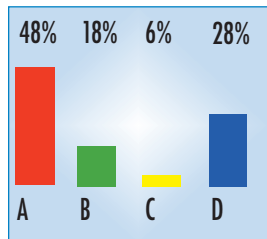

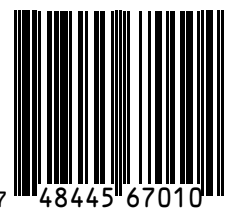

## Bond at \$1 million in child porn case

SEBRING — Mahoning County Court Judge Diane Vettori set a \$1 million cash/surety bond for Darryl G. Hipps of Green Township who was charged with pandering obscenity involving a minor and pandering sexually-oriented material involving a minor.

He was charged by the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation last week.

Hipps, 52, was arraigned on 15 counts of child pornography, five second-degree felonies and 10 fourth-degree felonies.

A preliminary hearing was set for April 9 before Vettori.

Visiting Prosecuting Attorney Mike McBride said the second-degree counts each carry up to eight years in prison while the fourth-degree felonies each carry up to 18 months in prison.

Hipps remains in Mahoning County jail and McBride said the case could go to the grand jury.

Hipps requested court-appointed counsel and Vettori questioned him about his income which Hipps indicated came from a military pension and claimed he was a decorated veteran.

The BCI said he is a retired senior chief petty officer for the United States Navy.

The residence on Pleasant Valley Court is listed as a Salem address and is in Green Township.

Mahoning County auditor records show it has a total market value of \$210,210.

Hipps told Vettori that he "got to a cross roads and took the wrong one" and claimed his extended family was in South Carolina.

McBride also noted Hipps was on suicide watch after indicating he had nothing to lose and that he might as well kill himself now.

McBride said Hipps' wife indicated that she had obtained a protection order against Hipps.

Vettori said if Hipps was able to post the bond he will be under house arrest, have no contact with children, surrender his passport and not use electronic venues like Facebook.

Authorities received information of alleged trafficking in child pornography and on March 26, BCI agents along with the FBI, Youngstown Police, the Mahoning County Sheriff, Goshen Township police and the Ohio Internet Crime Against Childrens Task Force from Cuyahoga County converged at Hipps' residence executing a search warrant after a three-month investigation, Jill Del Greco, a BCI spokesperson said.

## Salem couple dead on cruise

### FBI to probe apparent murder-suicide

Salem Police Det. Dave Talbert reported late Thursday that a couple found dead in an apparent murder-suicide on a cruise ship docked in Puerto Rico was from Salem, according to what he was told by the FBI.

The names of the man and woman weren't being released, but Talbert was familiar with them from an incident ruled a freak accident in December. There had been no police reports involving the couple since then.

The FBI contacted Salem Police Thursday evening to see what information the department had on the couple. Dispatch contacted Chief J.T. Panzozzi and he contacted Talbert as the point person to talk with the FBI, which is handling the death investigation.

According to an Associated Press story about the incident, the crew from the Holland America cruise ship found the bodies when they checked on the couple after not seeing them for a while.

Police Sgt. Ricardo Cruz told the Associated Press that blood was found in the cabin aboard the ship identified as the Ryndam, but it was unclear how the couple died.

"We don't know yet whether an object was used or what the motive was," he said.

The Associated Press story said the FBI had taken over the investigation and it was unclear when the couple died.

The ship left Tampa, Fla., on Sunday for a two-week cruise in the southern Caribbean, stopping in Key West on Monday and then spending two days at sea before docking in historic Old San Juan on Thursday, Holland America spokesman Erik Elvejord told the Associated Press.

"We are terribly saddened by this tragic event," the company said in a statement.

The ship was scheduled to

## Salem looking to raze 2nd building

### Mayor to make offer for former bakery to east of TanFastic site

SALEM — If Mayor John Berlin can broker a deal to buy the former Rosetti Bakery building on the east side of the TanFastic building, the city may end up with a two-for-one demolition project.

City council met in special session Thursday night, with part of the meeting behind closed doors, to discuss options related to the former bakery building at 385 E. State St. owned by the D'Andrew Soltis family.

After more than an hour of discussion, some open, some not, the members voted unanimously to allow the mayor to enter negotiations for the purchase of the property. The 18-foot wide, three-story building stands next to the TanFastic structure, which is slated for demolition on Monday due to safety concerns over its deteriorating condition.

Berlin said the family indicated a willingness to talk about an offer, but he needed council's permission before he could go forward with any type of negotiations, plus with the quick schedule for the demolition, the time to make an offer was now.

He explained that all the engineering reports he has seen noted that once that building is standing on its own, without the TanFastic building there, the windshear and weather will likely force the mortar to loosen on bricks and the owners could end up with a deterioration problem similar to what happened with the TanFastic.

## Sheriff: Should have checked on murder report sooner

LISBON — Columbiana County Sheriff Ray Stone said they should not have waited 20 hours to investigate the claims of a man who said his neighbor confessed to killing someone.

"Someone should have gone out and at least made contact" instead of waiting until the next morning, he said.

Stone was referring to the death of Quinn Wilson, 33, of East Liverpool, whose body was found in two pieces dumped along Seigler Road in Wayne Township on March 11. Daniel Landsberger, 54, Deselleson Road, Lisbon, is currently being held in the county jail on \$1 million bond after having been charged with tampering with evidence in connection with Wilson's death.

Dave Brewer showed up at the sheriff's office about 1 p.m. Sunday, March 8, to say his neighbor, later identified as Landsberger, confessed to

hitting and killing someone at the neighbor's home and had provided other details about the attack. Brewer said Landsberger had told him this the day before when he stopped by for coffee.

During Landsberger's bind-over court hearing, Deputy Richard Kimble, who took the report, testified he called several supervisors before finally speaking with Chief Deputy Allen Haueter, who told him to leave the report for him to review on Monday morning.

Stone said he first learned of the report when Haueter showed it to him shortly after he arrived at work on Monday, March 9. He said a detectives' meeting, already scheduled for later in the morning, was moved up to discuss the report, and they were at Landsberger's home by 9:18 a.m., where they found considerable blood evidence indicating something bad happened.

Stone said deputies are required to contact their supervisors for guidance when situations such as this occur, all the way up to Haueter, who calls the sheriff when he feels it necessary. "Our protocol is it makes it up the chain of command to me, and it

didn't," he said.

When asked why he was never called on March 8 or someone was told to investigate immediately, Stone said that is the chief deputy's decision based on the information available to him at the time.

"In hindsight, he should have called me," Stone said.

