to find out about Newt Gingrich's marital problems. If it is a common practice for the media to focus on such things, so much the worse for the media — and for the country.

"The politics of personal destruction"

— as Bill Clinton called it, and as he himself practiced it — is not the way to solve the nation's problems. It has already poisoned the well of political discourse this season and claimed Herman Cain as

its first victim, on the basis of unsubstantiated accusations by women with checkered pasts of their own.

Whether Herman Cain was good, bad or indifferent as a candidate, and whether his chances of winning the Republican nomination were substantial or non-existent is not the issue. Nor is this the issue as regards Newt Gingrich, Mitt Romney or any other candidate.

Poisoning the well of political discourse may be one of the reasons why we see such unsatisfactory sets of candidates for political office in both parties, not only this year but in previous election years as well.

Many able and decent people are understandably reluctant to subject themselves and their families to a mud-slinging contest or to media "gotcha" questions. The creeping acceptance of such practices is hardly a justification, but is itself part of the degeneration of our times.

The company owes \$90,248 in taxes on one parcel at 544 E. Pershing St. and \$3,945 for the parcel across Penn Avenue (parking lot).

A 60-room motel and steak house, Timberlanes was considered a Salem landmark.

It was opened in 1962 and closed its doors in January 2009 after being in placed in receivership.

Unique Ventures bought it from Ciena Capital Funding LLC in September of 2009 and had hoped to re-open later that year, but a legal appeal prevented that.

At the time of the sheriff's sale, Carl Baker of I-vest Development LLC, said the group (Unique Ventures) controlled the liquor license and a decision about placing a Perkins Restaurant, either upstairs in the main dining room or in the downstairs restaurant, were pending.

For many years, Timberlanes was an award-winning restaurant and acclaimed as the best in the region.

property." The committee is recommending they add a line saying "or any combination thereof, for a total of

Drummond said a previous revision done last summer which addressed the dog/cat number issue and added a section dealing with exotic animals has been scrapped. The council chamber was packed during the last meeting on the issue in August, when pit bull owners and a store owner who sells some exotic pets came armed with questions and criticisms for the proposal.

Nothing ever happened with the proposal, leaving the chief's question still unanswered, so Drummond said they were clarifying only the section the chief asked to be clarified. He asked if they thought they should add something about a grandfather clause for those people who currently have more than five dogs and cats, but Brown said five should be the limit.

"I see no reason to grandfather anybody in," he said.

Brown also talked about cats and how some people have indoor cats and outdoor cats and how do you count them, since many won't claim the ones outside if they're asked about them.

The consensus of the committee was that if a complaint if filed and someone is found out of compliance, they would have to take it upon themselves to get the number of dogs or cats or combination down to five.

"We're not going to go into peoples' homes counting animals," Dickey said.

Rice noted that the city doesn't usually respond to a residence for this type of situation unless a complaint is filed and sometimes the people complaining can exaggerate the numbers. He said he hasn't really had much of a problem with it in the last few years.

The committee also held a brief discussion on the issue of vacant houses. Drummond talked about how Councilman Brian Whitehill raised a safety issue regarding vacant houses due to copper thefts and the threat of explosion.

Brown said he thought that should fall to the responsibility of the titled owner and the city shouldn't be involved until somebody contacts the city with a complaint. He said the city doesn't have the personnel to keep watch on all the

Rice said he agreed with Brown and said a large number of vacant homes are owned by banks and a large number of them don't acknowledge ownership. Drummond questioned who maintains them. Rice said some of them contract with companies to take care of the properties, but some are contacted by the city when the grass gets too high. If the city mows the grass, the owner is billed or the cost is placed against the taxes.

Dickey talked about a program in Alliance where the city places a lien against a property if bills get to a certain level, sometimes ending up with the property, which can then be torn down or sold by the city.

Drummond said he didn't know if there's anything the city could really do about the vacant houses, but he wanted to start the discussion. He's planning to talk with Whitehill and check on an ordinance passed by Youngstown City Council to deal with the issue.

