Officials to talk about tax hike for roads

City council's Committee of the Whole plans to talk about an income tax increase for road work during a meeting set for 6 p.m. today, according to the meeting announcement.

Council President K. Bret Apple listed discussion of an income tax increase as one of the two topics for the committee meeting, with the other being the donation of the former Butler museum building to the

The city income tax has remained at the 1 percent level since 1968, with attempts to add a .5 percent income tax failing in 2009 and 2010.

SALEM

Councilman Dave Nestic, chairman of the Committee of the Whole, said Councilman Jeff Cushman asked to have the topic added to the agenda, with the idea to raise funds for infrastructure and capital improvements.

Council members have had discussions recently about the need to work on infrastructure, especially after city Service/Safety Director Ken Kenst announced the street paving program may be put on hold pending a final resolution to the

costs associated with the recent demolitions downtown.

Nestic acknowledged a need to work on infrastructure and that it's early in the process of discussion on how to do that. The reason he said he opposed the previous income tax increase proposals was because they had not gone through the city finances or put together a plan.

He said there needs to be a planning process and all that discussion needs to come out regarding whether they're prepared to ask taxpayers for more money, what's the right way to ask, should it be a property tax or income tax and how will the money be used. If it's for streets,

what streets? Why those streets?
The other topic, acceptance of the gift of the building and property at 315 E. State St. from the Salem Art Institute, has been on two other meeting agendas but hasn't been discussed at length.

The donation first came up during a Finance Committee meeting, with the committee passing the proposal on to council after no discussion. During the last council meeting, the ordinance had a first reading. There was no discussion, but there was an understanding that discussion would take place during a Committee of the Whole meeting.

Pipeline builder sues landowners for survey access

LISBON — A company attempting to build a 250-mile gas interstate pipeline through this county has filed a civil lawsuit in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court to attempt to get an injunction to gain access to survey two local proper-

Nexus Gas Transmissions LLC, a company based in Houston, Texas, claims its representatives have been in contact with the property owners named in the lawsuit — Donald and Patricia Haubert, whose address in the lawsuit is listed as Parks Road, Louisville, and with Larry Eldon and Patricia May Rosenberger, Knox School Road, Minerva.

According to the lawsuit, a representative asked the Hauberts on Aug. 30, 2014 for access to their three tracts of property in West Township— one on state Route 172 and two on Knox School Road — and they initially authorized it. However, on Sept. 14, 2014, Donald Haubert reportedly notified the company he was withdrawing his authorization.

He again refused the representatives access on Sept. 25, 2014 and Patricia Haubert refused them access on Nov. 3, directing them instead to speak to her son. On Nov. 14, 2014, a Nexus representative spoke to Doug Haubert and he refused

Then on May 22, 2015, the Hauberts reportedly authorized access after meeting with a Nexus representative in their home. However, later that day Doug Haubert denied them

Similarly, the company reportedly contacted Larry Eldon and Patricia Rosenberger on Aug. 25, 2014; Sept. 24, 2014 and May 21, 2015, each time being denied access to survey their three tracts of property- two on Knox School Road in West Township and one on Bayard Road in Knox Township.

The lawsuit claims the pipeline will be an interstate system to transport natural gas from the Marcellus and Utica shale plays in this area to existing infrastructure in Michigan and Ontario, Canada. The project is scheduled to be completed and operating on Nov. 1, 2017. In the end the product will serve customers in Ohio, Michigan, Chicago and Ontario.

The 36-inch diameter mainline pipeline will run across portions of 11 counties in Ohio and three counties in Michigan, affecting 3,479 tracts of property. Of the those properties affected in Columbiana County, the lawsuit claims only the owners of the properties in the lawsuit have declined to allow the company to survey.

The survey would reportedly be conducted during daylight hours and compensation is available should the property or crops be damaged. The survey would include the placement of wooden stakes; an environmental study of any wetlands and threatened or endangered species; a check of any possible archaeological resources in the area; and sometimes a geological test of rocks in the area.

The company is seeking an injunction allowing them to pursue surveying activities on these properties and a declaration giving them the right to do so.

Ohio House speaker: Increase on shale tax on hold for now

LISBON — Any plans to raise the state tax on shale gas production and earmarking some of the proceeds for counties impacted by the drilling boom appear to be on hold, at least for now.

That was the message delivered by someone who should know - Ohio House Speaker Cliff Rosenberger — who was among state legislators attending a forum held Monday and hosted by state Rep. Tim

"No, I don't think so," Rosenberger responded, when asked afterwards if he expects the House to take up the severance tax issue as part of negotiations on a new state budget with the Senate and Kasich adminis-

Last month, the House passed its own version of the next two-year state budget, and it excluded any increase in Ohio's severance tax on oil and gas production, something favored by Gov. John Kasich. The House


passed a bill last year increasing the production tax and earmarking a portion for impacted counties, but it died in the Senate.

Rosenberger said any revision in the production tax should be part of a comprehensive review of Ohio's tax structure that is under way and expected to result in recommendations by 2018.

"We're not against it. We just think we've got to take a longer-term look at how all of these aspects play out," he said.