Haueter defended his decisions, but declined to give his reasoning.

"I made a decision I was comfortable with. My only regret is I didn't check with (Stone)," he said. "I had a good logical reason for my decision or I wouldn't have done it."

County Prosecutor Robert Herron, who has clashed with Stone over use of the county homicide task force, questioned Deputy Kimble in detail at Landsberger's hearing about his conversation with Haueter and why no one from the sheriff's office investigated Brewer's claims that day.

"You lost sleep over the fact you didn't go out there that night?" Herron asked him at one point

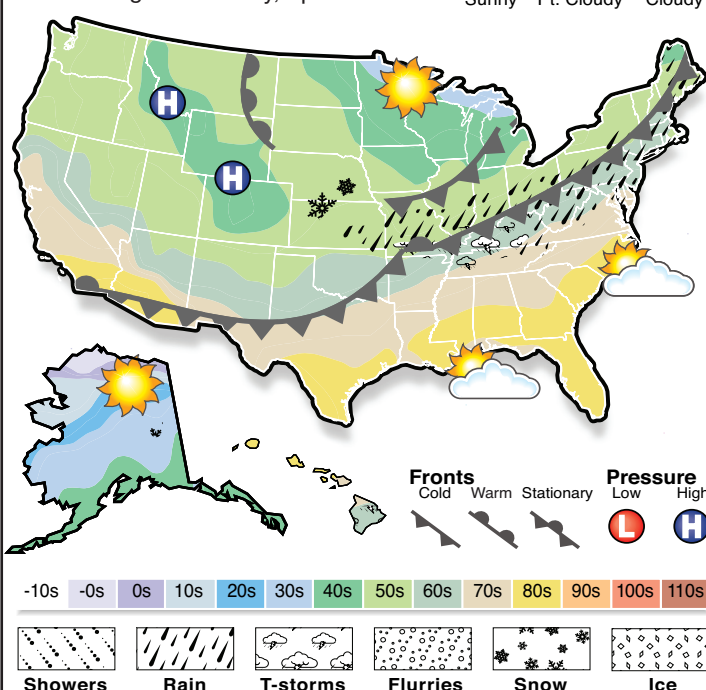

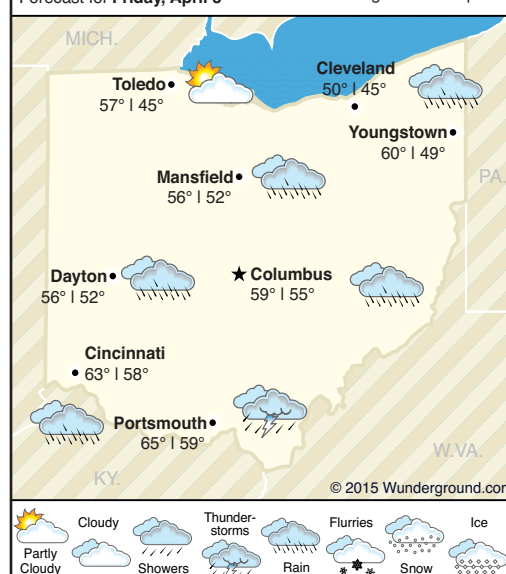

## 2 already in prison testify about day of shooting

LISBON — Two men already serving prison time for their involvement in the shooting death of Holly Carosiello appeared in orange prison jumpsuits and chains to testify before the Columbiana County Common Pleas Court jury in the aggravated murder trial of Nicolas Carosiello.

Carosiello is charged in the shooting death of his estranged wife, Holly.

Johnny Paroda, identified as the setup man, testified Thursday morning, while Jamie Adkins, Holly Carosiello's brother, testified in the afternoon.

Adkins described in detail how they arrived at the Carosiello home on Township Line Road in Madison Township the night of Aug. 12, 2011 and believed no one was there. He said he first knocked on the door and then after receiving no answer, attempted to kick in the back door two or three times, but the door would not open. Still he heard no one inside the home. He and Holly Carosiello began discussing other options for getting inside when they spotted the air conditioner unit in the window above the basement stairwell.

Adkins said he balanced with one hand against the home and used the other to try to push the unit in, but at first it would not budge. Then it slid in, and Adkins said he did not hear it fall. Next, Holly Carosiello tried to pull herself up, but couldn't.

Adkins noted Holly Carosiello was smaller, which made it easier for him to lift her through the window. She also knew the layout of the house, and any dogs inside would be familiar with her.

Choking up, Adkins described how he cupped his hands and boosted Holly Carosiello up, until her head and shoulders were above the window.

"I heard a popping sound," Adkins said, "and a flash of light. She started to fall into the stairwell. I tried to grab her, but I couldn't and she fell."

Adkins said Nicolas Carosiello shouted out the bedroom window, and Adkins heard three or four more gunshots go off as he and

Dustin Green, who had been hiding around the side of the house, took off running. Adkins said Joshua Rudder, his sister's boyfriend at the time, was waiting in the car and took off without them. He and Green made their way through the woods to Glenmoor.

Paroda testified Rudder showed up at his mother's house and told him "someone shot Holly."

Both Adkins and Paroda testified they had been under the influence of something that weekend. Paroda said he was drinking alcohol and taking four drugs he was prescribed to take. Adkins said he had been smoking marijuana throughout the weekend.

Paroda, the cousin of Holly Carosiello, said he had sold weed for Nicolas Carosiello in the past. Paroda paid \$1,100 per pound and was able to resell the weed for \$1,800. He knew there was money in it and further testified Carosiello had 10 to 15 pounds of marijuana being sold per week.

Paroda testified he went along and was involved in the first two attempts to steal from Nicolas Carosiello, but then said he became concerned someone was going to get hurt during these attempted home invasions.

After the second attempt in the afternoon of Aug. 12, Paroda told jurors he was worried about Patti Lewis, Nicolas Carosiello's mother, because "she is old." That is why phone records show Paroda, at 4:13 p.m. Friday, Aug. 12, called Carosiello to tell him what was going on. During that eight-minute conversation, Paroda testified, he told Carosiello "everything."

Paroda said Carosiello wanted to know who. When asked if Carosiello was angry about what he told him, Paroda responded, "I would be."

Paroda said Carosiello urged him to tell Adkins and the others he was going to be gone working on a car with his brother for two hours and his parents were out of town for a funeral.

Phone records show Paroda spent the evening in contact with both his cousin, Adkins, and Nicolas Carosiello. He assured Adkins no one was going to be home and he kept Carosiello updated on when and if the

burglary was going to occur.