Fewer police calls in Green Township

GREENFORD - The Goshen Township Police Department 2011 annual report for the Green Township district showed a small decline in total number of events recorded compared to 2010, according to Chief Steve McDaniel.

Police continue to emphasize residential and business checks and the overall the numbers vary little from 2010 except in the number of traffic stops which dropped nearly 22 percent in 2011.

In 2010, there were 862 traffic stops compared to 673 in 2011.

There were nine adult OVIs and one OVI crash in 2011 compared to 11 adult OVI s in 2010.

There were also 51 traffic complaints in 2011 and 52 in 2010 which include downed trees.

There were no capital crimes recorded and one sex offense was list-

There were 5,822 total events in

2011 compared to 5,929 in 2010, a nine juvenile complaints in 2011 decrease of two percent while residential and business checks were up.

There were five residential and two business breaking and enterings in 2011 compared to seven residential and five business breaking and enterings in 2010.

During 2011 police made 1,977 business checks compared to 1,807 in 2010 for an increase of 8.5 percent while making 2,433 residence checks in 2011 compared to 2,382 in 2010, for a two percent increase.

In 2011, the department responded to 25 car versus deer calls compared to 35 in 2010 and handled 38 animal complaint in 2011 compared to 24 in

The department answered 24 civil matter/custody calls in 2011 and 20

Domestic dispute and domestic violence calls totaled 24 in 2011 compared to 26 in 2010; non-domestic disputes in 2011 totaled three compared to six in 2010; and there were compared to 28 in 2010.

Police also handled responded to 14 criminal endangering calls in 2011 compared to 18 in 2010 while responding to 62 suspicious person/vehicle calls in 2011 compared to 79 in 2010.

Thefts in all categories (more and less than \$500 and from vehicles and buildings) totaled 41 in 2011 compared to 18 in 2010.

Goshen Township police assisted area police departments, the highway patrol, Mahoning county sheriff and the Green Township Fire Department 90 times in 2011 compared to 92 assists in 2010.

Also, in 2011, there were nine juvenile complaints, 18 mental calls, three misuse of credit cards, 15 noise complaints; one runaway juvenile; and 12 welfare checks.

Police cruisers racked up 77,409 miles patrolling the township.

Group aims for ban on fracking, injection wells in Beaver Township

NORTH LIMA – Residents of Beaver Township are looking to fight back against oil and gas companies.

Angry residents from the township and other surrounding communities are hoping to enlist the services of the Pennsylvania-based Community Environmental Legal Defense Fund (CELDF) to develop a community rights resolution to ban hydraulic fracturing ("fracking") and injection well deposits in the township.

"We as a community have a right to clean air and clean water," said organizer Julia Fuhrman Davis. "These companies are putting harmful materials into our community putting us and our future generations at danger. We as a community have a right to put a stop to it.'

The residents are responding to the Class II injection well on state Route 7 just north of the McDonald's in North Lima which will be used to deposit potentially hazardous material created during the fracking process at drill sites in western Pennsylvania. Injections wells have been banned in Pennsylvania by the United States Environmental Protection Agency, but are permitted in Ohio, which is regulated by the state EPA.

According to Davis, the CELDF has assisted several communities in Pennsylvania and New York pass rightsbased ordinances banning various corporate activities – including fracking - deemed harmful to the environment by the residents. She said she hopes the group can help put an end to fracking and injection wells in the area.

At a brainstorming meeting Tuesday night, residents split into groups to develop plans for educating the public about the dangers presented by fracking and the injection well, as well as to prepare to work with the CELDF to obtain signatures on a petition that will be used in the community rights resolution protecting residents' health, safety, welfare and property values. Davis said she plans to present the resolution to township trustees in February in hopes of achieving a local bill banning the activity in the township.

According to the CELDF website, rights-based ordinances rely on a community's right to local self-government, the rights of natural communities and ecosystems, the right to water and the rights of community members over corporations; and they are not challenged by corporations. Non-rights-based ordinances, however, are based on state regulatory law and are frequently challenged and over-ruled due to violations of the corporations constitutional and civil rights.