Opponents are concerned that any increase in the production tax could serve as disincentive for future oil and gas development. Rosenberger pointed out that North Dakota is reducing its production tax, and it has far higher shale gas reserves than Ohio.

He also said any increase in the production gas tax should also take into account the recommendations of a special committee formed to look at the state's transportation needs and the taxes used to fund it.

Fire at former chemical plant probed

NEGLEY — The Negley fire department and county sheriff's office are investigating a fire at a former chemical company just off state Route 154.

The Negley, New Waterford and East Palestine departments were notified of the fire shortly before 4 p.m. Monday, but the Negley fire department was the only one to remain on the scene.

Negley fire Lt. Rudy Sacchet said the small fire on the first floor at the west end of the concrete building was easily put out.

Sacchet said he did not know who currently owns the building that formerly operated as the Lakewood Chemical and Supply Co. and is known to have been affiliated with the nearby LaBate Farm at one point in time.

An address listed online for Lakewood Chemical Co. was 1252 Negley-Darlington

Sacchet said the fire was a chemical fire, but when asked what kind of chemicals were involved, indicated he didn't know.

Around 5 p.m. he said a representative from Exochem in East Palestine was on

their way to the scene to talk to him, but he did not disclose why they were called or what information they would be providing.

The New Waterford and East Palestine departments were already back at their stations, with only two Negley fire trucks still at the property during that time.

Sacchet said no one was inside the building when they arrived, and a dispatcher could be heard advising him over his radio of the location of about four or five teenagers, who could be seen walking along state Route 154 not far from the property.

When asked, he declined to confirm or deny whether the fire was a case of vandalism, since the building has been vacant for

If so, it would not be the first time the building was targeted by vandals.

According to previous reports, a Pennsylvania woman was sentenced to one year in prison in 2012 after she and two men were found guilty of breaking into the building in 2006. One of the men was given intervention in lieu of conviction while the other was placed on five years probation.

The trio damaged the building and took copper wiring.

Boat with more than 450 people aboard sinks in China's Yangtze; rescue underway

BEIJING (AP) — A yacht carrying more than 450 people sank overnight in the Yangtze River during a cyclone in southern China, and eight people have been rescued, the state broadcaster CCTV reported Tues-

Further rescue work was underway but strong winds and rain were hampering the search, CCTV said. The boat was traveling from Nanjing to the southwestern city of Chongqing when it sank at about 9:28 p.m. Monday in Hubei province, the report said.

The official Xinhua News Agency quoted the captain and chief engineer, who were both rescued, as saying the ship sank quickly after being caught in a cyclone.

CCTV said the boat was carrying 406 Chinese passengers, five travel agency employees and 47 crew members.

The Eastern Star yacht measured 251 feet long (76.5 meters) and 36 feet wide (11 meters) and was capable of carrying a maximum of 534 people, CCTV reported. It is owned by the Chongqing Eastern Shipping Corp., which focuses on tourism routes in the popular Three Gorges river canyon re-

NSA impasse: Unlikely phone records collection resumes, however final vote comes out

WASHINGTON (AP) — However Congress resolves its impasse over government surveillance, this much is clear: The National Security Agency will ultimately be out of the

calling records.

Aiming for passage Tuesday afternoon, the Senate on Monday prepared to make modest changes to a House bill that would end the collection while preserving other surveillance authorities. But while Congress debated, the law authorizing the collection expired at midnight Sunday.

The NSA had stopped gathering the records from phone companies hours before the deadline. And other post-9/11 surveillance provisions considered more effective than the phone-call collection program also lapsed, leading intelligence officials to warn of critical gaps.

The legislation now before the Senate, known as the USA Freedom Act, would reauthorize the surveillance but would phase out NSA phone records collection over time. It passed the House overwhelmingly and is backed by President Barack Obama. Sen. Rand Paul, who doesn't believe it goes far enough in restricting the government, objected anew on Monday, but he can't stop a vote to end debate scheduled for Tuesday morning.

If the bill becomes law over the next few days, the NSA will resume gathering the phone records but only for a transition period of six months, in the House version, or a year in the Senate version.

The tone is National Public Radio in the United States. But this is Al-Bayan, the Islamic State radio targeting European recruits by touting recent triumphs in the campaign to carve out a Caliphate, and it represents a major headache for Western powers trying to curtail the IS influence.

All news is good news for Al-Bayan's "soldiers of the Caliphate." In this narrative, the enemy always flees in disgrace or is killed. The broadcasts end with a swell of music and a gentle English message: "We thank our listeners for tuning in."

The tension between the smooth, Western-style production and the extremist content shows how far the hardcore Islamic

propaganda machine has come since 2012, when an aging Frenchman posed in front of a black-and-white jihadi flag and threatened France in the name of al-Qaida in the Islamic Maghreb.

The footage was grainy, with minimal production values, and released on a relatively obscure regional website. By contrast, Al-Bayan reaches thousands of listeners every day via links shared on social networks, helping to swell the ranks of Westerners — projected this year to reach a total of up to 10,000 — fighting for the Islamic State group in Syria and Iraq.

In the time it took to bring the Frenchman Gilles Le Guen to trial, his European successors in violent jihad have overturned the recruitment script in ways that might impress a New York PR agency.