Adkins testified he believes it was a setup, but Holly Carosiello was not the intended victim. Adkins said a few days later around the funeral he saw Paroda, who he said told him, "Holly wasn't supposed to be there."

"I believe they were setting me up to kill me," Adkins testified.

Paroda said he thought Carosiello was moving the cars to ambush Adkins and that Carosiello indicated he intended to beat up Adkins because of the attempted thefts. Paroda also testified he does not believe Carosiello meant to shoot and kill his estranged wife.

"The very next day I asked him why he shot my cousin," Paroda said of a conversation with Nicolas Carosiello. "He said he thought it was Jamie."

Actually, the decision for Holly Carosiello to go up to the house that night was a last-minute decision, according to Adkins. She had been the driver on Aug. 11 when Adkins had led another group to the house, found Carosiello and his family home and left without getting too close. The afternoon of Aug. 12, when a second attempt to burglarize the house occurred, Adkins and others have testified Holly Carosiello did not even go.

Adkins said when Paroda contacted him later in the day on Aug. 12, he told him there would be a window of opportunity between 8 and 10 p.m. when no one would be home. Adkins said some of the others involved in the two previous attempts were not able to go that night, including Paroda, who reportedly said he was fighting with his girlfriend again and she did not want him to go.

So Adkins said he invited Green, his sister and Rudder. Adkins said when they got to the house that night Rudder backed out and elected to wait in the car. It was then that Holly Carosiello decided to go up to the house on that third attempt.

Adkins testified he never got along well with Nicolas Carosiello, but the reason for going to the house those three times was always to take his "illegal weed and money."

Defense attorney Jennifer Gorby questioned Adkins about why he needed to take so many people with him, to which Adkins

responded he needed a person to drive and several people to look for the weed and money so they could get out quickly. He said Paroda had been inside the house in the past and had told him two or three places where the items were usually hidden.

Gorby questioned whether they were also going to take other things, like jewelry if they saw it laying around when they were inside. Adkins said they may have, but reiterated they were just there for the weed and money.

"I'm not going to carry a big ... TV out," Adkins said.

Both men admitted lying to detectives and authorities when they were questioned. Paroda said he did not know why he eventually started to tell the truth. Adkins admitted when he talked to authorities he lied in six of his seven statements. In an attempt not to implicate people, Adkins claimed they were going there to get some of Holly Carosiello's belongings from her estranged husband's house. But Adkins said his story has always been the same and truthful about the shooting on the back porch that night.

"The only reason I am here today is for my sister," Adkins said of his appearance in court. "I got more time (10 years) than anyone else in this case. (Nicolas Carosiello) did what he did and I did what I did."

Thursday was the third day of testimony in the trial of Carosiello, charged with aggravated murder with a firearm specification, possession of drugs and three counts of tampering with evidence. He faces 15 years to life without the possibility of parole if convicted of the aggravated murder charge.

Adkins is currently serving 10 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter, burglary and conspiracy to burglary for his part in the crime.

Paroda received an eight-year sentence after pleading guilty to complicity to involuntary manslaughter, three counts of conspiracy to commit burglary and two counts of obstructing official business all in relation to the Carosiello case. Additionally, he received another year for a probation violation for a 2009 robbery conviction.

## Women testify to roles in events leading up to death

LISBON — Two women who played minor roles in the events leading up to the shooting death of Holly Carosiello in August 2011 were among those who testified on Thursday.

Tonya Sinkbeil of East Liverpool, said she knew Jamie Adkins because Adkins was dating a cousin. Adkins, Holly Carosiello's brother, reportedly asked her to give him a ride the afternoon of Aug. 12, 2011. Sinkbeil said Adkins only told her he needed to go to some house and she did not know anything more than that.

She even brought her then 16-year-old niece along for the ride.

Sinkbeil testified she picked up Adkins at his girlfriend's house on St. Clair Avenue and he paid for gas for her vehicle. Then at his direction, she picked up other people whom she did not know. Sinkbeil said first they went to Bosco's Pizza on St. Clair Avenue and picked up a black man she knew only by his street name who was previously identified as Raymont Bryant.

Next she was asked to pick up Jordan Gainer at Giant Eagle, although which Giant Eagle was not verified in testimony. Then Adkins asked her to go toward Wellsville and they attempted to find the house of Nicolas Carosiello on Township Line Road.

Sinkbeil testified Adkins could not find it, even after he called his friend Johnny Paroda for directions. So she was asked to go pick up Paroda in Wellsville so he could take them.

According to Sinkbeil, she stopped down on the road and the three men, Adkins, Bryant and Gainer, headed for the house. She said they told her to drive around and

come back for them. The next thing she knew Adkins texted Paroda for her to come back and she saw them running down the driveway.

"That's when I knew something was wrong," Sinkbeil testified, adding the men were "a little hyper" when they jumped in her vehicle and Adkins said, "Go!"

She heard them talking about a lady and dog being home or they would have gotten what they came for. Sinkbeil said she was angry they involved her in the attempted burglary and she dropped them all off where she had picked them up. She denied taking the men swimming, something Adkins later testified she did.

Another woman, Stephanie DeRoss of Hookstown, Pa., testified at the time of the shooting she was seeing Brian Specht, described as Nicolas Carosiello's best friend. After learning of the attempted break in earlier the afternoon of Aug. 12, Carosiello reportedly called Specht out to his house to help him in case the would-be burglars returned.

DeRoss said they hid in the field northeast of the home behind a pickup truck and high bushes, along with Nicolas Carosiello, his girlfriend Martina Michael and for part of the time, Carosiello's brother, Tony. Carosiello was also on the phone at times with Johnny Paroda. At one point, DeRoss said Carosiello put the call on speaker phone.

She said she heard Carosiello tell Paroda to let Adkins know everyone was going to be away from the house. She also said she believed Carosiello intended to shoot someone if they came into the field or he saw them kicking down the door to the house.

Later after it got dark, she left with Specht

and they reached Specht's home, DeRoss said she saw a text message from Carosiello telling Specht he had just learned the burglars were coming. She said Specht sent a reply text message, "kill those mother (expletives)."

She testified Carosiello and Michael came to the trailer park where they lived the next morning, Carosiello and Specht spoke inside a vehicle and then they all went to the store where Carosiello bought a newspaper to see if there was anything about the shooting.

DeRoss said she broke up with a Specht only a couple days after the shooting, noting she has a child and "didn't want anything more to do with him."

Other testimony on Thursday included Bureau of Criminal Investigations computer expert Joann Gibb, who analyzed several phones, including the one used by Holly Carosiello.