The CELDF, which has successfully assisted communities in Pennsylvania, New York and West Virginia, did not respond to an attempt at contact.



Gas service will need to be shut off at some point



Eltringham lawyer questions whether he can get fair trial after stories

LISBON - Attorney Richard Hura questioned Thursday in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court whether media coverage would prevent his client, who is accused of beating and robbing a World War II veteran, from receiving a fair trial in this county.

Joseph Eltringham, 44, is charged with aggravated robbery, a first degree felony; felonious assault, a second degree felony; and intimidation, a third degree felony. He is scheduled for jury trial on March 12.

There have been several hearings held in Eltringham's case, including a preliminary hearing in Columbiana County Municipal Court when 86-year-old Robert Kastelic took the stand and testified about the evening of Aug. 17, when he says he was beaten, threatened and robbed in his own home by Eltringham, who is an acquaintance. Kastelic had to crawl out of his bedroom window,

then across the street to the neighbor's field to escape. He laid in a field there until he was found by Chief Deputy Allen Haueter.

The story reciting that testimony along with several others have been in the local newspapers, and Hura displayed the news articles on large poster boards in the court room Thursday, showing the stories ran on the front page and above the fold. Hura said both he and Eltringham's family share concerns about whether or not a fair trial will be possible.

In December, Judge Scott Washam had denied a request by Hura for Eltringham's to have his case moved to a felony Veterans Court or the Mental Health Court in Mahoning County. Thursday he reiterated a previous statement that he would wait until jury selection to determine whether pretrial publicity will hinder Eltringham's right to a fair trial in the

Also on Thursday, it was reported Eltringham's psychological evaluation has been completed, but the results were not yet completed. Hura again asked his client be tested for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder by an expert in that field as it pertains to military personnel. While Hura previously had pushed for an expert in Illinois, on Thursday he said he now has found a local expert.

Eltringham, who before his arrest was a member of the National Guard, had recently returned from active duty overseas before the alleged attack.

Appeals court stays collection of water funds pending appeal

LISBON – East Liverpool will have to wait a little while longer to find out if and when it can collect on the \$4.8 million judgment owed it by the Buckeye Water District.

The Ohio 7th District Court of Appeals agreed this week to delay enforcement of the judgment pending the outcome of an appeal filed last month by the BWD of a ruling issued by Columbiana County Common Pleas Court Judge C. Ashley Pike.

The court indicated it is prepared to act quicker than usual with this case, saying the matter will be "given expedited consideration." A hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Feb. 29 at the appeals court in Youngstown, with written arguments and replies due before the hearing.

The BWD was appealing the Dec. 13 decision issued by Judge Pike stemming from East Liverpool's successful breach-ofcontract lawsuit against the BWD involving a water-purchasing agreement. The latest ruling was about what BWD funds could be used to satisfy the judgment since some of the funds represented money loaned from federal and state agencies for various BWD projects.

Pike ruled that of the \$4.2 million in question, only \$27,468 in a BWD account marked for the Ohio Water Development Authority was protected from being garnished to satisfy the judgment owed East Liverpool. One of the other agencies owed money by the BWD, the Ohio Public Works Commission, also filed an appeal challenging Pike's ruling.

County commissioners are also on the hook for the judgment since the county is a co-defendant in the lawsuit because it once operated the water district that later became the BWD. Commissioners turned over control of the district when the BWD was formed in the 1990s, which has been operating it as an independent agency ever since.



What makes blood potassium rise?



Dr. **Donohue**

DEAR DR. **DONOHUE:** In the past you raised the subject of a high potassium reading and said it could come from the way blood was collected. Will you repeat that for me? If I remember correctly, it was caused by the method used in collecting the

blood. Is there an explanation for a high reading to persist? Every food seems to have potassium in it. What is the acceptable potassium level? What underlying conditions cause it to rise? - **D.P.**

ANSWER: If you're into looking things up on the Internet, high blood potassium is hyperkalemia. It spawns a number of problems. Heartbeat abnormalities are one of them. It changes the appearance of the EKG. Very high levels stop all heart action. High potassium leads to muscle weakness and even paralysis. It upsets the body's normal acid-base balance.