Lisbon man sent to Wintersville facility under intervention plan

LISBON — Homer C. Carnes, 55, Desellem Road, Lisbon, was ordered in Columbiana County Common Pleas Court to serve up to six months at the Eastern Ohio Corrections Center in Wintersville as part of his intervention plan. Carnes previously pleaded guilty to four counts of trafficking in drugs, three counts of possession and one count of cultivation of marijuana.

Carnes sold marijuana on both July 7, 2014 and July 10,

2014, and sold oxycodone on July 7. Additionally, on Aug. 20, 2014 he had oxycodone, cocaine and hydrocodone. He also was cultivating marijuana with some prepared for sale. Carnes had been placed intervention in lieu of conviction after pleading guilty in April, but had since been cited with OVI, prompting his terms of intervention to be revisited. Renewable energy advocates have yet to prove it's value

 ${f A}$ wind- and solar-energy advocacy group released a report last monthclaiming Ohio's freeze of renewable energy and energy efficiency standards is damaging the industry. Environmental Entrepreneurs, which sponsored the report, is demanding lawmakers lift the freeze. But their position is hardly convincing.

Ohio Senate Bill 310 put a two-year freeze on state clean energy standards enacted in 2008, which required utilities to cut customers' power usage by 22 percent and get 25 percent of their power from renewable and advanced technology energy sources.

Lobbyists for the renewables industry are calling that freeze a mistake, and crying about the damage done. They say it has put Ohio's clean energy industry into "a tailspin."

While it is true solar and wind energy have not yet made themselves a viable, financially sound alternative to coal-fired power plants without the help of massive government subsidies - their industry has hardly suffered while lawmakers try to do what is right for Ohio.

According to Gail Parson, Midwest advocate for Environmental Entrepreneurs, "There are now 89,000 Ohioans working in the clean energy field at 7,200 companies in the state."

In fact, the whining about damage to the industry has included the statistic that job growth in the renewable energy sector in Ohio has slowed to only 1.5 percent, in 2014. Slow growth is still growth.

Meanwhile, National Mining Association statistics show that in 2003, West Virginia had 24,488 coal mining jobs, but in 2013, there were 20,751. In Ohio, there were 3,761 coal mining jobs in 2003. By 2013, there were 3,143. As of Friday, the numbers were even higher after Murray Energy and Alpha Natural Resources announced they were laying off 2,268 people or eliminating their positions.

See any growth there?

If renewable energy advocates are looking for sympathy because they have not experienced the explosive growth to which they believed they were entitled, with the help of government, they should look elsewhere. Ohio lawmakers were correct in attempting to slow the bleeding in the coal industry caused by the war on coal and affordable electricity. And, of course, they were right to refuse to force consumers to pay more for alternative energy. Legislators should ignore this shameless plea for more legislative shoring-up of an industry that has not yet proved its worth.



No Memorial Day for inner-city dead

Back lives matter!" was cent demonstrations in cities and towns from Ferguson, Missouri, to Baltimore, Maryland. Yes, they do matter, but apparently not so much to some other blacks. Only when a white police officer shoots or engages in other behavior that results in the death of a black man do black lives seem to

While Memorial Day weekend featured the traditional parades, barbecues and mo-

ments of silence at baseball games for those who gave their lives in wartime to preserve our freedoms, in some of America's biggest cities virtual shooting galleries produced the sort of carnage more likely to be found in the Middle East from Islamic State terrorists.

In Baltimore, which was wracked by violence just one month ago after Freddie Gray, an African-American man, died while in police custody, 32 people were shot. Nine of them died. That brings to 35 the number killed in Baltimore just in May and the month isn't

In New York City, eight people were shot and killed. In Chicago, where murder has become common, 12 people died and 44 were wounded.

Care to take a guess what these three cities have in common? They are all presided over by elected Democratic mayors and majority Democratic city councils.

In New York City, the murder rate reached a record low in 2013. Following the election of liberal Mayor Bill de Blasio, the murder rate jumped 20 percent in the first two months of 2015. Might the reason be de Blasio's order to dramatically curtail the stop-and-frisk program that had sharply reduced the number of murders in minority neighborhoods under former Mayor Michael Bloomberg?

In Baltimore, where Democratic Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake (who is African-American) reportedly ordered Baltimore police to stand down during the recent riots, thus allowing the rioting to continue, police apparently are still obeying that order. Arrests in Baltimore have declined significantly, while incidents of criminal activity, including violent crime, are up. Cops may be reluctant to step in because six of their fellow officers have been indicted in the death of Freddie Gray. Who could blame them for thinking that Baltimore's elected officials see the police and not criminals as the enemy of public order?

There have been no visits by Al Sharpton, no investigations launched by the Department of Justice and no statements by America's first African-American president about these latest shootings. And predictably, only local media -- not the national networks -- have paid much attention to these murders because both the perpetrators and the victims are black. Only when the template that whites are racists and blacks are victims can be applied do the actors in this tiresome race play step onto the stage with their predictable accusations and fault-finding. Predictably, when the play ends, nothing has changed.