County Sheriff's Detective Sgt. Jeff Haugh also testified briefly about his part of the investigation, which started the Monday after the shooting. He reiterated how a box of .22-caliber pistol shells and a .380 semi-automatic pistol were recovered out of Coal Hollow. He went over the phone records of several of the text messages and calls found on phones by Gibb. These contacts included some between Holly Carosiello and Jamie Adkins; Adkins and Paroda; Paroda and Nicolas Carosiello; Nicolas Carosiello and Tony Carosiello; and Brian Specht and Nicolas Carosiello.

The messages helped set up the time frame for the three reported attempts to burglarize Carosiello's home and the ambush Carosiello set up to catch them.

## German crash co-pilot researched suicide, doors

BERLIN (AP) — Germanwings co-pilot Andreas Lubitz spent time online researching suicide methods and cockpit door security in the week before crashing Flight 9525, prosecutors said Thursday — the first evidence that the fatal descent may have been a premeditated act.

As the browsing history on a tablet computer found at Lubitz's apartment added a disturbing new piece to the puzzle of the March 24 crash, French investigators said they had recovered the Airbus A320's flight data recorder — another step toward completing the picture.

Attention has focused on Lubitz since investigators evaluated the plane's cockpit voice recorder last week. They believe the 27-year-old locked his captain out of the cockpit during the flight from Barcelona to Duesseldorf and deliberately plunged the plane into a French mountainside.

Duesseldorf prosecutors said they had reviewed search terms from March 16-23 that were in the browser memory of the computer found in Lubitz's home in the city.

The co-pilot researched "on one hand medical treatment methods, and on the other hand informed himself about types and ways of going about a suicide," prosecutors' spokesman Ralf Herrenbrueck said in a statement. "In addition, on at least one day, (Lubitz) concerned himself for several minutes with search terms about cockpit doors and their security precautions," he added.

In Marseille, prosecutor Brice Robin underlined French investigators' conviction that "he was alive until the moment of impact, we are nearly certain. ... Alive and conscious." He also said the co-pilot appears to have acted repeatedly to stop an excessive speed alarm from sounding.

# Bad deal will aid Iran's 'Death to America' campaign

Iran poses a greater threat to Americans than do Islamic State terrorists, some analysts believe. They point out that while the IS murderers certainly are vicious, they lack the medium-range missiles in Tehran's arsenal — and the nuclear weapons Iran seems on the threshold of developing.

Yet White House policy seems almost calculated to help Iran expand the reach of its "death to America" campaign.

Consider:

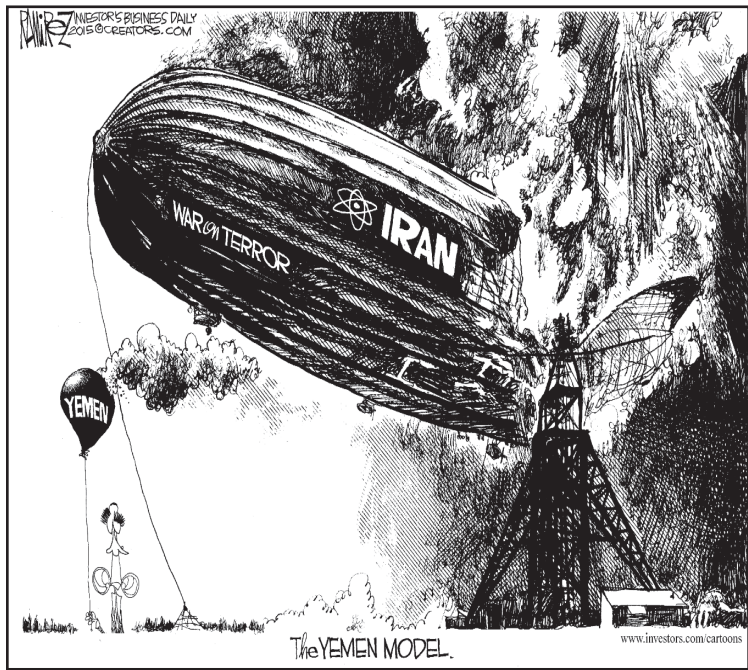
— Secretary of State John Kerry and other U.S. negotiators are working to complete an agreement with Iran that could postpone that country's acquisition of nuclear weapons by as little as a year.

— Rebels in Yemen, backed by Iran, are being battled by a coalition led by Saudi Arabia, with little or no U.S. aid.

— Meanwhile, Iranian generals are leading an Iraqi offensive against the IS, with U.S. aid including airstrikes. The Iranians would not be there but for a power vacuum resulting from President Barack Obama's early pullout of U.S. troops in Iraq.

— So, far from trying to contain Iran, the U.S. is helping further its goals.

No wonder so many nations no longer trust us.



# Education on 'race' before conversation

Am I the only person in America not making fun of Howard Schultz?

The Starbucks CEO bought himself a ton of ridicule recently when he attempted to jumpstart a national dialogue on race by having baristas write the words "Race Together" on customers' cups of Cinnamon Dolce Light Frappuccino Grande or Caffe Misto Venti with extra coconut. On Twitter, the campaign was dubbed "patronizing," "absurd" and "a load of crap." On "The Nightly Show with Larry

Wilmore," Rosie Perez said, "I don't want to be forced to have a conversation. Especially early in the f—g morning." Some folks questioned the wisdom of calling for racial dialogue when your executive team has all the rich cultural diversity of a GOP convention in Idaho.

Starbucks says there will eventually be more to the campaign, but what we've seen so far has been epically bad — naive at best, dumber than a sack of coffee beans at worst. Give it this much credit, though: It came out of an earnest conviction that the future health of our country requires us to solve race. In other words, Starbucks had good intentions.

You may say that's not much. You may note that good intentions are the macadam on the road to hell.

Me, I think we dismiss good intentions at our own peril.

Besides, Schultz's biggest mistake was not in having baristas write a trite slogan, but in his failure to realize that much of the country is simply not equipped for the conversation he is inviting them to have. Last week, even as "Race Together" was being lampooned, I spent 41 minutes I'll never get back on the phone with a white, Jewish reader who had insisted she wanted to have the "conversation on race" I have often said this country needs. It was not a productive encounter.

She starts on a spiel about blacks and drugs. I point

out that only about 15 percent of drug use in this country is by blacks and that the vast majority of dealers are white. There is a silence. She says this is something she had not known.

We move on to the fact that Jews were foot soldiers and financiers of the Civil Rights Movement, so she is offended that black people never attend Holocaust remembrance services. She has no statistics to prove this, but insists her observation is valid based on her lived experience. I point out that her lived experience is in Tucson, which has a black population of maybe 17.