The reference you want repeated was on pseudohyperkalemia (false high blood potassium). It's a release of potassium from blood cells during or shortly after blood is collected in a tube. Clenching the hands into a fist too forcefully or too repeatedly can lead to potassium leak from blood cells. Fist-clenching makes veins stand out so obtaining the specimen is easier and less painful. Cooling of the tube on its way to the lab is another source for false potassium elevation. These are not common occurrences. A second sample solves any confusion arising from a false elevation of potas-

Potassium is found in many foods. We're encouraged to get 4,700 mg of it daily. It keeps blood pressure on the low side. Dietary potassium is seldom the cause of persistent blood elevation of it. The kidneys are expert chemists and get rid of any dietary overloads. Conditions associated with a rise in potassium include muscle injury, strenuous exercise, heart failure, overuse of nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (Aleve, Advil, Motrin, etc.), failing adrenal glands and kidney malfunction. Don't get involved in tracking the cause of high potassium. That's something your doctor

The normal reading for potassium is 3.5 to 5.0 mEq/L. Symptoms don't appear until the value is 6.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My dad died of diverticulitis at age 58. I live in fear of it. Is it inherited? - **F.W.**

ANSWER: Heredity has little, if anything, to do with diverticulosis or diverticulitis. Diverticulosis is the presence of many tiny pouches protruding from the wall of the colon. Diverticulitis is inflammation of those diverticula. Death from diverticulitis is quite rare.

Diverticulosis is common in North America. One reason is the lack of dietary fiber. Our grains (flour) are refined. The refining process removes fiber from the grains. The best way to prevent diverticulosis is to increase fiber with whole-grain cereals and breads, vegetables and fruits.

1993 — American Chad Rowan is awarded the highest rank in sumo wrestling, the ancient Japanese sport, making him the first foreign "yokozuna." The 6-foot-8, 455pounder from Honolulu, becomes the 64th person to hold the top rank in the sport's history.

1996 — The U.S. Golf Association elects Judy Bell as the first female president in its 101-year history.

2001 — Jennifer Capriati upsets threetime winner Martina Hingis 6-4, 6-3 to win the Australian Open and her first Grand Slam tournament title.

2003 — Hermann Maier wins a World Cup super giant slalom in Kitzbuehel, Austria, a victory he ranks among his finest triumphs. The win comes 18 months after he almost loses his leg in a motorcycle crash.

2007 — Serena Williams wins her third Australian Open singles title, routing Maria Sharapova 6-1, 6-2. Unseeded and ranked 81st, Williams wins her eighth and most improbable Grand Slam. She is the second unseeded woman to win the Australian title in the Open era.

2008 — Novak Djokovic fends off unseeded Frenchman Jo-Wilfried Tsonga 4-6, 6-4, 6-3, 7-6 (2) in the Australian Open final, earning his first Grand Slam title.

2008 — Eric Staal wins the most valuable player award in the NHL All-Star game, registering two goals and an assist in the East's 8-7 win over the Western Conference. Staal helps set up Marc Savard's winning goal with 20.9 seconds left.

2010 — Washington's Gilbert Arenas and Javaris Crittenton are suspended without pay for the remainder of the season by NBA commissioner David Stern. Both players admitted bringing a gun or guns into the Wizards' locker room — a violation of the collective bargaining agreement — after a dispute stemming from a card game on a team flight.

2011 — Roger Federer, the 16-time Grand Slam winner, is knocked out of the Australian Open by Novak Djokovic in a semifinal match, 7-6 (3), 7-5, 6-4. Federer's loss marks the first time since 2003 that he wouldn't hold any of the four major titles.



Bucs hire Rutgers' Greg Schiano as new coach

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The Buccaneers are counting on Greg Schiano to lead them back to respectability and transform Tampa Bay into consistent winners — much in the same way he made Rutgers matter again.