Last year, following the riots and looting in Ferguson, Johnathan Gentry, identified by Fox News as a minister, appeared on TV to counter the message by Al Sharpton suggesting that white racism is to blame for most problems in the African-American community. Speaking of Sharpton, Gentry said, "You only come around when something happens with the police or Caucasians. You're not there for the black community so you need to stop fronting -- and NAACP as well. I want to call them out as well! They're good for nothing. All they do is perpetuate hate.'

You won't find that sound bite or that man on any

other channel, but he speaks the truth. Maybe what's needed is a Memorial Day for the victims of crime. Maybe that would help reduce the body count. President Obama says he was elected to "end wars, not start them." While he is retreating overseas, he might consider trying to end the war in America's inner cities. And those inner-city voters might benefit from ending their loyalty to a party that has done them

little good.

Washingtonville council passes on 911 support

Staff Writer WASHINGTONVILLE - Council decided to table a request from Columbiana County commissioners to approved a resolution regarding an update to the county's 911 system on Monday.

Fiscal Officer Dale Davis said he received a call from commissioners asking why the village had not passed the resolution so they could obtain the necessary 60 percent approval from county political subdivision and move move ahead on upgrading the system.

Davis said, "One reason was we never received it.'

Council President Herman Frank asked if the village paid anything for 911 and Davis said the funding was through existing wire and wireless serv-

Frank noted if there was no cost coming back to the village he approved.

"I think anytime you upgrade 911 is a good thing," he said and Councilwoman Devon Davis moved to approve the measure.

But Frank also noted that when Fiscal Officer Davis brought up the issue it was noted there were no attachments, as indicated in the letter from commis-

After consulting with Solicitor Andrea Burton, Frank was unsure about passing it "without knowing what we're doing" and Councilman Al Vignon said, 'I'd like to see more information.'

Frank said especially "when they say they sent something and it doesn't

Council discussed tabling the issue, "mainly because we didn't know what it is," Frank said, and then approved a motion to rescind Councilwoman Davis' motion to approve the 911 upgrade resolution and it was tabled.

In other business, council voted to approve a police department purchase of a hand-held radar gun.

With a 5-o vote and Councilman Jim Smith absent, council approved the purchase to an amount not to exceed \$1,000 after Mayor Will Jones said it will have the ability to be transferred from one cruiser to another.

Two other radar units in the department are mounted to the cars and Jones said the hand-held unit is a backup plan "plus they can be used on bikes and they can sit in more places when stationary.

After a short discussion about the unit being more vehicle-specific in targeting, council moved ahead with the approval and Burton, in reference to the ability of the unit to do vehicle-specific targeting, said her preference was to go with it and "have something more

Police calibrate the current units prior to each shift and Frank said, "I'm

all for it so let's buy it."

In other business, Jones said the safety issues related to a sinkhole on County Road near the village limits a couple of weeks ago required "emergency" action to fill in and cover it.

He said that in response to council inquires for Vignon and Councilwoman Becky Vignon wondering why some members of council weren't notified before action was taken.

The street department placed a steel plate over the hole on the road edge that also included part of the sidewalk.

Streets Foreman Ed Garrett said he learned from Utilities Superintendent Brian Gudat there were gas lines underneath and it needed to be fixed

Fiscal Officer Davis said a student fell into the hole and lost a shoe (that was recovered) and that was how the village learned about the hole.

"He was walking back from school, walked around it and he fell into it," Davis explained.

Garrett said it looked like a pipe separated and Davis said there were two pipes broken and R.T. Vernal fixed the hole in about three days.

Garrett said the sidewalk was the only thing left to fix.

Also, council went into a brief executive session to discuss personnel and no action was taken.

Teen impersonates FBI agent, test drives car, crashes it

YPSILANTI TOWNSHIP, Mich. (AP) — A 17-year-old southeastern Michigan boy pretended to be an FBI agent and got a car dealer to let him test drive a Dodge Charger, then crashed the muscle car in northwestern Ohio, authorities say.

The Ann Arbor teen called the Cueter Chrysler dealership in Ypsilanti Township on Wednesday and asked to test drive the 2015 model, the department told The Ann Arbor News.

The boy told dealership employees he was an FBI agent and was carrying what appeared to be a firearm on his hip, sheriff's spokesman Derrick Jackson said. He said it turned out to be an Airsoft air gun. The teen then drove the car to the Toledo, Ohio, area, where he crashed and heavily damaged the crashed the car, Jackson said. The boy was uninjured and again presented himself to authorities in Ohio as an FBI agent, the sheriff's spokesman said.

The property owned by the Salem Art Institute, which is funded through the Salem Community Foundation, sustained damage from falling bricks over the last several years from the now demolished TanFastic building. During the recent TanFastic demolition project, the building sustained even more damage when part of a wall collapsed through its roof.

"It is an issue we have to examine well beyond just one sector," Rosenberger said.

Rosenberger was elected by the Republican majority in January as the new House speaker, and he said Monday's forum is the first of many he hopes to host around the state with local state legislators. Local officials were invited to attend to hear what they had to say and to also ask questions of

Attendees were only able to squeeze in about a half dozen questions during the hour-long luncheon, but Rosenberger did address an issue of particular interest to city, village and township officials — state funding (LGF) for local governments. He apologized for cutting LGF funding four years ago but said legislators were faced with an \$8 billion budget deficit.