And so it goes.

What it illustrated for me, and not for the first time, is that often, when people think they're talking about race, they really aren't. They are talking instead about the myths, resentments, projections and suppositions by which they justify half-baked notions about who those "other" people are.

You can't wholly blame them. Who can speak sensibly on a subject he doesn't understand? And we've been foiled in our quest to understand by an institutional conspiracy of ignorance. Race is the rawest wound of the American psyche, but somehow, you can graduate high school without knowing who Emmett Till was or that Martin Luther King ever said any words other than "I have a dream." Race has done more than arguably any other social force to shape this country, yet somehow news media do not cover it, unless forced to do so by crisis or controversy.

So here is what I've come to realize: Before we can have a fruitful "conversation on race," we need to first have education on race. We will not be a well nation or a whole one until we cease to fear and begin to understand this force that has made us who and what we are.

And how dare we reject from that cause any good person who earnestly seeks the same end, even if his solution is as dumb as a slogan on a coffee cup? Yes, I recognize the limitations of good intentions.

But they sure beat the heck out of the other kind.

Rat cake? Even prisoners deserve better. We were relatively disgusted when the sins of Michigan's prison food vendor included maggots in the food prep area, and employees smuggling drugs into correctional facilities and having sex with inmates.

So the latest revelation about Aramark Correctional Services — that an Aramark employee instructed an inmate kitchen worker to serve prisoners rodent-eaten cake — well, we're struggling to find the right words. Horrifying? Appalling? Reflex-gagging?

The liberal organization Progress Michigan used the state Freedom of Information Act to obtain e-mails sent among state corrections officials detailing what we've dubbed "the rat-cake incident," which took place last summer at the Central Michigan

Correctional Facility in St. Louis.

The Aramark worker reportedly told the inmate to cut the sides off the rodent-chewed cake, and cover the damage with frosting, a wretched bit of culinary improv that has us retching. Honestly, we may never eat cake again. That employee was fired over the incident, which prison officials rightly realized was a big deal — "I'm heading into work now to assess the mood of the population and address any situation concerns," one corrections official wrote after being notified about what had happened.

No one got sick, but that's not the point.

Outsourcing the state's prison food operation — a \$145-million, three-year contract — saved taxpayers about \$12 million a year and eliminated 370 state jobs.

For foes of privatization, this is the worst-case scenario: State jobs cut, re-

placed by a vendor whose services are cheap but woefully inadequate — a savings in cost, but a loss in quality.

The way this contract was awarded leaves us uneasy — Aramark's first bid was rejected because it didn't meet the state's 5 percent cost-savings threshold, but Republican state lawmakers asked the Department of Management, Technology and Budget to re-review the contract. That analysis found errors in the first review, and declared that Aramark's bid met the savings requirement.

After a Free Press investigation exposed the first round of Aramark problems last summer, the state fined the company. Gov. Rick Snyder appointed a contract monitor to examine issues, "possibly on both sides," and ensure sufficient training, a spokesman said Tuesday, adding that Snyder believes there have been improve-

ments.

Let's be completely honest: The only reason this contract hasn't become a major scandal for the Snyder administration is because the rodent-eaten food from kitchens infested with maggots is being served to prisoners. For some folks, there's an instinctive belief that prisoners don't deserve humane treatment, that committing a crime forfeits one's humanity.

Let's be honest about this, too: There are some really awful people in prison. Rapists, murderers, armed robbers, people who've done really terrible things. And yet they still deserve better than rat-eaten food.

And in no small part, that's because we deserve better. It's a cliché that one can judge a society by how it treats its least — but that doesn't mean it's not true.

# Privacy vs. security: How the debate changes after a massacre

A horrific event that could have been averted with a sharing of information protected by privacy laws designed to protect privacy. As typically occurs in such cases, the same public that supported such laws turns around and asks, Why didn't the authorities know?

It's really hard to get an intelligent conversation going about the balance between privacy and security. Posturing over government intrusion into our personal lives blossoms at times of calm and then wilts when terrorists hijack the headlines.

Not long ago, privacy advocates were in-

flaming the public over the National Security Agency's surveillance programs. In doing so, they often exploit the public's confusion on what information is collected.

Last October, CNN anchor Carol Costello grilled Sen. Dan Coats, an Indiana Republican, on NSA spying activities, in an exchange that indicated she didn't quite know what metadata is. As Coats tried to explain, metadata is information about numbers we call (the date, time and duration of each call) — not what was said in the calls.

That's what the government computers track. If they flag a worrisome pattern, a court must grant permission for a human being to listen in on the content.

Another tactic of the program's critics is to point to every terrible thing that happens as evidence the program doesn't work. "It didn't stop Americans from being beheaded," Costello said.

No, the NSA didn't stop radical groups from kidnapping Americans in Middle Eastern war zones and executing them in their cruel way. It can't stop every terrorist outrage in the world, including in Boston. But it has been credited with uncovering

plots to wreak havoc.

The grown-up question is, Where do we draw the line between our right to privacy and our desire to be protected?

Should we care if a government computer collects the metadata on all our calls? I don't. The phone company has that information. As for noting the websites we visit, Google knows all about that.

Sure, metadata can provide clues on one's interests — say, searches on a disease or visits to pornography sites. A rogue NSA worker might tap this information for illegal purposes, but there's been scant evidence that such abuse has occurred, the hyperbolic charges notwithstanding.

Recall the furor in France after Edward Snowden released stolen documents describing the NSA surveillance programs. Now, in the wake of the Charlie Hebdo massacre, French leaders are proposing an NSA-style program that would let their country's intelligence agencies do similar sweeps of metadata.

Recall the anger in Germany over the Snowden revelations. The CIA's top official there was expelled. And President Obama had to apologize for American monitoring

of Chancellor Angela Merkel's cellphone, something we should not have done.

But now, when so many German citizens are joining radical groups in Syria — nine so far have participated in suicide attacks — the German government is more tied into American intelligence than it was before. After all, the U.S. is the only country to track foreign fighters crossing into Syria.

In the U.S., the horror of the beheadings has caused public protests against U.S. spying programs to rapidly fade. Our society seems especially vulnerable to the hurt inflicted by terrorism; witness the attention paid the Boston Marathon bombing trial — a relatively small attack by the standards of modern terrorism.

The next time something gruesome happens, expect to hear, "Why didn't they stop that?" To say we can be secure without giving up some privacy is child's talk.