The 45-year-old former Scarlet Knights coach was hired Thursday, more than three weeks after the Bucs fired Raheem Morris following a 4-12 finish. The team scheduled a press conference for Friday to introduce Schiano,

who inherits a team that allowed the most points in the NFL this season. "Coach Schiano is a bright, meticulous teacher who knows how to get the most out of his players," general manager Mark Dominik said. "He built and ran a pro-style program at Rutgers, and he's a defensive-minded coach whose teams have always been characterized by toughness and a physical style of

Schiano was at Rutgers for 11 seasons, taking them from college football

Colts owner wishes Manning kept comments in-house

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Jim Irsay expects Peyton Manning to keep his complaints to himself. Or at least within the confines of the Colts' team complex. Shortly after introducing Chuck Pagano as Indianapolis' new coach, the

team owner responded to the comments Manning made earlier this week by referring to the only four-time league MVP as a "politician."

"I don't think it's in the best interest to paint the horseshoe in a negative light, I really don't," Irsay said, referring to the Colts' logo. "The horseshoe always comes first, and I think one thing he's always known, because he's been around it so long, is that, you know, you keep it in the family. If you've got a problem you talk to each other, it's not about campaigning or anything like that."

Clearly, Irsay was not happy to see Manning's comments in The Indianapolis Star on Tuesday, just as the Colts were interviewing Pagano.

Manning explained that the environment at team headquarters was not the best and said people were nervous because of the major offseason overhaul that has already claimed the jobs of vice chairman Bill Polian, general manager Chris Polian, coach Jim Caldwell and most of Caldwell's assistants.

Irsay didn't like that, either.

"I have so much affection and appreciation for Peyton. I mean we're family. We always will be and we are," Irsay said. "He's a politician. I mean look at, when it comes to being competitive, let's just say on a scale of 1 to 10, 10 being the highest, we're both 11s, OK? Prince Fielder, the biggest freeagent bat of them all, had signed with Detroit.

Suddenly, catching the Tigers in the AL got a whole lot

"I would have preferred him to sign somewhere else, but we can't worry about that," Acta said, smiling. "We have to worry about our ballclub getting better and taking the next step. So we'll just deal with it.'

Acta and several of his players kicked off "Tribe on Tour" Thursday, a four-day event where the Indians will stop at shopping malls around Northeast Ohio and interact with their fans, some of whom are still reeling from Fielder's decision to sign a nine-year contract that will pay him at least \$23 million per season until 2020.

The Indians don't have that kind of money to throw around

 not now, and probably not ever. However, just because Fielder landed with the division champions, Acta's focus hasn't changed for 2012. Cleveland challenged for nearly five months last season before injuries caused them to fade.

Acta is confident his team will contend again.

"We know what we have and we know what we have to work with," Acta said. "Before the offseason started we weren't targeting the guy who signed with L.A. (Albert Pujols) and the guy who just signed with Detroit. We're just going to have to do it with our internal options. They played pretty well last year for 4 1/2 months so we have to keep them on the field and we have to take the next step and go from there. "We can't sell dreams to people."

Acta said there's still a chance the Indians, who reportedly pursued first baseman Carlos Pena before he re-signed with Tampa Bay, could sign a hitter before the offseason ends. Acta has been a "witness" to general manager Chris Antonetti's efforts to improve a team that went 80-82 last season.

The Indians have protected

themselves this winter by inviting 20 non-roster players to camp with the goal of adding depth in case of injuries. They don't know when — or

if — Carmona will be able to be with them in Arizona this season as he works through his legal entanglement. On Thursday, Carmona, whose real name is believed to be Roberto Hernandez Heredia, was placed on Major League Baseball's restricted list.

The move allows the Indians to open a spot on their 40-man roster. Also, the club does not have to pay Carmona until he reports to the team and there's no guarantee that will happen. He's scheduled to make \$7 million this season after the club exercised its option on him in October. Authorities say Carmona, who was arrested last week in Santo Domingo, is 31 and not 28 as he had claimed

and the Indians believed. Acta has been in daily contact with Carmona. However, he said he could not comment on any specifics regarding the pitcher's case, the latest involving a player from the Dominican Republic lying about his age and birthdate to play in the U.S.