The state budget passed by the House contained no increase in LGF funding, nor should local governments expect one, Rosenberger said. The House, however, is looking at different ways of providing additional state funding to local governments.

For example, the House budget created a \$20 million government safety fund, which will provide \$100,000 competitive grants to local governments to help fund purchases that benefit public safety, such as fire department equipment.

Rosenberger said creating grant programs specifically to benefit local governments would be a way for the legislature to ensure state funding is used for capital purchases and infrastructure improvements instead of on salaries and bene-

He said another way they have tried to help local governments is by increasing the state reimbursement to counties for providing constitutionally mandated free legal services to poor people charged with crimes. Rosenberger said this was something pushed by Columbiana County Commissioner Mike Halleck in his position as current chairman of the County Commissioners Association of Ohio.

Rosenberger praised the House budget, saying it resulted in a significant increase in state funding for school districts and guarantees no district would lose money from the continued reduction in Ohio's tangible personal property tax on

"Hopefully, it will come out of the Senate looking the same way," Ginter said of the budget.

Also attending the meeting was state Rep. Kirk Schuring, R-Canton, who said his RTIP bill provides local governments with the means to generate funding for specific transportation projects. He said this could help both Columbiana and Stark counties come up with funding to qualify for federal grants needed to jumpstart the U.S. Route 30 project.

Schuring and Rosenberger both praised Ginter, who has been on the job for five months. Rosenberger said Ginter has played an active role in shaping the budget and has also introduced and/or co-sponsored several bills.

"I think what makes (Tim) good is he listens to people," Schuring said.

Rosenberger also took the opportunity to ask the 20 or so people in attendance to oppose the proposed constitutional amendment legalizing marijuana, saying it would create a monopoly controlled by a few instead of the government.

"They've already started selling shares," he said of the group behind the ballot initiative. "This is about people making money."

Rosenberger said if Ohio is to legalize marijuana it should be done by the legislature after careful deliberations because of all of the potential ramifications, and not rammed through by a special interest group.

"This is a bigger issue than has been talked about," he said. tgiambroni@mojonews.com

Farmers take precautions to limit avian flu in Ohio

DAYTON (AP) - Ohio egg farmers are taking extra steps to protect their flocks from the avian flu, which has led to 40 million dead birds in the United States

The Dayton Daily News reports (http://bit.ly/1I1tfLo) farmers are going to extremes to protect their birds in Darke County, the secondlargest egg producing county in the country

Vehicles going into egg and poultry farms are sprayed with disinfectant and workers' shoes are hosed down. Officials are also monitoring backyard flocks for signs of the virus.

"This avian influenza is a whole new level because it just wipes out everything and will put producers out of business for about six months. Just the ripple down effect of an outbreak if we lost half the layers in the state of Ohio would have a billion dollar effect on our economy," said Sam Custer, an Ohio State extension Agriculture and Natural Resource

Agriculture officials said the flu caused egg prices to double in two weeks.

An outbreak in one part of the state will impact Ohio as a whole, said Jim Chakeres, executive vice president of the Ohio Poultry Associ-"If the western part of the state is

hit, the eastern part of the state cannot export product," Chakeres said. 'We are doing everything humanly possible to prevent this from coming

Custer says it's not a question of "if," but "when" the virus will affect Ohio farms.

was born seven centuries later than initially believed and dates back to the start of the Inquisition in the early 13th century.

It also means the oldest and

biggest tree found in Muir Woods is just a baby compared with the huge old-growth trees farther north.

San Francisco's Save the Redwoods League is documenting the age, size and tree-ring history of California's old-growth redwood groves as part a statewide project.

ROACH: During a preop exam before minor

surgery, I was told that I have a leaky heart valve (my heart has always been strong). I was told "Everybody has one" and "not to worry." I am elderly. What does this mean for me? -- M.C.

ANSWER: The

heart has four valves: the aortic and mitral on the left side, and the pulmonic and tricuspid on the right. Any of these can leak, but it's the valve involved and how extensively it is leaking that are the key issues for determining how problematic the leak is. It is true that many, or even most, people have a small degree of leak ("leak" in this context is when the blood flows in the wrong direcclosed, not that it comes out of the heart and blood vessels entirely, which is a life-threatening emergency). The tricuspid valve in particular usually has a small amount of regurgitation (one of the technical terms for leak; the other is "insufficiency") that can be seen on an echocardiogram. If your doctor could hear it, that implies a more significant leak. Large amounts of leak, especially aortic valve insufficiency, need medical and sometimes surgical treatment.

Based on what you were told, it sounds like this is a very small issue, possibly tricuspid regurgitation, and if you are feeling well, it's unlikely that you need any treatment. The next time you see your doctor, though, get the details, and ask questions until you have all the information you need to feel comfortable.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have a very dry mouth after surgery and radiation treatment for tongue and throat cancer. I have thrush in the middle of my tongue, caused by a very dry mouth. I brush my mouth and tongue three times a day and gargle every night, yet it comes back the next day, and I start all over again. I'm used to it, but my lady friend is concerned.

We are both seniors and are thinking about a serious relationship. She was told that I could pass on the yeast infection or something worse to her. I don't know how to answer her. Is it possible the thrush is contagious? -- R.C.K.