# Fairfield trustees study offer to lease 1/4 acre of cemetery

FAIRFIELD TWP. — Trustees want more time to study a contract with Hilcorp Energy regarding a one-quarter acre of Bunker Hill Cemetery that would be included in the production property off the Nolker well currently being drilled.

Ben Mehl of Western Land Services said presented a one-year contract with a \$500 signing bonus with a 15 percent royalty provision from the gross proceeds.

Trustees discussed the issue at previous meetings but the small amount of money involved and the fact Hilcorp could place the property into a production royalty unit anyway pre-empted formal action.

Mehl said the contract “won’t affect surface usage of any type” including cutting down trees and “it protects the surface and the landowners.”

Mehl was hopeful trustees would take action during the meeting but Trustee Chairman Bob Hum said, “the board has a rule ... we read it first.”

Hum said, “We’re not going to vote on it tonight” and suggested the board may take action during its next regular meeting on April 16.

In response to a query if there was other acreage Hilcorp would be interested in, Mehl

said it was only leasing and amending upcoming deals.

In other business, trustees approved requesting a certificate of the estimated tax revenue for a 1.6 mill road renewal levy that will appear on the November ballot.

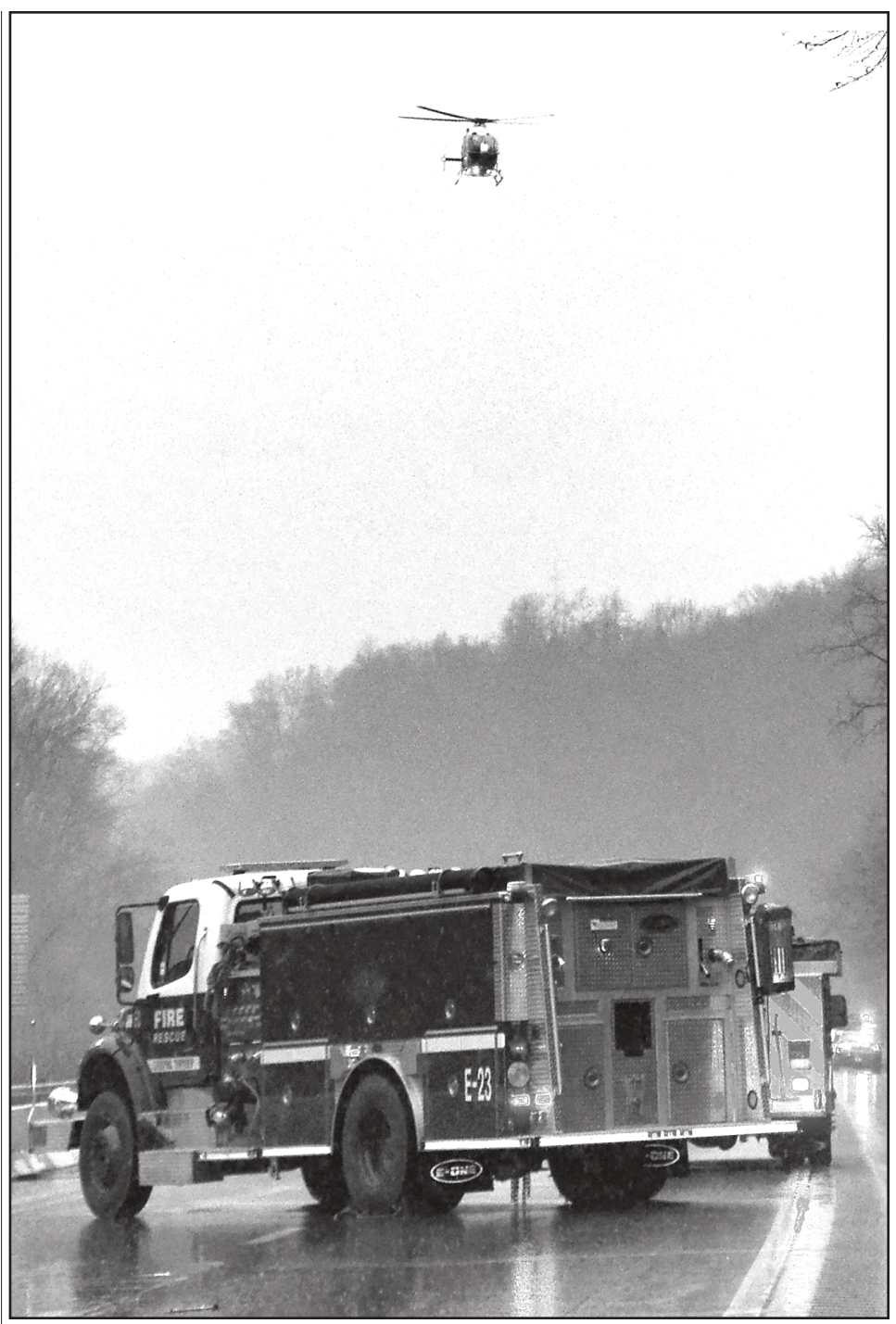
No action was taken on a Columbiana County Commissioners plan to amend the final 911 plan. Hum asked about requesting that Commissioner Tim Weigle attend the trustees April 16 meeting.

“I’d like to read it and have him attend the next meeting,” he said.

Also in other business, trustees opened two bids for lawn service. Hayes Lawn Care and Hephner Lawn Care service submitted bids with Hephner’s \$575 per cut the lowest. Hayes’ bid was \$765.

Bids were also opened for road maintenance materials received from six companies and trustees are expected to approve them all as they have in the past.

Road Supervisor Mel Miller said the department has swept roads, using the rotary ditcher, and patched roads as necessary along with making the monthly sign inspection. Miller said the township’s road salt order was submitted to the Ohio Department of Transportation and the grant request regarding news signs is still in the review stage. “It doesn’t appear any children on the images are local,” she said last week, adding the Hipps shared/sent files from a computer and other electronic devices.

On Thursday, the BCI said the “files are generally believed to be of children under the age of 12, however we can’t be certain of specific ages.”

Del Greco added, “There is no evidence at this time that the defendant was selling any files.”

The investigation is ongoing. Computers and electronic devices were removed from the residence at the time of his arrest.

leave Puerto Rico late Thursday and arrive in St. Thomas today.

Talbert called the situation “very strange, very bizarre.”

He said they seemed normal to him when he conducted the investigation in December, which he said occurred just after they had returned home from a cruise for their honeymoon. They were newlyweds.

“All she said was what a great guy he was,” Talbert recalled. The couple lived on Fourth Street and he said the FBI had already contacted family members who live in the area.