ANSWER: Thrush is caused by the overgrowth of yeast, normally in a warm, moist environment, such as the mouth, vagina or areas where the skin overlaps, such as under the arm. Yeast normally live in the area, so thrush typically is caused by something different in the host -- that is to say, the person affected. People with diabetes mellitus or with damaged immune systems due to steroids, infection or chemotherapy are at a higher risk for thrush. Dry mouth, a common complication after head d neck cancer, predisposes one to thrush

Thrush is not normally considered contagious. Your lady friend likely has yeast already (most of us do, as part of the normal array of organisms that live on us), and her body's system keeps it in check. However, if she has a very weakened immune system, as described above, it is possible, but unlikely, to transmit infection.

Although good oral hygiene is important for getting rid of thrush, I am surprised that you aren't on some other kind of medication. Oral solutions, lozenges and pills all show high rates of curing infection. Some people do need ongoing treatment to prevent recurrences, and you might because of your severe dry mouth. Talk with your doctor about a lozenge (called a troche). If you wear dentures or another oral appliance, these need to be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected nightly.

Dear Annie: My 14year-old daughter attends an all-girls school. Her stepfather initially encouraged it, but in the past two years, my daughter has made friends with a few classmates who say they are lesbian or bisexual.

My husband is extremely conservative (borderline homopho-

bic), and as a result, he is shaming my daughter regularly for her friendships. I have a good bond with my daughter and feel torn. I know my husband cares about her, but his comments are hurtful. He says he will keep it up to make sure she doesn't "become" a lesbian.

I've pleaded with him, tried to understand him and told him to stop, but it continues.

What do I do? -- Is This Abuse? Dear Abuse: Shaming your daughter is a form of abuse. Your husband sounds ignorant, homophobic and idiotic. Friendships with bisexual or homosexual girls will not make your daughter "become" a lesbian. But we guarantee that your husband's bullying will push her toward rejecting everything he says, and his influence over her will diminish

to nothing You need to stand up for your daughter more strongly. Insist that you and your husband get counseling immediately to work on this. If he refuses and will not curtail this behavior, we recommend you take your daughter and leave the house. Your husband needs to understand the consequences of his actions, and more importantly, your child should not be subjected to such emotional abuse. You are the only one who can protect

Dear Annie: I read the letter from "G," whose mother died and the headstone uses only the surname of her second husband. "G" was concerned that her children's descendants won't be able to find their grandmother's grave because they won't necessarily recall the second husband's surname. Golden Eagles Fillman, Cooper seek state success

HANOVERTON — The United boys track team is pinning its state hopes on two qualifiers who will compete in four events at the Division II state meet Friday and Saturday at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium in Columbus.

Senior Riley Fillman earned his third straight trip to the state meet after placing third in the 300meter hurdles and the long jump at the Austintown regional last week.

Fillman has been breaking up his training for state since he will compete in the long jump at 9:30 a.m.

Friday, followed by the 300 hurdles semifinals at 3:30

"Since at state I do long jump in the morning and running later, I've got to get up early, come out and I've got to do long jump," Fillman said. "Then I go home for awhile or go to therapy and then I come back and I have to do my hurdles. So it's just practice is broke up throughout the

day."
Fillman said there is a morning and afternoon competitions.

"It's a lot different," he said. "It really depends on how well I get warmed up. Fillman hopes for a good showing at state to close out his high school career.

"I'd really like to place in the top eight," he said. "I'd like to get as high as I can. I don't know how high that is, but just do my best and see where I end up.'

Senior Lucas Cooper is a returning state qualifier in both the discus throw and shot put. Cooper was second in the shot put and third in the discus at the Austintown regional.

"My goals are to break both school records and to get on the podium," he said. "My shot put is 56feet-9 1/4. So that's 3 inches off the record. My best discus is 169-9. That's about 2 feet off the school

record."

Cooper was happy to make it to Columbus as he battled rigorous competition at the regional.

"I knew going in there was some tough competition, so I just wanted to PR (personal record), get on the podium and make it to state," he said.

Cooper's training regimen involve early morning workouts since he will throw the shot at 9:30 a.m. Friday and the discus at 9:30 a.m. Saturday.

"I think I can place. I've just got to throw my best,' he said. "Just be equal, wake up, and get used to throwing early.'

Delly gives it his all

INDEPENDENCE (AP) The kid was fearless, relentless, a hustler.

Growing up in tiny Maryborough, Australia, Matthew Dellavedova tried every sport. And no matter if it was playing basketball, soccer, Aussie rules football, tennis, cricket or field hockey, the Cavaliers backup point guard went after the ball with disregard for his body.

Face first.

"He's always been that way," said his 77-year-old grandfather, Alan Dellavedova, who watches all of Cleveland's games in Australia. "He doesn't leave anything out there. What he has, he gives. And if he sees the ball, he wants it."

It's been that way in the IBA playoffs

Dellavedova has become a cult hero in Cleveland, where his play has endeared "Delly" to teammates and fans, who relate to his approach and undrafted underdog story.

It's the exact opposite in Chicago and Atlanta, where he's a villain who crashes into players' knees and irritates opponents.