For the incident reported Dec. 21, police were notified that Sunday morning by St. Elizabeth Hospital regarding an accidental injury that occurred in the city. The detectives were notified and investigated, finding that a woman on Fourth Street suffered a knife injury. They determined it was a freak accident. Talbert explained they were unpacking from their trip when the husband had gone to place something in a closet and found an old military dagger in his collection of war relics. He walked across the hall to show his wife, who was sitting on the edge of the bed, and he tripped on a throw rug, falling into his wife with the knife, which went into her chest.

Talbert said the wound was not serious or life-threatening and required no surgery. She was treated and released from the hospital and detectives spoke to both the husband and wife at length about what happened. Their stories were consistent with what they saw at the scene after getting a consent to search the house and take the dagger into evidence.

“I’m convinced it was an accident,” he said, adding the husband immediately took the wife to the hospital.

According to his records, both the husband and the wife were 56 years old.

in the hearing.

“Yes, I did,” Kimble replied.

Stone said he trusts Haueter’s judgment and does not believe it is necessary to take any action to ensure something like this does not happen again.

Despite the 20-hour delay, Stone does not believe it harmed the investigation.

“It delayed it by a day, but other than that it has not impacted the investigation. We have a suspect in custody and we have a strong case,” he said.

Investigators found blood on the walls, ceiling, furniture and floor of Landsberger’s bedroom. The bed frame was disassembled and found laying on the floor, while the mattress, box springs and headboard were missing.

What was left of a burned mattress and box springs was found on a wood pile outside the house trailer. Bloody sheets and clothing were found stuffed in a bag of dog food in Landsberger’s shed.

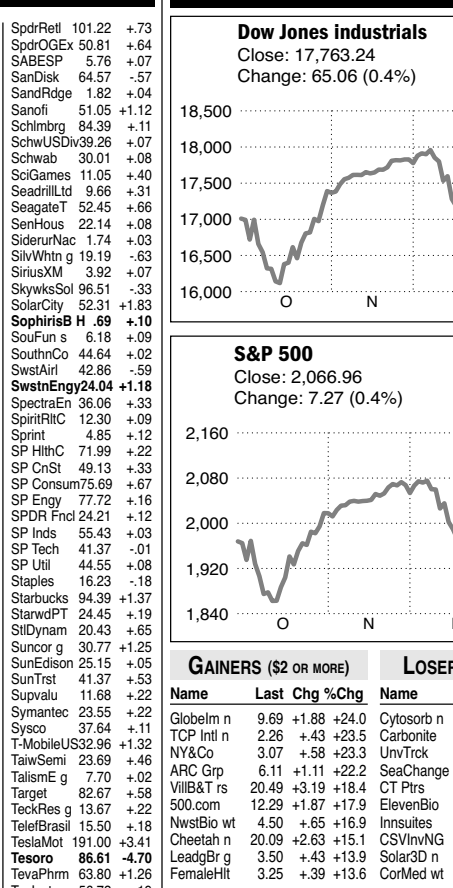

**Therapist should plan own snack**

**DEAR ABBY:** We have a daughter with severe developmental disabilities. Thankfully, she receives 40-plus hours of in-home therapy a week, which is covered by insurance.

**DEAR MOM:** Regardless of what your son says, you are not heartless. You took him in with certain conditions. He and his girlfriend abused your trust, and you handled the situation wisely.

If the girl is really pregnant, she should not be using drugs. If she's hooked on something, she needs to get into a rehabilitation program ASAP. If she has parents, perhaps they will take her in. But you have done your part, and if you allow your son and his girlfriend to stay with you, they will continue to break your rules and you'll wind up responsible for them and the baby — or two or three. I advise against it.

**There's lots of help for COPD**

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I have been told that I have COPD. The lung doctor said that he's pleased with my X-ray and will see me next year. My concern is whether this will get worse. I'm scared to death. I have difficulty catching my breath. I quit smoking about four years ago. I know I can't repair the damage that

has been done, but is there anything I can do to keep this disease from getting worse? — **T.C.**

**ANSWER:** Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease in North America is due mostly to cigarette smoking, but cooking fires, asthma and other rare conditions also may predispose people to COPD. Lung function decreases with aging in all adults, but in people with COPD (emphysema, chronic bronchitis and some types of chronic asthma), the worsening of lung function over time is critical because of the loss of pulmonary reserve.

You already have done by far the most important thing you can do to prevent further damage: quit smoking. Avoiding other air pollutants (especially secondhand smoke) also may help. Regular physical activity seems to slow progression of COPD.

Treatment with inhaled steroids reduces airway inflammation and somewhat slows progression of the decline in lung function in COPD. Inhaled steroids also improve symptoms and reduce exacerbations. However

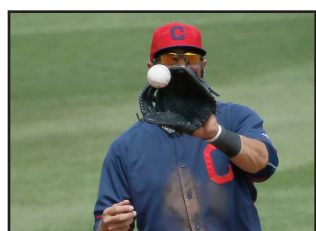

Iman Shumpert added 17 points for the Cavs, who played without starting forward Kevin Love. He sat out with a sore back after being elbowed in Sunday's win over Philadelphia.

Luol Deng and Hassan Whiteside scored 17 each for Miami.

Wade got hurt midway through the second quarter, when his right knee buckled while he drove the right side.

The three-time NBA champion crumpled to the floor with his left knee bending awkwardly to the side. With Wade on his back, the Cavs stole the ball, and as play continued on the other end, the 33-

year-old remained on the floor and grabbed his left knee. Wade slowly got to his feet, and with concerned teammates looking on, he walked gingerly toward the locker room.

At halftime, a team spokesman said Wade's knee was bruised but offered no other details.

Wade, who has missed 19 games this season, had his left knee drained of fluid last weekend. He has struggled with knee issues over the last few seasons with the Heat managing his playing time to keep the 11-time All-Star as healthy as possible.

Going in, the fourth meeting between Cleveland and Miami this season was viewed as a possible playoff preview. But if Wade is sidelined, the Heat are going to have a difficult time getting back to the post-season.

The Heat were still within 11 late in the third quarter before the Cavs scored eight straight, capped by J.R. Smith's 3-pointer in the final seconds

to take a 91-72 lead.

With his first basket, a short hook in the lane, James passed Hall of Famer Patrick Ewing (24,815 points) for 20th place on the NBA's career scoring list. Next up for the 30-year-old James, who has averaged at least 25 points in each of the past 10 seasons, is Jerry West (25,192).

# LeBron on calling plays: 'I do it every game'

INDEPENDENCE, Ohio (AP) — LeBron James is like an NFL quarterback on the floor — with the ball, in control. He's Peyton Manning in shorts and a tank top. And like Denver's brainy QB, Cleveland's superstar said he has always called offensive sets and plays throughout his career, and the four-time MVP said it would be foolish for any coach not to let him do so. "Why wouldn't you give me the freedom to play call?" James said. "It's like telling Peyton Manning or Tom Brady (a play) and don't give them the freedom to change in the huddle. I'm a smart, cerebral basketball player." As James and the Cavs prepared to face the Miami Heat on Thursday night, James was asked about his ability to call plays during the game. The relationship between James and first-year Cavs coach David Blatt has been scrutinized all season, with some observers viewing James' play calling as a sign that he's in charge. Well, James said he's been running the show for years. "It's no different from Miami and it's no different than when I was here before," said James, who signed as a free agent with Cleveland this summer following four seasons with the Heat. "I do it every game. I've done it every game for like the last 11 years. My rookie year, I didn't have the freedom, I wasn't smart enough." James doesn't have the luxury to call all of Cleveland's offensive plays, but the team's coaching staff trusts him to make the right read. "I have the freedom to call the sets, whatever best suits our team. ... My basketball IQ is very high and I take that very seriously, so I know what best suits our team and our coaching staff does as well," he said.

# Nuke deal: World powers, Iran seal breakthrough deal

LAUSANNE, Switzerland (AP) — Capping exhausting and contentious talks, Iran and world powers sealed a breakthrough agreement Thursday outlining limits on Iran's nuclear program to keep it from being able to produce atomic weapons. The Islamic Republic was promised an end to years of crippling economic sanctions, but only if negotiators transform the plan into a comprehensive pact.

They will try to do that in the next three months. The United States and Iran, long-time adversaries who hashed out much of the agreement, each hailed the efforts of their diplomats over days of sleepless nights in Switzerland. Speaking at the White House, President Barack Obama called it a "good deal" that would address concerns about Iran's nuclear ambitions. Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif called it a "win-win outcome."

Those involved have spent 18 months in broader negotiations that were extended twice since an interim accord was reached shortly after Iranian President Hassan Rouhani entered office. That deal itself was the product of more than a year of secret negotiations between the Obama administration and Iran, a country the U.S. still considers the world's leading state sponsor of terrorism.

Opponents of the emerging accord, including Israel and Republican leaders in Congress, reacted with skepticism. They criticized the outline for failing to do enough to curb Iran's potential to produce nuclear weapons or to mandate intrusive enough inspections. Obama disagreed.

"This framework would cut off every pathway that Iran could take to develop a nuclear weapon," he declared. "This deal is not based on trust. It's based on unprecedented verification."

If implemented, the understandings reached Thursday would mark the first time in more than a decade of diplomatic efforts that Iran's nuclear efforts would be rolled back.

It commits Tehran to significant cuts in centrifuges, the machines that can spin uranium gas to levels used in nuclear warheads. Of the nearly 20,000 centrifuges Iran now has installed or running at its main enrichment site, the country would be allowed to operate just over 5,000. Much of its enriched stockpiles would be neutralized. A planned reactor would be reconstructed so it produced no weapons-grade plutonium. Monitoring and inspections by the U.N. nuclear agency would be enhanced.

America's negotiating partners in Europe strongly backed the result. President Francois Hollande of France, which had pushed the U.S. for a tougher stance, endorsed the accord while warning that "sanctions lifted can be re-established if the agreement is not applied."

Obama sought to frame the deal as a salve that reduces the chances of the combustible Middle East becoming even more unstable with the introduction of a nuclear-armed Iran. Many fear that would spark an arms race that could spiral out of control in a region rife with sectarian rivalry, terrorist threats and weak or failed states.

Obama said he had spoken with Saudi Arabia's King Salman and that he'd invite him and other Arab leaders to Camp David this spring to discuss security strategy. The Sunni majority Saudis have made veiled threats about creating their own nuclear program to counter Shia-led Iran.

The American leader also spoke by telephone with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, perhaps the sharpest critic of the diplomacy with Iran. Netanyahu told Obama a deal based on the agreement "would threaten the survival of Israel." The White House said Obama assured Netanyahu that the agreement would not diminish U.S. concerns about Iran's sponsorship of terrorism and threats toward Israel.

Obama saved his sharpest words for members of Congress who have threatened to either try to kill the agreement or approve new sanctions against Iran. Appearing in the Rose Garden, Obama said the issues at stake are "bigger than politics."

"These are matters of war and peace," he said, and if Congress kills the agreement "international unity will collapse, and the path to conflict will widen."

Hawks on Capitol Hill reacted slowly to the news from the Swiss city of Lausanne, perhaps because the framework was far more detailed than many diplomats had predicted over a topsy-turvy week of negotiation.

House Speaker John Boehner said it would be "naive to suggest the Iranian regime will not continue to use its nuclear program, and any economic relief, to further destabilize the region."

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Bob Corker, R-Tenn., said his panel would vote this month on legislation giving Congress the right to vote on a final deal. Freshman Sen. Tom Cotton, R-Ark., who penned a letter that many GOP senators signed last month to Iran's leaders, said he would work "to protect America from this very dangerous proposal."

Many of the nuclear limits on Iran would be in place for a decade, while others would last 15 or 20 years. Sanctions related to Iran's nuclear programs would be suspended by the U.S., the United Nations and the European Union after the International Atomic Energy Agency confirmed Iran's compliance.

In a joint statement, European Union foreign policy chief Federica Mogherini and Iran's Zarif called the agreement a "decisive step." Highlighting Iran's effort to show a new face of its government, Zarif then held a news conference, answering many questions in English, and Obama's statement was carried live and uncensored on Iranian state TV.

Still, all sides spoke with a sense of caution. "We have taken a major step, but are still some way away from where we want to be," Zarif told reporters, even as he voiced hope that a final agreement might ease suspicion between the U.S. and Iran, which haven't had diplomatic relations since the 1979 overthrow of the shah and the subsequent U.S. Embassy hostage crisis in Tehran.

## Short but sweet: Weather limits maple syrup season

COLUMBUS (AP) — Ohio maple syrup producers say lingering winter weather limited their season, making for a sluggish year.

The maple sap run usually is spurred by temperatures climbing above freezing during the day and dropping at night, The Columbus Dispatch reported. Typically, trees can be tapped in February as days get warmer, but this year bitter cold stuck around. The sap's flavor turns when trees start to bud, so the season was shortened.