As he and his Cleveland teammates prepare for this week's NBA Finals against Golden State, the once obscure Dellavedova has been thrust into an unlikely spotlight. It's new territory for the easygoing 24-year-old, who has grown a scratchy beard during a postseason in which he's raised his game while All-Star Kyrie Irving battles knee and foot

In the closing moments of the Cavs' series-sweeping win over the Hawks, Dellavedova stepped to the foul line inside a rumbling Quicken Loans Arena and bathed in Cleveland's love as 20,000 fans chanted "Del-lee, Del-lee."

"I just wanted to knock the free throw down," Dellavedova said, smiling at his fresh memory of the ovation.

If not for Dellavedova's contributions, the Cavs may not have beaten the Bulls. With Irving on the bench in Game 6 with his knee wrapped, Dellavedova, scored 19 points to help Cleveland advance.

The points were a bonus from the 6-foot-4 Dellavedova, whose primary role is to provide defense and keep things going while Irving's off the floor.

Akron's home to the best

AKRON (AP) — Welcome to the Rubber Capital, where car tires first rolled, the Goodyear Blimp took flight and two bouncing baby basketball prodigies were born less than four years apart in the 1980s.

LeBron James and Stephen Curry, the NBA's two biggest stars set to square off in the upcoming finals, are from the same

Genuine homeboys. The prodigal son and the precision shooter. Talk about a long shot.

James re-signed as a free agent with the Cavaliers last summer, returning to his home after four years in Miami to chase an NBA title. And as fate would have it, Golden State's Curry will come back to his Ohio birthplace to pursue his dream.

"It's kind of ironic that he's going back to Cleveland, where he came into the world, to try and get the world championship," said his father, Dell Curry.

Wardell Stephen Curry was born on March 14, 1988, arriving while his daddy, traded by Utah to Cleveland before his second pro season, was playing in Madison Square Garden against the New York Knicks.

Curry made his world debut with almost the same speed in which he comes off a screen, catches the ball and drops one of his 3-pointers — lightning quick. His mom, Sonya, said her delivery was only about 2 1/2 hours, roughly the length of a pro game. "He was asleep," she said last week after the Warriors won the Western Conference title and advanced to their first finals in 40 years. "We walked in, and his eyes were wide open the whole game - the whole game and then as soon as we left and went to the family room, he fell asleep.

"And so then we knew that he was in tune with that arena and basketball in every sense.'

The Currys didn't spend much time in Ohio as Dell was selected by the Charlotte Hornets in the expansion draft and the family was uprooted again.

UAB restores football

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — UAB President Ray Watts said Monday he is bringing the football program back as early as 2016, reversing a decision to shut it down because it was too expensive.

Watts cited renewed financial commitment from supporters, students and the city as reasons for the change of heart.

He said donors have pledged to make up the projected \$17.2 million deficit over the next five years if football is restored,. Watts told The Associated Press he decided on Monday morning to reverse the earlier decision after meetings with UAB supporters continued through the weekend.

"The biggest single difference is that we now have tangible commitment for additional support that we never had before," Watts said at a news conference.

In addition to reinstating football, Watts said Monday that he was also bringing back bowling and rifle. The study commissioned by the university was based on the programs being brought back in 2016. However, new athletic director Mark Ingram stopped short of guaranteeing 2016, saying only that the goal is to bring football back as soon as

possibl

Watts cut the programs last December after UAB commissioned a report saying it would cost \$49 million over five years to field a competitive football program, generating both a groundswell of criticism for the decision and a rallying of financial support for the Blazers program.

The president said UAB has dropped an indoor practice facility from the equation since the initial report, and has raised about 10 percent of the estimated \$12.5 million to \$14.5 million needed for a turf practice field and new fieldhouse.

The December decision left players looking for teams and stirred fans, student and faculty groups to issue no-confidence votes against Watts.

"This was a very difficult decision," he said. "It broke our hearts to make that decision, and we are sorry for any consequences of that. But we are excited today that our community and supporters have come together. Had we not made that decision, which was based on sound information, that we wouldn't be where we are today. We have never seen this level of support. It has been a painful process at times but it has been a process that

has brought us to a new day."

UAB commissioned College Sports Solutions to review the initial report by CarrSports Consulting. The numbers were similar minus the indoor facility. Watts also said UAB's cost of attendance could be about half the initial projected \$5,000 per athlete, based on other Conference USA schools. The first season's College Football Playoff payout also was higher than UAB had projected.

Watts said that the initial projections "showed there was no way for us to cover that unless we took away from education and research and health care."

Watts said UAB sent documents to C-USA and NCAA notifying them of his decision, but he makes it clear UAB plans to remain in the league and play at the FBS level.

Without football, UAB would have likely not have remained in C-USA, which has a bylaw requiring members to field football programs.

C-USA Commissioner Britton Banowsky said members had not wanted to change the rule because "football is something that is critical to our long-term success and part of our core as a conference."

'My conclusion is very clear: I will no longer continue to participate (in FIFA) under such conditions. So, it is high time for change to come and we will see over the coming days what may happen. Let's be clear, if this atmosphere prevails at FIFA, I have no place there.'

D'Hooghe has served on FIFA's ruling body since 1988, a decade before Blatter's move up from secretary general to president.

'If you are faced with an abscess, simple medication does not suffice," D'Hooghe said. "You have to cut it open."

Heather Rabbatts went a step further and resigned from her post on the FIFA anti-discrimination task force.

That body, until last week, was chaired by Jeffrey Webb, who was suspended as a FIFA vice president and remains in custody in Switzerland along with six others after being arrested as part of the U.S. corruption investigation.

Rabbatts is also a director at the English Football Association, a long-standing critic of Blatter.

Like many in the game I

find it unacceptable that so little has been done to reform FIFA," she wrote in a letter to FIFA. "And it is clear from the re-election of President Blatter that the challenges facing FIFA and the ongoing damage to the reputation of football's world governing body are bound to continue to overshadow and undermine the credibility of any work in the anti-discrimination

arena and beyond." The corruption scandal crept closer to FIFA's Zurich headquarters when The New York Times reported late Monday that U.S. law enforcement officials believe the high-ranking FIFA member mentioned in the indictment as having made a \$10-million payment central to the investigation was Blatter's right-hand man, Jerome Valcke.

The report cited unidentified officials who believe Valcke, FIFA's secretary general, transferred the money in 2008 to accounts controlled by Jack Warner, the former CONCACAF president and FIFA vice president. That payment was allegedly made in exchange for Warner and others having voted to give the 2010 World Cup to South Africa.

FIFA said the payment,

which South African officials have said was meant to help with soccer development in the Caribbean, was authorized by the then-finance committee chairman, per FIFA regulations. The chairman, Julio Grondona, died last year. The debate in Britain,

where Blatter faces some of his harshest criticism, made its way to Parliament on Monday, and Whittingdale wasn't alone in his condemnation of the FIFA president.

Chris Bryant, the sports spokesman for the opposition Labour Party, said Blatter was a "tainted leader of a corrupt organization" who was re-elected because of "Mafioso cronyism."

FIFA on Monday provisionally banned another soccer official - CONCA-CAF General Secretary Enrique Sanz — as its ethics committee assesses evidence from the U.S. criminal investigation.

An unidentified co-conspirator listed in last week's indictment fit the description of Sanz' work history. Sanz, who has been battling leukemia, was placed on a leave of absence by CONCACAF on Thursday.

Soccer beats out baseball in game of US-Cuban detente

HAVANA (AP) — In a landmark act of sports diplomacy, soccer's New York Cosmos on Tuesday will become the first U.S. professional team to play in Cuba since Presidents Raul Castro and Barack Obama announced their countries would re-establish diplomatic relations. Soccer's popularity is growing in both baseball-crazy nations and Cuban officials said the friendly match against the country's national team would be an important step in the normalization of the relationship between the U.S. and Cuba.

"In this new era that our two countries are living, this game is another link that will help establish the relations announced by the two presidents," said Antonio Garces, vice president of the Cuban Soccer Association.

While the two governments have yet to reopen embassies following the December announcement of detente, Havana has been flooded by a surge of U.S. tourists as well as delegations of lawmakers, business executives and athletes.

A group of retired NBA stars held a training camp for Cuban players in April, and Cuban officials have said a U.S. professional baseball exhibition game is planned for the near future, although Major League Baseball officials have said no plans have been made.

The Cosmos, who are leading the standings in the second-tier North American Soccer League, arrived Sunday night and trained Monday afternoon ahead of the next day's match at 30,000-seat Pedro Marrera stadium, which is to be televised nationally in Cuba.

"I'm happy that we came here to play soccer and unite two countries," Cosmos midfielder Walter Restrepo said. "The people have really welcomed us, with high expectations for the game." Garnering much attention in Cuba were former Real Madrid star and current Cosmos player Raul Gonzalez and the team's honorary pres-

ident Pele, the legendary Brazilian star who played for the original Cosmos franchise as his career was ending.

"I never imagined that Cuba against the Cosmos would happen. And to think Raul and Pele would come to Cuba, nobody thought that," fan Yosbani Fuentes said. Asked about the bribery scandal that exploded last week in soccer's global governing body, Pele declined to criticize FIFA or its head,


Sepp Blatter. "We are players and we want to provide joy to the public and people. What happens with executives doesn't interest me," Pele said. "He's a man who has been there 25 years. You have to respect him."

While Cuba is far from a soccer powerhouse, the sport hasn't been spared the waves of departures that have robbed its teams of many top-ranked athletes. Forward Maykel Galindo left in 2005 and went on to play for several U.S. teams. Midfielder Osvaldo Alonso abandoned Cuba two years later and now plays in Seattle. Cuba's relatively weak international soccer performance hasn't stopped the sport from spreading on the island, with growing numbers

watching professional games on television and playing on dusty fields and neighborhood streets. "Soccer is a people's sport that's gained a lot of popularity in recent years, in Cuba and the United States, and without a doubt it'll help

tear down barriers and open doors," Garces said.

The last professional U.S. soccer team to visit Cuba was the now-defunct Chicago Sting, which played in 1978 after President Jimmy Carter sought to improve relations with Cuba and opened the interests section in Havana that both countries want to soon convert into a full embassy.
